Tenement Blaze Takes Nine Lives

TYLDESLEY, Lancashire, Eng., Jan. 14, (U.P.)—Mrs. Sarah Tyrer, 41, her six sons and two daughters, ranging in age from 13 months to 13½ years, burned to death Monday as fire destroyed their ramshackle tenement.

Adam Tyrer, the father, escaped by jumping from a bedroom window. Three of the children were sleeping with their parents in the front bedroom and five were in the back bedroom.

Tyrer was removed to a nearby hospital after the tragedy, raving hysterically.

NEW TREE-TROOPER COMPANIES ARRIVE

MEDFORD, Jan. 14, (Special)—Five new CCC companies will arrive from the mid-west this week to bring the Medford CCC district back to a strength of 22 camps.

The companies will occupy Camp Steamboat, Wimer, Gasquet, Clear Lake and Applegate, which were vacated last week when four second corps area and three ninth corps area companies were disbanded.

Only two camps which were vacated will not be reoccupied for the present period. They are Coos Head, near Marshfield, and Elk Creek, near Medford. Coos Head's company was not disbanded but moved to Camp Sitkum when the second corps area company there was sent back to New Jersey.

Three special trains are bringing the five new companies to this district. The first left Two Harbors, Minnesota, January 12 with Company 2702 for Camp Gasquet and Company 4742 for Camp Wimer. It will arrive about January 15.

The second also left January 12 with Company 2702 from Two Harbors, Minn., for Camp Applegate and Company 703 for Alphen Junction, Minn., for Camp Steamboat.

Another special train was to leave Madison, Nebraska, January 14 with Company 4740 for Camp Clear Lake.

The seven old companies were disbanded as part of the program to reduce the civilian conservation corps to its original strength of 300,000 men. An effort is being made on the part of the CCC sponsors to make the corps a permanent institution at this strength.

Colonel Roosevelt Proposes Plan to Aid "Industrious"

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 14, (U.P.)—Colonel Theodore Roosevelt, possible Republican presidential candidate, Monday proposed a three point program to aid "the industrious and thrifty" and to do away with "providing an ampler and easy life for the lazy and shiftless."

Addressing the young Republican convention, he suggested:

1.—Cutting prices without cutting salaries.

2.—Promoting competition and opposing monopolies.

3.—Slashing distribution costs by eliminating the spread between producer and consumer.

"Our objective is to provide for a wider distribution of the necessities and the good things of life among the people who merit it by industry and thrift," Roosevelt said.

"We are not concerned with providing an ampler and easy life for the lazy and shiftless."

Woman Accused of Killing 3rd Husband

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 14, (U.P.)—Hazel Belford Glab, red headed widow already under sentence for forging the will of the late Albert L. Cheney, California capitalist Monday was charged with murdering her third husband seven years ago.

The grand jury returned the indictment after a secret session in which evidence was presented by the district attorney's office and Mrs. Glab appeared personally for questioning.

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News of Oregon

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 14, (U.P.)—Seafaring folk of Coos Bay spoke in quiet tones today of the disaster to the freighter Iowa and her crew of 34 on Peacock spit at the Columbia river mouth Sunday, and recalled that it was exactly 26 years ago Sunday that the steamer Carina cracked up on North Spit of the Coos Bay bar and 25 perished. Only one escaped death from the wreck of the Southern Pacific railroad's boat.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 14, (U.P.)—A telegram from Washington, D. C., advised City Commissioner

Bean of Portland that Oregon already has received its share of WPA funds for highway purposes. The answer answered his appeal to President Roosevelt for reconsideration of the application for the Wolf Creek and Wilson River shortcut to sea highway project.

STUDENTS PREPARE FOR EXAMINATIONS

Much whispering is going around Klamath Union high school in regard to the dreaded semester examinations, which will begin January 22.

They will be one hour long, and everyone is to remain in the classroom the full hour, even though they finish before the hour is up. The first period examinations will be held from 8:45 to 9:45 Wednesday morning. Second periods will be taken care of from 1:00 to 2:00 that afternoon.

The third and fourth period tests will be given Thursday from 8:45 to 9:45 and from 1:00 to 2:00, respectively.

Friday morning from 8:45 to 9:45 will finish the semester's work.

All pupils are expected to take examinations unless they are exempt. In order to be exempt one must meet the following requirements: 1.—Two six weeks' grade of "1" in scholarship and citizenship. One six weeks' grade may be a "2", providing it is not the third six weeks' grade. 2.—Must not have missed class more than ten times. 3.—Must not have two or more unexcused absences, two or more unexcused tardiness, or one each during the semester.

Students need to report for examinations only, and they are expected to leave the building except while taking the exams. Those who are late for the examinations will not be allowed to take them.

ROAD OFFICIALS GO TO TULELAKE

TULELAKE, Calif.—Burris Short, Macdonell, in the employ of Siskiyou county road commissioner, has been stationed in Tulelake to take charge of county road equipment and maintenance in an effort to improve road conditions in the northern end of the county.

Burris will remain here as permanent supervisor of that work.

Roads other than the new highway, and where gravel has been placed, are fast nearing the state of being impassable.

The appointment was made by Supervisor Jacobs in an effort to improve travel conditions through the constant use of maintenance equipment.

Burris will move his family to Tulelake in the near future.

CONTROL PROGRAM AT STANDSTILL

Operation of the Warren potato control act in Klamath county is at a complete standstill.

It is generally understood the supreme court decision knocking out the AAA has upset the potato control program, and that no further effort will be made to enforce it.

Word has been received from the administrative headquarters advising stoppage of plans for the apud law operation.

No new application for tax-free stamps have been received since the supreme court decision. Prior to that, a few had come in.

Telegrams have been sent to Senators McNary and Steiwer and Congressman Pierce, urging them to oppose the revival of any such legislation as the Warren potato control bill, it was learned Tuesday.

McNary and Steiwer replied that they would keep their eye on the situation, and keep in mind the Klamath sentiment. No word has been received from Pierce.

Prior to the AAA decision, the Klamath county nominating committee met and chose the county control committee. Members were Henry Anderson, Guy Barton and U. E. Reeder.
