to me," Couzens said afterward. "In the seeming indifference of congress to handing out a billion dollars to the government's obligation."

"It was estimated by the veterans administration that if the senate bill passed it would add to the taxpayers' taxes \$1,000,000 over and above the present obligation."

Less for Taxpayers

"In other words if congress did nothing and let matters run as they are the taxpayers would have a billion dollars less to pay."

Despite Morgenthau's testimony, administration leaders predicted quick passage of the bill by the senate and reiterated their belief it would become law.

Early Success Expected

Senator Robinson, the democratic leader, predicted the coalition bonus bill would be enacted before the end of January. "It is my thought," he said, "that action will be taken during the present month and the subject will be disposed of in a satisfactory way."

Robinson made this statement on the way to the White House to keep a luncheon engagement with President Roosevelt.

Debate by Thursday

Chairman Harrison (D-Mia) announced the vote and said he would try to get senate consideration Thursday. Those voting for the favorable report were: Democrats—George, Walsh, Barkley, Gore, Cogan, Bailey, Clark, Lonergran, Black, Guffey and Harrison; republicans—Keyes, Hastings and Capper; Progressives—LaFollette.

By a vote of 18 to 9 the committee substituted the senate bill for that passed last Friday by the house which provided for full cash payment of the certificates, but specified no method of payment.

Secretary Morgenthau, Daniel W. Hill, acting budget director, and officers of the three veterans' organizations which are united behind the senate bill appeared before the committee in executive session before the final vote was taken.

"I'm sorry, you'll have to see Harrison," Morgenthau told reporters after the meeting.

Harrison refused to divulge Morgenthau's testimony.

New Gale Reported Brewing on Coast; Wide Section Hit

Edward L. Wells, federal meteorologist, said the new southeasterly gale would make the coastline from northern California to British Columbia.

Snow in East Portion

The storm was centered early in the morning about 300 miles west of Tatoosh Island. Absence of ships in the area made it difficult to judge the degree of violence of the disturbance.

Southeast gale warnings were ordered up at 7:30 a. m. at display stations from Eureka to the straits of Juan De Fuca.

Snow was falling in some parts of eastern Oregon today, but at 9 a. m. Pendleton reported skies clearing after a brief rain last night.

Occasional rain was predicted for most of the state today, with snow over the mountains.

The Willamette river at all points above Oregon City was falling and the weather bureau said the fall probably will continue tomorrow and Thursday. The Santiam was expected to continue to fall. The Columbia rose slightly.

THREE REPORTED DEAD

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 14. (AP)—Threats of floods in scattered northern California river areas subsided today with reports of diminishing rainfall in lowlands and valleys and return to normal temperatures in the high Sierras. But one section remained inundated.

Three persons were reported to have died from drowning.

COAST ROAD COVERED

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 14. (AP)—Flood waters swirled 10 feet deep today over a portion of the Oregon Coast highway between Coquille and Bandon, but all other main highways of the southwestern Oregon district were open.

Fifty CCC workers removed slides caused by floods along the Myrtle Point road. Rowboats were in use in and about Coquille where rising waters threatened homes.

FLOOD DANGER PASSING

EUGENE, Jan. 14. (AP)—With the Willamette river down here today, danger of flood conditions apparently was passing in the Eugene vicinity. The river stood at 9.4 feet this morning after stopping just short of 12 feet last night.

The wide flat area to the west

of the city was flooded in many places, however, as Long Tom river left its banks. Rainfall from 7 a. m. Monday to 7 a. m. Tuesday totaled .39 of an inch and it was raining slightly this morning.

ROADS REOPENED

ROSEBURG, Ore., Jan. 14. (AP)—Roads, blocked yesterday by high water and slides were being reopened today. The Roseburg-Coos Bay highway was opened last night, one-way traffic being maintained around a slide seven miles west of Canby valley. State highway crews are continuing the work of clearing away the large slide, and expect to have the road fully open tonight.

TILLAMOOK, Jan. 14. (AP)—The gale that reked the coast Sunday killed 12 cows of Charles Hines' herd of 15 dairy cattle when the heavy wind blew his barn down on the animals.

TILLAMOOK, Jan. 14. (AP)—The \$20,000 Barview coast guard lifeboat was washed on the rocks at Garibaldi and battered beyond repair in the week-end gale. Several large fishing boats were demolished.

PORT ORFORD, Ore., Jan. 14. (AP)—Damage amounting to thousands of dollars was caused here by the week-end gale. The dock of the breakwater protecting the dock was damaged but the rock work withstood the fury of the storm.

Port Orford was entirely cut off from the world Sunday and all lights were out.
