The Inside Story From
The Capital

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15.—For six long years, John J. Raskob's 1929 income tax stood approved by the international revenue bureau. It suddenly developed spontaneous symptoms of a fraudulent plot in the early part of this January, 1936.

Mr. Raskob said he thought the time of discovery had something to do with the coming dinner of his and Mr. Dupont's American Liberty League. Mr. Raskob may have his dinner mixed.

What he may not know is that the bureau charge against him was filed in public record on January 6, two days before the Jackson day dinner. The bureau apparently was not very proud of it. At least, the record lay around four days until an alert newsmen, with a sharper eye than his colleagues, dug it out and published it two days after the dinner.

TIMING
If Mr. Raskob will scrape his memory, he may recall another thing that happened just before the Jackson day dinner; say for instance, a certain communication he made to Postmaster General Farley. He may recall that it was something to the effect that he wanted that \$25,000 which Mr. Farley's Democratic national committee still owes him. Also something about suing Mr. Farley for the money if the \$25,000 was not paid from all those thousands of dollars collected for the \$50-a-plate dinner.

The inside crowd here will wager even money that Mr. Raskob's threat had at least as much to do with the resurrection of his dead and buried income tax troubles as the Liberty League dinner next week.

SUGGESTION
Messrs. Farley and Raskob are supposed to have had plenty of unpublished words back and forth lately. You may recall that Mr. Raskob held the mortgage on the old Democratic homestead, now inhabited by new dealers. Farley has been paying him off grudgingly, a little at a time.

During last May, June and August, Farley paid Raskob \$5000 a month, and last March he gave him \$10,250. But he started cutting the payments down in the fall. In October he gave only \$4000, in November \$2500 and December \$2500.

What the boys inside would like to see Raskob do is to give his remaining \$25,000 debt as a contribution. They point as an example the case of Mr. Morgenthau (probably senior, but not identified in the record). The committee owed Mr. Morgenthau \$10,000, but he wiped it off the slate recently as a contribution. It is notable that Mr. Morgenthau has had no income tax troubles.

EXPERIENCES
When Mr. Raskob attributed his tax troubles to the Liberty League dinner, he must have had in mind two other fellows. They are his co-sponsors, Pierre DuPont, and a New Yorker of prominence whose name cannot be published. Mr. Dupont's 1929 tax troubles also date from Jan. 6, 1936, which was about two weeks after the Liberty League disclosed that the Dupont family had contributed something like \$150,000 to combat the new deal.

The troubles of the New Yorker also are recent. It seems that a banker friend of his was caught in the crash of 1931. To help his friend, the New Yorker gave a considerable amount of his own money. This he charged off as a taxable loss. The internal revenue bureau let it go for a long time, but recently began harassments.

MORAL
Thus, Messrs. Raskob, Dupont and X join a long list of anti-new dealers, including such notables as the Tilden-Huey-Lorain, Andrew Mellon, Walter Brown, Jim Watson. You will, however, look in vain for any tax cases involving the wealthy pro-new dealers like Bernard Baruch, Straus, Astor, et al.

The inference behind that situation has been plain since the internal revenue bureau started out to break up the long political machine with income tax prosecutions. It is that, if you want to stay out of federal tax troubles, you apparently stand a better chance on the new deal side.

MASTER MIND
Those on the rim of the inner circle here credit internal revenue Commissioner Helvering for the wave of tax prosecutions against political opponents. The reason is obvious. His experience has been more political than fiscal. He was chairman of the state Democratic committee in Kansas when appointed to control of federal tax matters.

However, those within the circle know that the real credit in most cases should go to General Counsel Olliphant of the treasury department. His experience was confined to law professorships at Marion college, Chicago, Columbia and Johns Hopkins. As a brain trust, he has modestly

managed to conceal the fact that he has lately developed into a shrewd political master mind.

It was Mr. Olliphant who did the master-minding on the Raskob-Dupont case.

OVERSIGHT
The treasury neglected to include in the recent list of persons earning more than \$15,000 a year the name of Charles Michelson, publicity man of the Democratic national committee. He gets \$400 a week, and earns it.

Fairport Man has Sleeping Sickness
—ALTURAS, Calif.—James M. Moore, 35, who resides with his wife at Fairport, Calif., a small town on the east side of Goose lake, has been confined to his bed for almost three weeks with an attack of sleeping sickness, says his physician, Dr. John Stille of Alturas.

Moore took sick Christmas day after eating a hearty dinner, and it was thought for a while that his condition was due to indigestion. However, a physician was called who later diagnosed his case as sleeping sickness. Moore is now in his third week of the dreaded malady. His physician reports that his case is not improving, but that he is not entirely unconscious, and can be roused to take nourishment, but is unable to talk coherently. Sometimes he is able to answer questions, and other times merely sits or lies and stares at his interrogator. The case is quarantined against spread of the disease.

Moore was on the truck containing 12 men last August 5th which slipped the Redding refrigerator truck. Five were killed. Moore was badly bruised and shaken up at the time.

NATIONAL PAROLE SERVEY STARTED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15. (AP)—The attorney general's \$1,400,000 survey of the country's parole systems opened today with a "school" for regional directors and supervisors.

Plans for studying the lives of 150,000 released prisoners to discover the effect of parole, probation, commutation, suspended sentences and other methods of release in fitting the convict back into society will be explained to supervisors who will direct about 1,400 "white collar" workers.

Records of prisons, courts, probation and parole officers and social agencies will be combed in the "census" of released convicts.

Justin Miller, administrative director of the study, will school regional directors in their work of compiling state laws for the release of prisoners, and surveying the facilities of the states for keeping prisoners and checking up on them after they leave the penitentiary walls.

A third group of workers, in Washington, will later correlate the work of the directors and the work of the white collar workers to seek the most effective systems for supervising released convicts.

For the survey, the country has been divided into eleven regions with a director and field supervisor in each. Those already assigned include:

Tenth region (Washington, Oregon, Montana, Idaho)—James M. Brown, Montana lawyer, former assistant general counsel of war risk insurance division. Headquarters Seattle.
