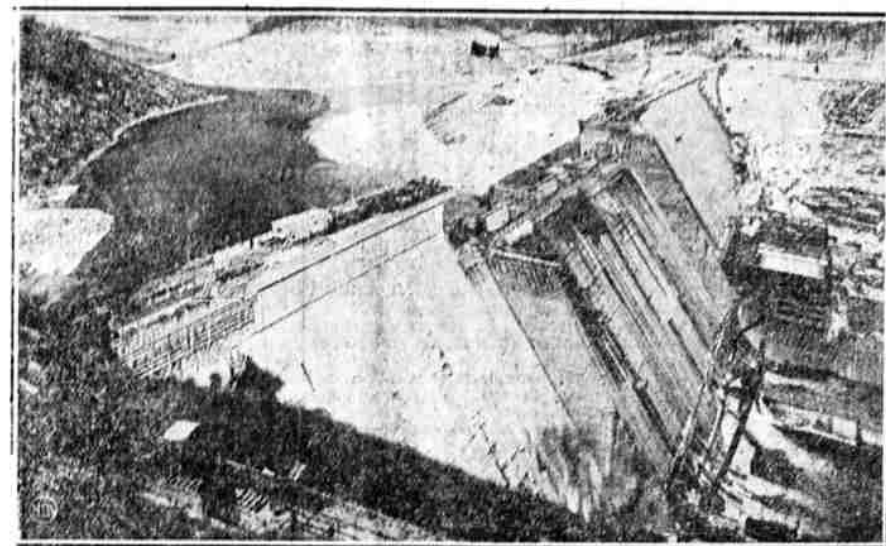

Norris Dam Near Completion as TVA Fate is Decided



A mighty barrier 253 feet high and 1900 feet long, Norris dam, as pictured here, stood virtually completed as the U. S. Supreme Court decided on its ruling on validity of the giant TVA project, of which the dam is a major unit. With exception of the spillway gates, the concrete roadway across the top, and the powerhouse, work will be finished within a month, as all but 10,000 of the 1,000,000 yards of concrete has been poured. The \$34,000,000 structure, on the Clinch river in East Tennessee, will back water up for 50 miles, forming a lake with an 800-mile shore line.

PREDATORY CONTROL PROGRESSES HERE

Predatory animal control in Klamath county is progressing satisfactorily, with A. B. Richey holding a state record of 23 coyotes taken during the month of December in this county.

Clint Conklin and Charles Glasgow, other Klamath hunters took 22 between them. Sixteen coyotes were killed by Klamath county hunters.

Predatory animal hunters in the state working all, or part time took 254 coyotes and 23 bobcats. This predatory animal control project sponsored by the state department of agriculture has been approved in 25 counties.

Fred R. Sankey, one of the leaders in the state progress administration in charge of predatory animal control, spent the early part of December in Klamath and Lake counties assisting local hunters in the work.

STUDENTS MISSING AFTER DISORDERS

HONGKONG, Jan. 15, (AP)—A roll call of Canton students today disclosed six missing following the anti-Japanese disorders Monday although the government denied any of the demonstrators were killed.

Foreigners' school of the trouble said student assemblies were broken up by truckloads of plainclothes men, bearing national Salvation Army banners, who used pistols to quell the demonstrations.

One girl student was taken to a hospital in a dying condition.

Government officials disclaimed responsibility for the actions of the plainclothesmen, but witnesses said uniformed soldiers and police did not interfere. Some persons charged authorities had taken this means of satisfying the protesting Japanese consul without causing popular indignation.

Canton was quiet today but students continued to agitate over the province.

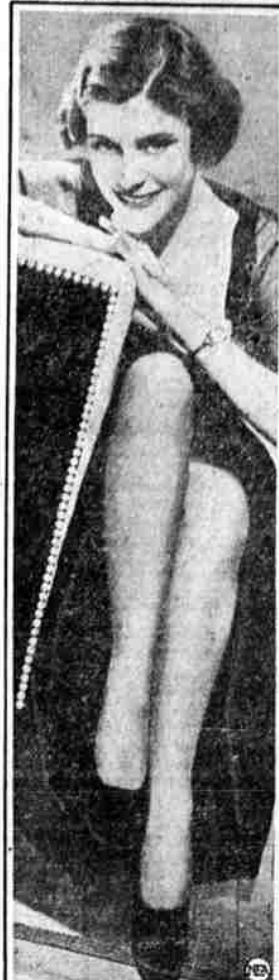
Weather
