The Old Fort quintet soundly trounced Balsiger to the tune of 45-26. Holding a 23-3 lead at the half the Fortmen were never threatened.

CHICAGO, Jan. 16, (AP)—Joe Louis sat around today waiting for the call to action, while his foe of tomorrow night, in the Chicago stadium, Charley Retzlaff, sat and listened to a familiar refrain.

It goes something like this: "The first guy who goes right out there and slugs with Louis will beat him."

Whether there is anything to the advice remains to be determined. The refrain was sung to Primo Carnera, King Levinsky, Max Baer and Paulino Uzcudun. They either forgot all about it upon taking a look at the brown bomber's dead pan or didn't take much stock, for none rushed out to slug. What happened to the quartet, and a number of others, is well known.

SEATTLE, Jan. 16, (AP)—The Vancouver Lions were out in front in the Northwest Hockey league today but how long they will stay there depends on how they fare against the Portland Buckaroos in the Oregon city tonight.

Vancouver broke away from its first-place tie with Portland last night when the Canadians conquered the rampaging Seattle Seahawks, 3 to 2, before a wild-eyed Seattle crowd of 7,000.

At the same time the fast-traveling Edmonton Eskimos smacked the Calgary Tigers, 5 to 2, for the fourth straight time to move into a tie with Seattle for third place in the league standings. The battle was played in Calgary.

Seattle had visions of climbing to within one point of the leaders last night but the scoring stick of Clint Smith was too hot for the Seahawks to stop. The loss was only the third for Seattle in the 12 games since Frank Foyston took command.

More Bartering Appears Likely in Big Leagues

NEW YORK, Jan. 16, (AP)—There may be additional bartering in major league baseball "ivory" before the boys start coming up in Florida for the coming season, but it's a bull market from now on, with no bargains in sight.

The tipoff today is that Colonel Jacob Rupert, perhaps the wealthiest owner in the major leagues, has thrown up his hands and refused to pay the prices asked for some outstanding players he would like to add to the New York Yankee 1936 lineup.

Ruppert, whose fortune towers above that of Tom Yawkey, Boston Red Sox owner and baseball's most conspicuous spendthrift, has paid millions for the players who helped produce the seven pennant-winning clubs in a dozen seasons. The deal for Babe Ruth in 1919 alone involved close to \$500,000, including a mortgage on Ired So property.

"It isn't that we are not willing to pay high for what we want," explained the colonel, "but the other fellows seem to think that I've got a lot of extra money to burn since prohibition ended. Why, I'd go broke if I paid some of the prices they have asked for ball players."

The Yankees virtually were boycotted in the big league player markets after capturing six pennants in eight years under Miller Huggins. But now other American league club owners, fearing the effects of a turn-of-the-slump in the Yankee stadium, trade willingly.

The passing of Babe Ruth, whether or not the manager like to admit it, has been keenly felt. Detroit's rise and Boston's revival notwithstanding. Meanwhile, with no one to take the Babe's place, the Yankees must struggle along with what they've got or else dig deeply into the Ruppert bankroll.

Fox Breeders Name President

SALEM, Jan. 16, (AP)—The Oregon Fox Breeders' association yesterday re-elected C. W. Stacey of Salem as its president for another year.

At its all-day meeting the association voted to take mink breeders into its membership, and adopted a burglar award contract offering \$500 for arrest and conviction of anyone stealing foxes from a member of the association.

WARD HOWELL TOPS SCORERS

Oregon Forward and Center Takes 28 Points in Two Games.

SEATTLE, Jan. 16, (AP)—Ward Howell, six-foot-six-inch Oregon forward and center, and Merle Fisher, veteran Idaho guard, topped scoring honors in first skirmishes of northern division Pacific Coast conference basketball, with 28 points each.

Howell, a transfer from Southern Oregon Normal school, was recognized as "tops" at this stage of the race, however, as he collected his total in two games, for an average of 14, while Fisher played in twice the number for an average of 7.

Wally Geraghty, Idaho guard, was next in line with 26 in four contests. Wally Palmberg, Oregon State forward, tallied 25, and Sam Liebowitz, Oregon forward, 24 in two games.

Washington's best shot-maker was Ed Lovrich, wingman, with 16. Ivor Nelson, center, led Washington State with 14.

In the infield or outfield, however, Freddy is expected to be a big help to the club. Despite his lower batting average last season, he is regarded as a more dependable hitter than Stripp, and due for a come-back this year.
