FORMER PRESIDENT DISCUSSES AAA

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 16. (AP)—Nebraska republicans gathered in Lincoln today to hear former President Herbert Hoover discuss the agricultural policies of the Roosevelt administration, and to make plans for their 1936 state campaign.

G. O. P. officials predicted more than 10,000 persons would hear Hoover deliver the fourth in his series of five attacks on the Roosevelt New Deal in the University of Nebraska coliseum at 8:30 o'clock (CST) tonight.

Hoover was expected to discuss publicly for the first time the United States supreme court's decision invalidating the AAA, and many republicans believed he would give a preview of the 1936 G. O. P. farm program. Hoover was to arrive here late this afternoon from Omaha. He was the scheduled honor guest at a banquet before the speaking program.

NATIONALLY KNOWN CHURCHMAN PASSES

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Jan. 15. (AP)—Dr. G. A. Brandelle, 75, president emeritus of the Evangelical Lutheran Augustana Synod, and nationally known churchman, died in a hospital today of pneumonia.

Dr. Brandelle served as president of the Synod from 1913 to June 1935 when he was retired. He was a former president of the National Council of Lutheran churches of the United States and was honored by Arch Bishop Nathan Soderblom of Sweden who awarded him the bishop's cross. He was succeeded as president of the Augustana Synod by the Rev. P. O. Berell of Attumwa, Ia.

Dr. Brandelle, last fall as the Synod's president emeritus, attended the Lutheran world conference in Paris. He was a staunch prohibition advocate. Dr. Brandelle was born March 19, 1861, in Andover, Ill., and graduated from Augustana college and theological seminary in 1884. He was ordained the same year and he received his doctor's degree from Bethany college, Lindsborg, Kans., in 1909.

From 1884 to 1918, he was pastor of the Augustana Lutheran church in Denver, Colo. His widow and two daughters survive.

STATE SECRETARY HAS VARIED JOBS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 15. (UP)—Everything from selling license plates to supplying postage stamps for the members of the legislature keeps Secretary of State Snell busy, with duties probably more varied than those of any other official in the state. The secretary of state is a member of at least six boards and commissions in addition to the state board of control. Supervising elections, acting as custodian of state buildings and grounds, keeping track of the workings of the legislature, and distributing tax monies to the counties are only a few of his scores of specific duties. Among other things Snell must maintain a mailing list of every registered voter in the state for mailing the voters' pamphlet, keep accounts of state funds, license aircraft and register farm names.
