

MANY AAA CLAUSES STILL IN EFFECT

While the decision of the supreme court in the House Mills case served to invalidate many important features of the Agricultural Adjustment act, it did not invalidate the entire act, vital parts of which still remain in effect, according to information received from Washington by the Oregon State college extension service officials.

The elimination of the crop control program, served to halt at once all field work in connection with these, and consequently the O. S. C. extension service, on orders from Washington, cancelled all of the remaining corn, hog and potato control meetings that had been scheduled throughout the state.

The exact status of the contracts or applications for contracts where compliance had already been made has not yet been clarified, but there appears to be general agreement that the government has a moral obligation to pay all contract signs or applicants for compliance already accomplished. Positive statements that this would be done were issued by the AAA following the adverse decision by the supreme court in the House Mills case.

The marketing agreement order and license provisions of the AAA have not been invalidated by the supreme court decision. In the opinion of the department of agriculture, this portion of the law was not before the supreme court and hence all marketing agreements and licenses now in effect will continue in operation. In addition the process of substituting agreements and orders under the AAA amendments of last August have been under way and will be continued, the administration officials announce.

Some question arose on the Pacific coast as to the status of the much discussed walnut marketing agreement. It is definitely announced by the department of agriculture that it is in effect and its validity has not been changed by the supreme court decision. There are in effect under the original agricultural adjustment act marketing agreements and licenses or licenses for 25 fluid milk marketing areas.

Another important section of the original act that was not touched by supreme court decision is the part which created the unified Farm Credit administration. So far its constitutionality has never been questioned.

Awards will be presented to members of the typing classes for skill in typewriting. The records for the last two weeks of the semester will be considered and the awards will be based on speed and accuracy.

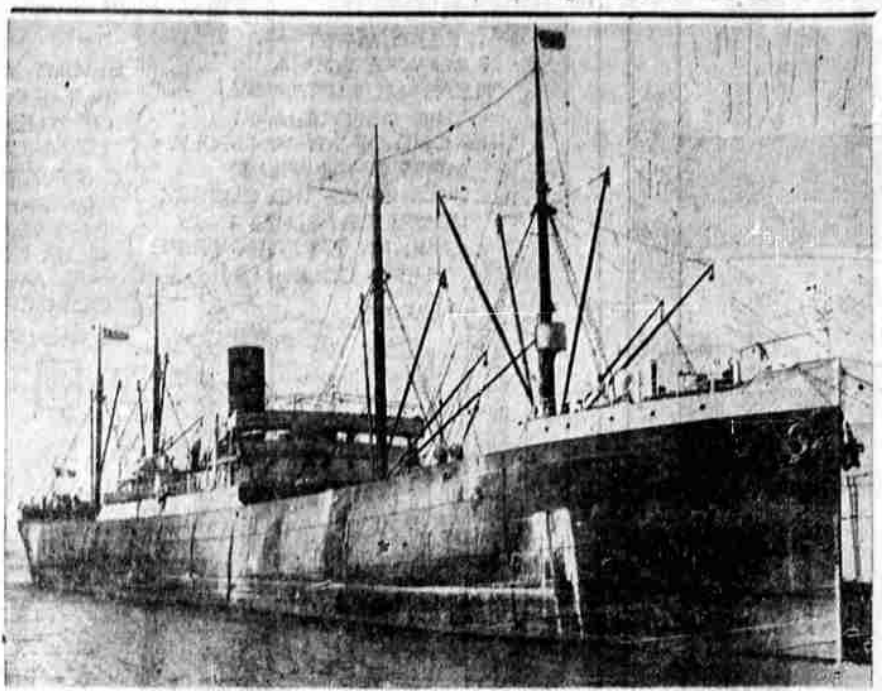
The awards consist of satin ribbons bearing a record of the exact rate of each student and the date the record was made.

Breaks in Two on Peacock Spit; Crew of 34 Lost

Fifteen Men Escape Heavy Slide at Colfax, Calif.

COLFAX, Calif., Jan. 16. (AP)—Fifteen men, safe but battered after a bullet-like snowslide caved in a passenger car of a westbound Southern Pacific transcontinental train, thanked a kindly fate today for what they agreed was a "miraculous escape from death."

The avalanche, hurtling 500 feet down a mountainside in the high Sierras 40 miles northwest of here about 2:45 p. m. yesterday, rumbled its way through a protecting snowshed and crushed and buried the tenth car of the 13-car train.

Two following cars escaped the slide, although the passengers were jostled, and a few minutes afterward a second slide thundered off the mountain, missing the end of the stalled train by a few feet.

Twelve men in the demolished car, on route from Salt Lake City to an Oakland automobile convention, and their porter were injured, four of them being described by their companions as "pretty much banged up," but with no bones broken.

W. A. Sheppard said the slide hit without warning. "There was a tremendous crash, then pitch darkness," he said.

Three hours afterward the last victim, A. T. Crowl, was extricated. He said the car collapsed in three parts. "Another six inches and I wouldn't be here,"

Congressman Hotly Denies Drunkenness

SEATTLE, Jan. 16. (AP)—Marion A. Zionscheck, who represents Seattle in congress, had only seven or eight drinks before police picked him up at the telephone switchboard of a Washington, D. C., apartment house, early the morning of January 1, he said here Wednesday.

"Four hundred and fifty thousand drunks, and I was the only one in jail," said the youthful democratic statesman, hastening to add that of course he wasn't drunk.

Policeman "Yellow"

"I went to see a lady at 2:30 o'clock on Connecticut avenue," he explained. "She didn't answer the doorbell, and the janitor wasn't at the switchboard. When he didn't come, I rang the bells on the trunkline. I didn't know how to operate it."

When a capital policeman arrived, some time later, Zionscheck said, "he made to grab me. He started getting rough, and I told him 'take off your gun and stick and I'll go a round with you.' But he was yellow."

The congressman said he blew smoke in the eyes of the impatient booking officer at the Washington police station. He had \$12.60 and ball was \$15. Zionscheck offered his watch, but it was refused.

Humiliation

He entertained the police until daylight, he remembered, with such things as tearing up paper, lighting it, throwing it out into the corridor and yelling "fire!"

After the humiliation of being fined \$15 and having the transcript of his trial barred from the congressional record, Zionscheck admitted he was plenty mad.

"I'm fighting this thing to a finish," he said. "I appealed. I wasn't drunk."

More than five weeks were required for the 304 roll calls of the House of Representatives, made during the last session of the 74th Congress; only eight members of the House were present at every roll call.

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BIEBER WEATHER RECORDS BROKEN

BIEBER, Calif.—The wettest January in years had Wednesday of this week filled streams in Big Valley to overflowing and put under water large areas of farm land ordinarily dry.

Water collected behind a two mile levee protecting Nubler and was a foot below the embankment's crest Wednesday noon.

The Pit river ran over its bank opposite Bieber and Marilyn Kennedy had to ride in and swim 26 head of his cattle out of a flooded meadow to drive them to safer feeding ground.

Ash creek rose four feet in Adin Tuesday night after it washed a few dozen sawlogs out of a lumber mill pond and jammed them against the state highway bridge in the town. The water went over the floors of several houses, driving the Ray Helt, Beyla Ash, Michael Curbin and Ira Nelson families from their homes for the night. When the jam gave way, the rush of water and logs wrecked a wooden street bridge a block west of the highway and swept it a quarter mile downstream. Heavy logs were left fifty feet from the channel by the receding flood.

More than two inches of rain fell at Bieber Tuesday and Wednesday. It started raining Wednesday afternoon.

A WPA crew that had been fencing a new livestock drive way just north of Bieber went to work in boats Wednesday morning with orders to try and keep the fence clear of tules and driftwood coming across lots on the high water.

COLOMBIA CRASH TAKES NINE LIVES

BOGOTA, Colombia, Jan. 16. (AP)—Nine persons, including two women were reported dead today as the result of the jungle crash of a tri-motored plane in the Caqueta department of southern Colombia.

Two others were believed seriously injured. Seven persons were unhurt.

The death list, as tentatively reported here, included: Major Usategui, head of the Leticia garrison; the pilot, Captain Ojando; the copilot, Lieut. O'Byrne; radio man, Pavolini; Vaupes; a commissary officer, Francisco Anzola; Lieut. Pinzon; a charity sister; an unnamed woman and a mail courier.

Nothing was said about the fate of the official, Arturo Villalbar and his wife, believed to have been passengers on the plane.

A military transport plane left at 7 a. m., from Tresamunias on the Caqueta river toward the Macaya to transport the victims to Bogota.

Ahead of it, Colombian army motorboats raced up the Macaya river to rescue the survivors.

U. S. Ship Wrecked On Coast of Britain

SEAHAM, Northumberland, Eng., Thursday, Jan. 16. (AP)—The American steamer West Hika, 5275 tons, ran aground a few miles from here early today during a fog.

The Cultercote radio station messaged that there was no immediate danger. However, a Seaham harbor life boat and coast guard cutters from Tyne and Wear, rushed to the stranded vessel's assistance.

The vessel is owned by the Waterman Steamship corporation.

Klamath River May Spread Over Town

KLAMATH, Calif., Jan. 16. (UP)—Twenty-two consecutive days of heavy rainfall, causing the Klamath river to rise to the highest mark since 1904, last night threatened to inundate the town of Klamath, drown thousands of dairy cattle and submerge 5000 acres of fertile valley land.

Old residents of Klamath declared that if present heavy rains continue, the Klamath river may resume its old channel which runs directly through the town.
