CUT ANNOUNCED IN EGG PRICES

PORTLAND, Jan. 16, (AP)—Further cut of 1c dozen in the price on all grades of eggs by the produce exchange recognized the fact that the price on the open market has been near demoralization as a result of the unwillingness of consumers to purchase normal supplies.

Market for butter was showing a well held tone in the country generally with prices unchanged at the local level as a rule but fractional declines in spots. There was no change in butterfat.

Trifle easier tone was suggested for Leghorn chickens in the local trade even though prices were unchanged from the recent high mark. Colored fowls were firmly priced.

Cranberries were being slaughtered to \$2-2.25 for best quality coast or eastern stock.

Extreme weakness was showing for potatoes and while most of the trade was still trying to obtain recent cut price of \$1.75 top for Klamath and Deschutes Gems, there was little snap to the buying.

Fancy Mexican tomatoes were arriving with sales around \$2.75 repacked.

Carload of Texas spinach was due and to be priced \$1.65 bushel of hamper.

Lettuce was 15c higher for best stuff in California.

Rhubarb was down again for hothouse stock.

Hothouse tomatoes were slow but steady as to price.

All country killed meats were unchanged.

CHICAGO, Jan. 16, (AP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Hogs, 20,000; slow, steady to 10 lower than Wednesday's average, extreme top 10.05; bulk 180-250 lbs., 9.85-10.00; 260-350 lbs., largely 9.85-9.90; better grade 140-170 lbs., 9.55-9.90; best sows 9.00.

Cattle, 6,000, calves 1,500; best steers and yearlings mostly steady following Wednesday's active close; shipper demand not as brisk as Wednesday but comparatively few long fed steers suitable for shipping purposes in crop; best medium weights 14.25; few loads 11.00-12.00 but not much here of value to sell above 10.00; other killing classes uneven; cutter cows fully steady; beef cows and all grades heifers slow, steady to weak; best sausage bulls around 6.25; selected weaners to 11.00; stockers weak.

Sheep, 14,000; fat lambs in fairly broad demand; generally asking around steady with early bids 15-25 and more lower; native and fed western offerings bid 10.50-10.65 early; most big packer bids at inside; asking 10.75-10.85 and better; sheep about steady; ewes 4.75-5.50; feeding lambs supply limited; talking about steady.

WOOL TRADE STRONG
