

ALL BRANCHES OF BUSINESS SPEEDING UP

NEW YORK, Jan. 17. (AP)—Nearly all branches of business have attained a more accelerated pace than was evident a year ago, Dun & Bradstreet said today in its weekly review of trade and business.

"While there was a continuance of the gain in retail sales," the review said, "it was superseded by the surge in wholesale distribution, as buyers assembled spring requirements and released a steady flow of orders to freshen current stocks."

"Shaking off the final traces of the rising rate of industrial activity spread to a larger number of divisions. Greater uniformity than in nearly a month marked the extensions of the leading industrial indices, with some reaching the best positions since early December."

The vagaries of the weather in many districts accounted for considerable unevenness in retail distribution, the agency said, although for the country as a whole the estimated volume was larger by 4 to 8 per cent.

In New England gains ranged from 3 to 7 per cent; in the middle west sales were 10 to 15 per cent higher, and larger hog receipts helped some parts of the northwest, but the turnover was smaller than in the preceding week. Trade was quieter on the Pacific coast and in some portions of the south.

Assessment of spring merchandise was the highlight of wholesale markets, the review said. The number of visiting buyers was large, and the volume of orders placed was estimated at 15 to 20 per cent larger than a year ago.

The agency reported unfilled orders for woolen goods totalled about 52,000,000 linear yards at mid-month, a quantity sufficient to keep operations of mills at the current rate for 13 weeks.

Floods Still Menace Northern California

EUREKA, Calif., Jan. 17. (AP)—Danger of flood conditions was lessened in some districts and increased in other parts of northern California Thursday as the 23rd consecutive day of rain in this vicinity washed out trestles, caused some persons to flee their homes and threatened to submerge valley lands.

Swollen streams were rampaging in Humboldt and Del Norte counties, with their levels dangerously near the overflow mark. Threats of flood, however, were somewhat decreased in the Eel, Klamath and Mad river valleys as water marks in those streams remained approximately the same as yesterday.

Mystery Explosion Razes Courthouse

JONESBORO, La., Jan. 17. (AP)—The Jackson county courthouse was destroyed on Thursday by an explosion that rocked the countryside for seven miles. Two persons were reported injured.

Officials believed it was a dynamite blast. A hurried search was started among the debris for other possible victims. Fifty men were sent to the courthouse from a nearby CCC camp to help in the search. Townspeople believed the explosion was the result of political animosity.
