KEX and KPJI, endorsing the Townsend plan, said. He quoted from these speeches which occurred about the time Mahoney dated his more recent letter to Hogan.

"Truth Refreshing"

Hogan was at one time a supporter and ally of Mahoney. Here is Mahoney's statement of the circumstances surrounding the letter:

"In connection with the letter, which the Oregonian so generously spread over its morning edition, let me state a simple fact because the truth is always refreshing.

"Mr. Hogan in September earnestly explained to me how at a gathering out in Multnomah, he had made the statement that he had had a letter from me in October, 1934, outlining my stand on the Townsend plan and on the governorship race. He tearfully asked me to save him from embarrassment by sending him such a letter, restating the nature of the conversation we had in October, 1934.

"Hogan Becomes Tool" "This boy had been very loyal to me, and in order to save him from embarrassment I complied with his request. The letter forwarded to him merely restated what I had said over the radio and in a half dozen public addresses during the month of October. It is the same letter I had sent out to many other supporters during the month of October. But I didn't realize that he would be weak enough to fall into the clutches and become a tool of the men who have used him to betray a confidence.

"The two principal actors behind the scenes in this episode are Jack Barry, who has two things in mind—to use the Townsend people to put over the street car franchise in Portland, and to reelect Senator Charles McNary, and thereby serve his own selfish interests.

"This, I believe, is well known to the people of Portland.

"Lay On, McDuff "The next actor, as you will notice from the name of the notary public on Mr. Hogan's affidavit, is none other than John F. Logan.

"I believe the democrats of Oregon have this gentleman's picture, and recall quite well the leading part he plays with the old standard republican crowd of Oregon. They recall also his close and intimate relationship over the years with the Oregonian.

"Now, that this little play has been put on, we shall wait with interest to see the next move of these cunning manipulators of intrigue and wealth and greed.

"My answer to them is 'lay on, McDuff, and damned be he who first cries hold, enough!'"

PORTLAND, Jan. 17, (P)—Russell Hogan, who accused Mayor Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls with pre-dating a letter stating his stand on the Townsend plan, said after reading Mahoney's reply that he still regarded him as an opportunist attempting to use the Townsend movement for political gain.

"I never heard anything as ridiculous as that I tearfully asked for such a letter from him," Hogan said.

"I think his panned note, inclosed with his letter, clearly indicates that he wanted me to show the letter around so people would think he was for the Townsend movement a year before he wrote this letter."

"I am a Townsend man first, last and always. My only aim is to prevent Mahoney from using a plan he has adopted only for personal gains."

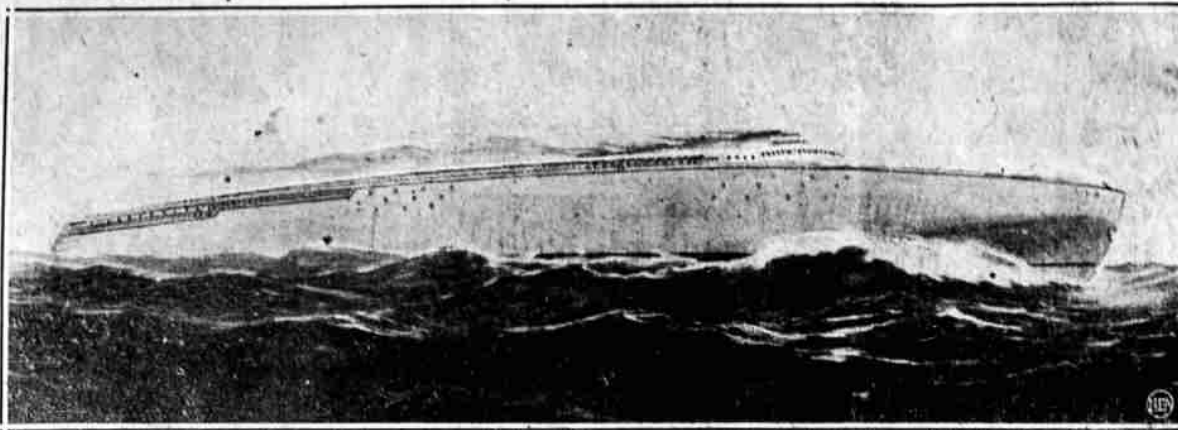

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Dream Ship Visioned for Express Service Between U. S. and Europe



Fast as a speedboat, a quarter of a mile long, accommodating 7000 passengers, capable of making the round-trip to Europe in a week—these are specifications for the superliner shown above in an artist's drawing made from the plans now being studied by the U. S. Department of Commerce. Representing the combined experience of marine, automotive, aviation and naval designers, it was designed primarily to be a self-supporting naval vessel, which, in time of war, would be used as transport and airplane carrier. An airplane landing area 150 by 1250 feet is provided on the clear top deck. Such a ship would be by far the largest afloat and, completely streamlined, would be capable of nearly 50-miles-an-hour speed. It could operate on a \$60 fare. That rate, however, would not include meals, as is customary on present-day liners. Low price cafeterias and restaurants would be provided to suit passengers' purses.

er at Crater lake for Sunday. If the south road remains open, it is expected this event will be held.

Crater lake's broadcasting set was out for a couple of days because of power failure, but was operating again Friday. There is 152 inches of snow at government camp, and it is snowing there Friday morning.

The temperature in Klamath Falls slid down to 18 above early Friday. The barometer here was rising steadily, with indications of clear, cold weather Saturday.

Motorists on the Klamath Falls-Bend road tell of driving through walls of snow so deep that trees bordering the Dalles-California highway are scarcely visible. One-way traffic is maintained in places, and snow plows snort along the Sun Mountain pass. Chains were advisable on this route.

There was very little snowfall on any of the highways in this vicinity Thursday night.

The Klamath Falls-Weed highway is generally good from Midland on south. Between Klamath Falls and Midland the road is very rough and washboardy.

The Greensprings road is generally good but slippery on the curves. There were three inches of snow at the summit of Hayden mountain Thursday night. Chains are not necessary but it is advisable to have them along.

The Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway is getting rather rough. There is much snow in the higher sections but the road is clear.

The Klamath Falls-Malin and Alturas highway is rough in places. The 11½-mile stretch from the state line south is very rough and muddy and is the only bad part of the road. There was some snow down that way yesterday.

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Munitions Probe Sends Senators Into Angry Clash

appreciation of the manhood of their president."

Connally had accused the North Dakota, chairman of the senate munitions committee, of "insulting" Wilson's memory without any justification.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 16, (UP)—Two democratic members withdrew from the senate munitions committee tonight after sharply accusing the group of deliberately diverting their inquiry to besmirch the memory of President Woodrow Wilson.

As Senator James P. Pope, democrat, Idaho, was reading to the committee a statement signed also by Senator Walter George, democrat, Georgia, announcing their temporary withdrawal from the investigation, Senator Tom Connally, democrat, Texas, rushed to Wilson's defense in the senate.

Nye's Charge Responsible The storm broke about a charge by Chairman Gerald P. Nye, republican, North Dakota, yesterday that Wilson and his secretary of state, Robert Lansing, lied when they told the senate foreign relations committee that they knew nothing of secret treaties dividing the spoils of the World War before America's entry.

At the conclusion of Pope's statement, Nye calmly denied that he bore "malice" toward the war president and insisted that he had never "tried so hard to be without prejudice."

"I have entertained and still entertain a faith in Woodrow Wilson's determination to keep us out of war, if possible," he said. "As a newspaper editor

I supported him for reelection in 1916. No one can say that I am displaying animus because of a desire to get even with a man I did not agree with politically." The record shows the opposite.

J. P. Morgan and his partners in the international banking house who had been called as witnesses sat silently as the committee, fighting to obtain legislation which would keep this nation out of war, engaged in a private battle of its own.

Inquiry Received The inquiry was recessed for a week at the close of the day with Morgan and his aides again asked to appear to explain their part in pre-war financial operations. Today the committee disclosed that Wilson was ready to hurl this nation into the World War long before April 6, 1917, but feared a stubborn congress might not approve such a drastic step.

Connally, one of the sharpest-tongued members of congress, was the first to strike back at Nye's accusation against Wilson and at other disclosures in which the war president was mentioned.
