

CLASSES READY FOR CHURCH WORKERS

Services and classes of special interest to all church workers will be held in the First Methodist church beginning on Sunday next when Miss Sybil Leone Tucker, director of religious education in the Portland district, will begin in the assembly of the church school a series of eight days of classes and services. The assembly opens at 9:30 a. m.

She will have a leading part in the junior church service beginning at 10:55 a. m. The junior church has been organized to meet the needs of girls and boys of grammar school age, and will meet every Sunday morning at the same hour as the regular morning worship service of the church.

Miss Tucker will make the young people's devotional meeting at 6:30 p. m. interesting by her participation in their program. The Senior League and the Young People's League will meet jointly on Sunday evening.

A Camp Fire service of special interest to young people will be held at the 7:30 hour, when R. E. Patterson will direct a song service, using the senior choir for special music. Miss Tucker will assist the pastor in this service.

Every afternoon and evening of the week at 4:00 o'clock and at 7:30 o'clock Miss Tucker will conduct classes in worship and in the principles of teaching, including materials and methods. These classes will be open to young people and workers of all churches.

Miss Tucker is an outstanding worker in the field of religious education and evangelism, not only in the Methodist church but in interdenominational schools and gatherings. She has a most interesting way of presenting her materials so that they remain as a treasure to those who participate in her classes and services.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—The price on several varieties of American bourbon and rye whiskey will be reduced as a result of the recently-enacted Canadian trade treaty, the Oregon state liquor control commission said.

Price-reductions for Canadian brands already have been announced. Several items previously ordered stricken from stock here were retained when the commission reconsidered.

BONNEVILLE, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Crib Number 22, on which preparatory work has been underway for six months, dropped into place perfectly on the bed rock of the Columbia river, Portland divers reported after an investigation. The sinking of the crib marked the first step in the placing of the Bonneville cofferdam.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Details appear to be among those things on which District Attorney Herl C. Boylan of Deschutes county insists.

Included in his accident reports sent to the state department was the item: "Going about 10 miles per hour. No other traffic. Dog ran out of side street. Driver applied brakes, dog did not stop. Car struck dog. Car stopped, dog howled but did not stop at scene of accident. Unable to obtain dog's name and address."

ASTORIA, Ore., Jan. 17. (AP)—Colonel William Stewart said he was informed two German ships, instead of the one originally scheduled, will arrive here Sunday.

Colonel Stewart, commander of the lower Columbia river defenses, said the German cruiser Emden, accompanied by the German navy tanker Hansa, will exchange an international 21-gun salute with Fort Stevens at 11 a. m. Sunday before proceeding directly to Portland.

Tasty Recipes for Fish Win Round-up Prizes

In the study of the history of foods we find that fish is one of the oldest foods known to man. In the study of geography we find many kinds of fish used for food in different parts of the world. The people of the United States use very little fish. However, it is gradually becoming one of the important industries.

We find that fish varies in composition just as meat. The chief nutrient in fish is protein. Lean fish, as cod, is more quickly digested than beef and fat fish, as salmon, is digested about as readily as pork.

The people of Oregon are fortunate in being so close to the salmon supply. They should be fish conscious.

Mrs. Housewife, do you know how to recognize and select fresh fish? If not, here are a few suggestions—fresh fish should have clean, bright, red gills; eyes bright and full; flesh firm; no disagreeable odor; and scales easy to remove. It is best to purchase fish from a reliable dealer.

Cooking improves the appearance and flavor of fish. The process requires less time than for meat. Sauces of some kind are or should be served with fish, such as lemon sauce, tartar, drawn butter or Hollandaise.

The following recipes were selected as the best one for this week:

\$1.00 Awards
Creamed Fish in Potato Cups
Mrs. Ned Smith, Rte. 2, Box 127B.

To one cup of mashed potatoes, which are warm, add one egg yolk. Cover inverted. Custard cups, bottoms and two inches of sides with mixture. Smooth over and set away to cool. Makes four.

When ready to use, carefully remove, turning right side up on a well buttered pan. Brush outside with milk or beaten egg.

Make a white sauce, add salt and pepper and any flaked fish. Fill potato cups with mixture and brown lightly in oven. Garnish with parsley before service.

25c Awards
Halibut Croquette
Mrs. J. A. Leech, 732 N. 11th street.

6 slices halibut 1 inch thick.
1 small onion
1 clove garlic
2 cups strained canned tomatoes
2 tablespoons butter
1 bay leaf
1 teaspoon cayenne pepper
Salt

Wash halibut, sprinkle it slightly with salt, melt the butter in a frying pan and brown the onion and garlic finely minced in it. Add the tomato juice, bay leaf and pepper, let the mixture come to a boil and pour over the halibut, which should be placed in a baking pan. Set adjusted pointer at 425 degrees. Turn over bottom switch to high, and close circuit breaker. When circuit breaker opens, place halibut in oven. Reset adjustable pointer to 450 degrees and close circuit breaker. Bake to 1 1/2 hours.

Macaronized Salmon

1 cup macaroni
1 large can or 2 cups salmon
1/2 cup rich milk
Salt and pepper
1 tablespoon butter
2 hard cooked eggs

Left over broiled, baked or fried salmon may be used. Boil macaroni in salted water until tender. Drain and put into a greased baking dish. Add the salmon, which has been flaked and the bones and skin removed. Mix lightly together, add the milk and seasonings, dotting the butter over the top. Bake in a moderate oven (375 degrees F.) 15 minutes. Serve hot, garnish with sliced hard cooked eggs. Serves six.

Shrimp Tempura

1 cup flour
1 teaspoon salt
1-3 cup milk
1 egg
1 cup large shrimps

Sift flour, measure and sift again with salt, and milk gradually, then well beaten egg. Dip large shrimps in batter and fry until a golden brown in deep fat.

Salmon Puffs
Miss Roxella Hampton, 621 N. 11th street.

1 pound can salmon
1 tablespoon melted butter
1 teaspoon salt
1 teaspoon pepper
1 cup cracker crumbs
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1 egg (well beaten)

Remove the skin and bones from the salmon. Chop it fine. Mix in the butter, salt, pepper, and cracker crumbs. The lemon juice is not necessary, but it adds to the flavor of the salmon. Then add the egg and mix well. Pack in custard cups. Set in a shallow pan of hot water, as for custard. Bake 1 hour. Turn out on a platter of lettuce leaves.

Tuna Loaf
Mrs. L. L. Hendricks, 218 N. Second street.

1 large can of tuna fish
1 cup fresh bread crumbs
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1 teaspoon chopped green pepper
2 eggs
1 teaspoon paprika
1 teaspoon salt

Mix all the ingredients together well, picking fish apart with a silver fork. Mold into a firm loaf. Roll in flour and place in a greased bread-pan. Dot with butter, and bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Serve on a warm platter with the following sauce:

Sauce—One tablespoon butter, 1 cup milk, 2 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 egg-yolk, beaten. Melt the butter in a sauce pan. Add the flour and mix well. Slowly add the milk, stirring the mixture constantly. Cook for two minutes. Remove from the fire and add immediately the beaten yolk. Stir well. Pour the sauce around the fish loaf.

Purchase of Waymans, Inc., clothing store located at 833 Main street, was announced on Friday by B. L. Hardenbrook. The sale was completed on Thursday evening, and Hardenbrook took possession on Friday morning.
