Grandfather was seriously ill. Farmers and villagers who had stopped their work for the day increased the crowd outside the gates to the grounds when a royal servant took down the morning bulletin and posted the later statement containing the more alarming news.

One rugged-visaged Norfolk farmer, his face lit up by the sharp wind, said: "All we hope is the 'quiver' will have sufficient strength to rally and get well again, as he did before."

All the villagers recalled the king's former serious illness in 1923, which resulted from a chill contracted as he stood bareheaded before the London Cenotaph on Armistice day.

The first bulletin today read: "The anxiety expressed in the bulletin of last night persists."

Oxygen was brought to Sandringham house, the royal country estate and the king's favorite palace, yesterday, by Lord Dawson of Penn, who, with two other of the ruler's physicians spent the night in the palace, ready for instant call.

LUMBER TO OPEN WOODEN BOX DRIVE

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Illustrate the use of wooden boxes, and insist that all products shipped into the Klamath basin come in wooden containers. Results of the program will be made known to the men at all times, and it is planned to bring the full pressure of public opinion behind the move for use of wooden boxes.

The chairman and secretary of each plant committee will serve on the central committee.

The purpose, Watkins said, is to urge that all western heavy products be shipped in the natural western container—wooden boxes.

At Yakima, Watkins worked out a potato crate plan that proved successful. Thirty pound crates, with slats, were used.

If 50 per cent of the potatoes in the Klamath basin were put in wooden crates, Watkins said, it would use another 7,000,000 feet of low-grade lumber. If milk, heavy canned goods, and all the heavy western goods were to be shipped in wooden boxes, it would boost the local payroll \$1,000,000, he estimated.

KLAMATH REDUCES AUTO FATALITIES

Although several counties in Oregon reported heavy increases in number of deaths caused by automobile accidents, Klamath county reduced its traffic toll from 22 in 1934 to 14 in 1935.

This improved record, he said, has been an important factor in giving Oregon national recognition as a leader in street and highway safety. Based on latest national figures, Oregon ranks second in the country among states which have shown outstanding reductions in motor deaths.

"Every motorist in Klamath county deserves the commendation of safety leaders for entering into the spirit of the 'Let's Quit Killing' program and making an effort to eliminate serious accidents," the motor club official said. "A reduction of this sort offers a vast amount of impetus to safety work."

"It is encouraging to note that this reduction was made in spite of the fact that much of the driving in this county is over comparatively straight and open road, where motorists are tempted to speed and where the most serious accidents usually occur."

McDonald said that any de-

crease in number of traffic fatalities last year was doubly significant in view of a nation-wide increase. In Oregon, he pointed out, motorists apparently were becoming more and more intelligent in the operation of their machines, while in many other states drivers have not yet become "safety conscious."

"Since the Oregon State Motor association inaugurated its program of safety in September, 1934, motorists in this area have been co-operative. Records indicate quite definitely that they have responded to our request that they drive more thoughtfully, that they take time to be safe."

"We have now entered upon a new year, and it is only reasonable to believe that these motorists will continue to drive intelligently—continue to improve their living habits. It is not too much to expect a record-breaking reduction in traffic deaths during 1936."

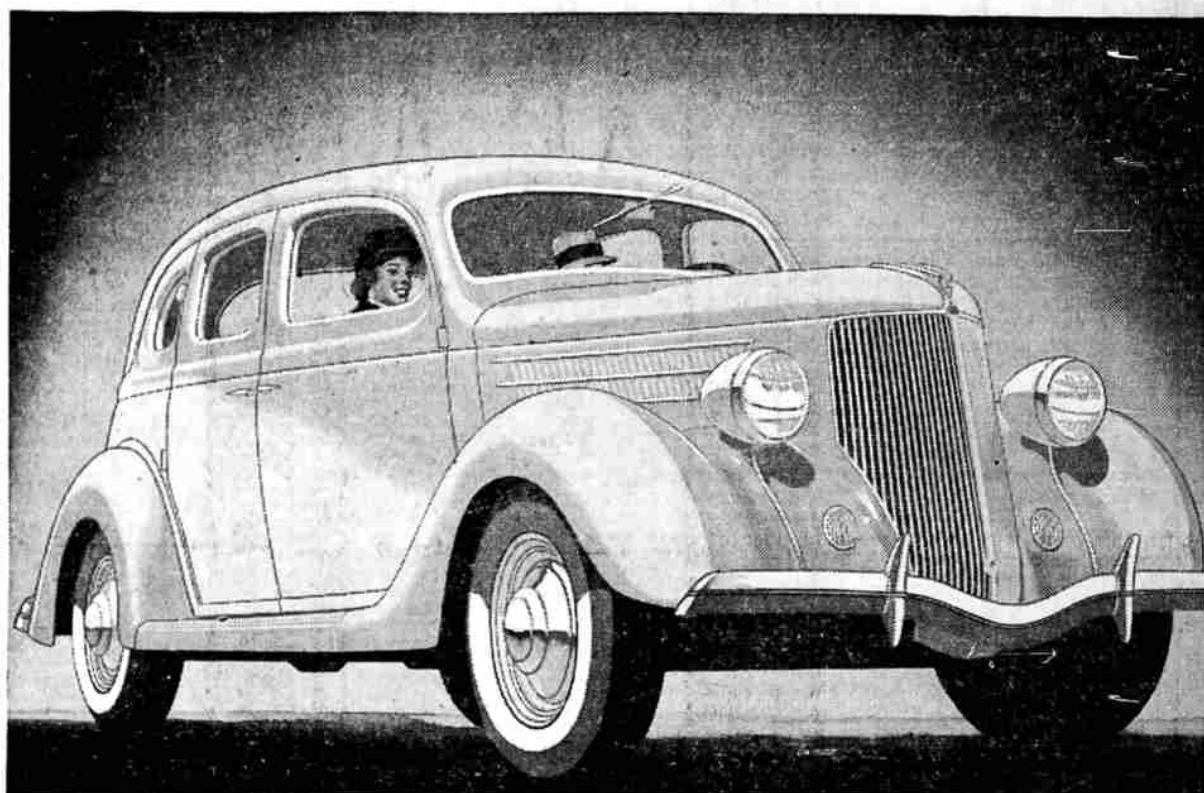
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
