Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 18, (AP)—Although the stock market did not encounter a great deal of stormy weather today, there were sufficient overhanging clouds to suppress the list as a whole.

Quiet selling predominated with losses ranging from fractions to around a point or more. The close was somewhat heavy. Transactions approximated 1,100,000 shares. Important support was lacking for many of the recent leaders.

Followers of the automobiles were not noticeably pleased with reports some manufacturers have shaded production, and others are contemplating curtailment over the next two weeks.

The utilities, railroads, metals and mines were backward. The mining section was still under the influence of yesterday's sharp cut in the imported bar silver rate.

Brokers' commentators, generally, spoke of the equities lack of leadership in the quietest division. The recent activity of low-priced issues also was not interpreted as especially bullish.

Many of the so-called "gilt edge" stocks have done little or nothing in the past few weeks, while shares selling for \$10.00 or less have provided the greater part of the volume. This was taken to mean, in some quarters, that investment buying has dried up to a considerable extent, while trading for quick profits has developed large proportions.

One reason advanced for the milling movements of various stock groups was the uncertainty concerning the Supreme Court decision, which may be announced Monday.
