RESERVOIR LEVEL RAISED BY RAINS

MERRILL, Jan. 18.—A rise of one foot of water in the reclamation storage reservoir near Merrill was reported Wednesday morning for the previous 12 hours by W. S. Smith, southeast watermaster, who expressed surprise that the rise did not double that after three days and nights of almost continuous rain.

The water level has registered a rise of 2.8 feet since January 10 with five feet to go before the reservoir reaches capacity. January precipitation records show the heaviest moisture since the same month in 1916, Smith stated.

No difficulty is as yet being experienced in caring for the excessive moisture. Gates are raised only enough to allow a reasonable escape of the flood waters into the sump and conditions while not hazardous, may easily become so in event the heavy fall of rain continues.

Situation of the flood waters that have covered leases owned by Cox and Haskins brothers remains much the same with the water spreading over an increasing number of acres through the big break. No immediate repair work is expected to be undertaken.

Government Agent Escapes Kidnaper

DALLAS, Texas, Jan. 18. (AP)—William C. Morgan, U. S. secret service agent, escaped today from an accused kidnaper, who kidnaped him last night.

CLUB DISCUSSES VARIOUS ISSUES

MERRILL, Jan. 18.—The proposed sewage disposal system, the need of improvement of the state highway within the city limits of Merrill, health conditions in the state of Oregon and local road conditions all came before the Service club Thursday noon. The session was presided over by the newly elected president, Thomas W. Chatburne.

Tom Laird has been appointed to contact state highway officials in connection with the possibility of procuring funds for improvement of the eight blocks of highway crossing the town. Some provision is made for distribution of state highway funds to be used inside city limits and immediate action is to be taken in an effort to interest officials in the local need.

Dr. F. E. Trotman read a pamphlet issued by the state board of health in which Oregon is rated as having the lowest infant mortality rate of any state in the union, due largely to the constant vigilance of the state health officers. Appropriation for the maintenance of this office is only 5 cents per capita. Trotman stated.

With the exception of one stream not named in the booklet, Oregon rivers are entirely free of sewage.

J. W. Scoggins brought to the attention of the members the condition of the road north from Dalton's store, with particular emphasis on a deep mud hole across the Great Northern tracks.

The members also voted to tender a luncheon to the Madras basketball squads who play Merrill Friday and Saturday night. The boys will be entertained Saturday noon.
