Beavers Prepare For Test

Oregon State Swing Into Four-game Schedule This Week. Oregon Faces Huskies in Conference Highlight This Week-end.

Oregon State, defending basketball champion of the northern division, swings into heavy duty this week. The Beavers, seeded out by the Oregon plants last Saturday, can either make or break their title hopes between Tuesday and Saturday.

Tuesday night the champions stand up against Washington State. The second game comes Wednesday. On Friday and Saturday, the second series with Idaho will be played at Moscow. Oregon State won both battles from the Vandals at Corvallis.

Pointing to L. H. Gregory's oft-repeated statement that no northern team losing more than four games has ever won the regional championship, Oregon State must play steady ball for the remainder of the long schedule.

Washington and Oregon stand squarely in the way of a successful defense, with the Cougars and the Vandals very apt to do damage at any time.

The big series of the week will be at Seattle between Oregon and Washington. The Huskies, listed among the favorites, have twice tripped Oregon State. Oregon holds one victory over the Orangemen and two over Idaho.

The Webfoots hold the leadership with three victories against two for the Huskies. Southern Oregon's Ward Howell, former Ashland and Southern Oregon Normal player, is leading the northern scorers. In three games, Howell has scored 37 points—almost 13 points each time he takes the floor.

KLAMATH LOSES BOTH CONTESTS

Saturday Night's Battle Goes to Tiger Team, 22 to 16.

A last half scoring duel between Giovanni, Pelican guard, and Lewis, Medford forward, ended in favor of the latter Saturday night on the local high school basketball floor. And by virtue of the Tiger star's success, plus a small half-time advantage, the Medford quintet was able to pull out with a second consecutive victory over the Klamath team.

Final score was 22 to 16. Giovanni started first. Hardly had the second half opened when he began to sink the ball from all corners of the floor. One-handed shots, set-ups, howitzers—he couldn't miss. By the end of the quarter he had dropped in 19 points, which, coupled with a foul shot by Putman, converted a Medford 7-3 halftime lead into a 14-11 Klamath advantage.

Wildcats Defeat Keno. Then Lewis had his innings. While the Pelicans watched helplessly, the Medford forward, who had been limited to a foul conversion on a single field goal up to that time, spent the entire last quarter in single-handedly reestablishing his team's supremacy, tallying five field goals in a brief 10-minute scoring spree. When the last whistle had blown, the record stood: Lewis 13, Giovanni 11. Medford 22, Klamath Falls 16.

In a preliminary engagement the Klamath Wildcats staged a flashing second half attack to defeat Keno, 27-14. At the midway point Keno led, 12-11.

Williamette University, which split week-end games with Southern Oregon Normal, meets Monday night at Salem tonight. Multnomah club at Portland Wednesday, and Sherman's Packers and Union Oil at Salem Friday and Saturday nights.

Pacific university and Linfield college meet at Forest Grove Friday in a Northwest conference game.

The Portland ice hockey team plays at Seattle Wednesday and Seattle plays at Portland Thursday night.

Frozen Body of Lost Boy Found

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Jan. 20 (AP)—Lying with his head on one arm in a childish attitude of sleep, 4-year old Roy Rogers was found frozen to death Saturday, two miles from the ranch home from which he wandered away Wednesday noon.

Discovery of the small body, with one shoe on and one shoe missing, ended the most intensive hunt in the history of southeastern Arizona, in which U. S. and Mexican army airplanes, a hundred soldiers from Fort Huachuca and hundreds of townspeople, ranchers and deputy sheriffs took part.

MERRILL BEATS MADRAS, 33-6

Klamath County Team in Decisive Victory Over Invaders.

MERRILL, Jan. 20.—The Merrill high school basketball team returned to the floor here Saturday night to crush Madras, 33-6, and score an intersectional victory even more thoroughgoing than its Friday night 29-71 defeat of the same opponent.

Merrill's point making was spread out evenly over the entire game. From the opening whistle it was apparent that the Jefferson county outfit never stood a chance, but the losers never gave up trying, although limited to one field goal for the whole encounter.

Scores at the half stood 13 to 3. Hawkins was in the vanguard of the Merrill attack, tallying a total of 10 points. D. W. Brookman, Merrill coach, in a post-game statement, said that the score was not indicative of the relative strength of the two teams. Spectators agreed that both tonight's contest and Friday night's game were among the most spectacular ever played on a Merrill floor.

SCORES ATTEND SNOW FROLIC OF MAIN EVENT

Crater Lake Park Event Draws Big Crowds on Sunday.

Scores of winter sports enthusiasts frolicked in the deep snow between government camp and the rim area in Crater Lake national park Sunday.

Klamath Snow Club members had arranged a special meeting which was held in the evening, attended by Mt. Shasta Snowmen, Bend Skyliners, Crater Lake Ski Clubbers, and the Classmen. Ski pictures, brought by the Skyliners, were shown to about 75 persons in the attic of the bunk-house.

Road is Cleared. Snowplows worked all Saturday night to put the south entrance road into shape, and dozens of cars sped into the park by this route Sunday morning. Most of the skiers made the trip from government camp to the rim, and the intervening expanse of snow was criss-crossed by ski trails by Sunday night.

It was a perfect day for skiing, and the park was unusually beautiful after the 25-day snow storm that set a new record up there. Many of the visitors had never been in the park before in winter time, and were unostentatious in their praise of its beauty and possibilities for winter sports.

The drive to government camp, from Fort Klamath, takes automobiles for miles between walls of snow that grow higher until, at government camp, they are nearly twice the height of the cars. Sunday the road to the rim was still closed beyond government camp, and the west entrance road, outside the park proper, was blocked by snow. This prevented Rogne Snowmen from attending the frolic.

Club Heads Present. Jere Gellis, president of the Skyliners, headed the Bend delegation. Delbert Denton, new president of the Crater Lake Ski club, was on hand with a number of the Crater Lake members.

The park service turned one of the bunkhouses over to the winter sportsmen. Coffee was provided by the Klamath Snow Club members, who have made promotion of winter travel into the park one of their main objectives, and sponsored the Sunday event to interest more people in using the park at this time of year.

Included in the Klamath visitors were members of the Klamath Union high school ski club. They had hoped to have a relay contest with representatives from the other clubs, but Medford, anticipated as the chief opposing team, could not reach the park by the west entrance.

Public May Block Refund of Taxes To Manufacturer

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (AP)—Secretary Wallace said Saturday he believed "public opinion would not tolerate" the refunds to manufacturers of \$1,000,000,000 paid in AAA processing taxes.

In his first press conference since the supreme court invalidated AAA, Wallace said the processing taxes have been passed on to the consumer. He added that the \$200,000,000 impounded under court injunctions was in the same status as the \$1,000,000,000 paid into the treasury, so far as the consumer was concerned.

In the rice millers case, the supreme court directed that the impounded taxes should be returned to the taxpayer. Attorney General Cummings has under consideration the possibility of asking the high court to review this opinion.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20. (AP)—Class "B" basketball teams will have a championship playoff of their own while competing with "A" schools in the state basketball tournament.

This was decided Saturday at a meeting of the control board of the Oregon High School Athletic association with a representative of Willamette university, where the tournament will be held March 18, 19, 20 and 21.

The teams from the four "B" districts were placed in the upper quarter of the 16-entry bracket. The winner will be known as state "B" champion, and continue into the quarter-finals of the regular tournament.

Dean of Southern Football Passes Suddenly Sunday

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Jan. 20. (AP)—Death has closed the career of Daniel Earl McGugin, "Grand Old Man of Southern Football" and Vanderbilt's head coach for three decades. He was 56 years old.

McGugin died unexpectedly Sunday of a heart attack while visiting John R. Aust, his law partner. The funeral was set tentatively for Tuesday.

McGugin's death cast a pall of gloom over Dixie universities as he was dean of the south's football coaches. Born on an Iowa farm, he was a graduate of the University of Michigan law school and a member of the great "Point-a-Minute" teams of Ann Arbor.

McGugin came south in 1904 to take over the football coaching post at Vanderbilt. He held that position for 31 years and several years ago added to it that of athletic director. His first commodity team in 1904 swept aside eight opponents for an undefeated season. One of his proudest accomplishments was in holding Michigan to a 6-0 tie in 1922 when that team was coached by his old mentor, fielding H. Yost. He also scored notable intersectional victories over Minnesota, Ohio State and Carleton.

He handed the active coaching reins over to Ray Morrison after the completion of the 1934 season, retaining his title of athletic director, in order to devote more time to his law practice and because he thought he had "served long enough." His life was filled with many honors, one of which was the presidency of the National Football Coaches' association in 1933. Surviving are his widow and three children, Mrs. Pugh C. Moore, Dan E. McGugin, Jr., a member of his father's law firm, and Leonard McGugin, student in the Vanderbilt law school.
