

BULLETIN SAYS KING GEORGE'S DEATH AT HAND

he apparently was maintaining his strength.

The physician's bulletin was signed by Dr. Frederick J. Williams, Dr. R. Stanley Hewitt, apothecary to his majesty, and Lord Dawson of Penn, physician in ordinary.

Many villagers gathered. It was considered the most serious illness since Friday night's statement which first revealed that the king was in a critical condition with a weakening heart.

The 6:30 p. m. bulletin was the first time since Saturday afternoon that a mention had been made of the king's losing strength.

The announcement was quickly posted on the "Jubilee Gate" at Sandringham house.

Many villagers, returning to their homes from work, clustered tightly to read the word.

The news soon spread into the village of Dersingham. Many of the townspeople started walking up the hill to gather at the gates of the king's residence to await further information.

Privy Council Called. The sovereign's privy council, summoned from London, met in an apartment adjoining the royal sick room and appointed the members of the council of state while the 70-year-old king entered a possibly decisive stage of his sickness.

It was officially stated that the council of state consists of Queen Mary and four royal sons, the Prince of Wales, and the Duke of York, Gloucester, and Kent.

The appointment of the council of state followed a special meeting of the privy council in the sitting room adjoining the king's chamber.

To attend the privy council session, Ramsay MacDonald, lord president of the council, and other members had come from London this morning.

In accordance with constitutional procedure, the door between the sitting room and the sick room was open with a member of the council standing at the portal so that the monarch was able to hear the voices of the conferees in the next room.

At the end of the brief privy council session, Lord Dawson of Penn, physician in ordinary to the king, himself a member of the council, took the state paper to the royal bedside, gave the monarch a pen, and stood silently while the royal signature was written.

The paper bearing the signature, "George R. I." was handed to Sir Maurice Hankey, secretary of the council, who was charged with taking it to London.

BIG STORMS TAKE HEAVY TOLL OF LIFE

Many schools were ordered closed today.

Traffic generally was impeded seriously. Many airports were closed and planes grounded. Railroads ran far behind schedule. In many cities trolleys were blocked by snow and automobile traffic virtually was halted. Main highways were reported open to traffic but few secondary roads were passable in the midwest.

Heavy snows and rain in some southern states brought a new menace from floods and rivers and streams rose sharply.

Several ships were in distress. The S. S. City of Camden went aground near Pennsylvania, N. J., but its 70 passengers were brought ashore safely. Another steamer, the S. S. Ipswich, reported aground near Panama City, Fla., was reported in no immediate danger.

Barge Sinks in Harbor. A barge sunk in New York harbor and three fishing boats were reported missing from Tampa, Mexico. Eleven men were reported drowned in the sinking of one. Four men also were reported missing and believed drowned on a fishing tug near Kenosha, Wis., and three other fishermen refused to leave their tug near the son in Michigan.

Motorists reported a large west off Point Mugu, Calif. Property damage was reported at more than a million from tornado, freezing and fires.

In addition to those reported missing in ships searching parties were out for an aviator reported in Wyoming and for a child in Massachusetts. In New Jersey an automobile carrying six youths plunged into a river when the driver was blinded by snow.

Snow drifts were reported between 12 and 15 feet deep in several sections. The Rocky mountain sections were buried under deeper than normal snows. Pittsburgh had 4 1/2 inches of snow within 24 hours. North Adams, Mass., in the Berkshires, 24 inches and most of the upper midwestern sections from 8 to 18 inches.

Tornadoes claimed 18 lives in Florida, Georgia and Alabama; six persons were frozen to death; seven died from over-exertion; three were burned to death; two died from carbon monoxide fumes and 19 others from unreported causes.

NAVY DEPARTMENT CONTRACT GIVEN

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (AP)—

The navy department announced today the award of a contract to the Douglas Aircraft company of Santa Monica, Calif., for the purchase of 114 new torpedo-bombing planes at a cost of \$3,638,000.

The planes, known as "TBD" type, will be low winged monoplane. The navy department said they will have markedly greater speed and considerably greater range as well as many other improved features over previous types of this class.

The new combat ships are intended for service with the navy's aircraft carriers.

The contract also specified a certain quantity of spare parts.

It was awarded after competition among several firms in design, flight performance, and open-competitive bidding.

HIGHWAY MEETING SET NEXT MONTH

SALEM, Jan. 20 (AP)—The state highway commission will convene in Portland February 6 and 7, for a two-day job-letting session, it was announced today by H. B. Glaisyer, secretary.

The large Union avenue viaduct project in Portland, estimated to cost in excess of half a million dollars, will not be on the list of jobs to be let at this session, Glaisyer declared. The job will perhaps be let at the March meeting, and will be the largest contract to be awarded by the highway commission outside the five coast bridges.

R. H. Baldock, highway engineer, stated the contracts for the Pendleton and Salem under-cro-

ings, for which bids were received earlier this month, may be awarded within the next few days.
