Oregon, California and Eastern Railroad company versus Alvaro N. Beals et al. Plaintiff asks for a court order requiring defendants to set forth their claims to certain parcels of Klamath county property to which plaintiff claims ownership; and for a decree adjudging defendants to have no interest in said pieces of property, other than possible ownership of an underlying fee, and barring defendants from asserting any claim to the properties adverse to plaintiff's right and easement. Western Loan and Building company versus Wilson H. Todd et al. 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"Wood to Burn"
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Klamath Production Credit Bureau Issues Encouraging Report; Officers Reelected

Stockholders of the Klamath Production Credit association in annual meeting Saturday, were gratified to learn that the local association had accomplished more than similar organizations. This comparison was presented by Joe Bradley, treasurer of the Production Credit association of Spokane, in the principal address of the morning, "Operation of the Farm Credit Association."

More than 100 stockholders, and about 20 4-H club members, were in attendance at the meeting, which was called to order in the banquet room of the Elk hotel by William Kittredge, president.

The meeting was opened by Kittredge, who presented an address of welcome to stockholders. As climax to the day's meeting, members of the association present reelected U. E. Reeder, E. A. Geary and William G. Lane as directors of their organization for three-year terms. Holdover board members not up for reelection this year are William Kittredge, E. M. Hammond, A. R. Campbell and Ned Sherlock.

Following adjournment of the general meeting, the seven directors went into executive session at the offices of the K. P. C. A. and reappointed for another year the officers who guided the association during 1935. Besides Kittredge and McMullen, these are E. M. Hammond, vice-president, and A. R. Campbell, second vice-president.

McMullen Reports
Lee S. McMullen, secretary-manager of the K. P. C. A., presented the annual report of operations of the association, and U. E. Reeder presented the report of the board of directors.

Clifford Jenkins, county 4-H club agent, spoke in behalf of clubs and club members, and expressed thanks to the stockholders for a set of scales, which they will present to Klamath county clubs in the near future as a result of a unanimous vote Saturday morning.

R. G. Johnson, professor of animal husbandry, and in charge of range experimental farms at Oregon State college, was one of the important speakers of the morning session, and others introduced were Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, and Fred Sankey, head of predatory animal control for the state.

Diseases Discussed
Dr. Lytle addressed the assembly following a noon adjournment for lunch. He discussed eradication of disease in livestock, with special reference to the Bang's disease tests and control measures undertaken in Klamath county during the past year.

Lytle also reported on the cattle poisoning investigation which he conducted at the Liskey ranch a week ago. His findings, that the deaths were caused by grasshopper poison, were substantiated by the use of wooden boxes, and insist that all products shipped into the Klamath basin come in wooden containers. Results of the program will be made known to the men at all times, and it is planned to bring the full pressure of public opinion behind the move for use of wooden boxes.

The chairman and secretary of each plant committee will serve on the central committee.

The purpose, Watkins said, is to urge that all western heavy products be shipped in the natural western container—wooden boxes.

At Yakima, Watkins worked out a potato crate plan that proved successful. Thirty pound crates, with slats, were used. If 50 per cent of the potatoes in the Klamath basin were put in wooden crates, Watkins said, it would save another 7,000,000 feet of low-grade lumber. If milk, heavy canned goods, and all the heavy western goods were to be shipped in wooden boxes, it would boost the local payroll \$1,000,000, he estimated.

Evauna committee has held an organization meeting already. Kesterson employees have also organized, and on Monday night Launa employees will shape their plans for helping in the campaign. Tuesday afternoon Police Bay workers will meet, and Tuesday night men and women from the Evauna plant will meet to put the plan before housewives.

One feature of the Yakima campaign was the construction of a huge sign on the hill near the town, reading "Use Wooden Boxes."
