

HUNDREDS OF AUTO-MINDED TO SEE SHOW

Several thousand automobile-minded citizens of Klamath county will attend the big auto show at the armory opening Thursday night and running through Saturday.

Already the ticket sale has reached 1,000. With interest unexpectedly keen, the managers declared the event would be the biggest of its kind in southern Oregon.

Automobile dealers of the city will display 24 models for 1936. The brilliantly polished machines will make a spectacular array under the lights of the armory.

The allied industries of the automobile trade and many other business and industrial firms of the section will offer exhibits in connection with the show. Thirteen wall booths will be available. The booths are so constructed they will not detract from the floor space of the big drill hall.

Special entertainment will be one of the features of the show.

Oscar Peyton, head of the interclub relations committee of the Kiwanis club here, said plans are under way for sending the pelican to the Portland district to stimulate visiting there.

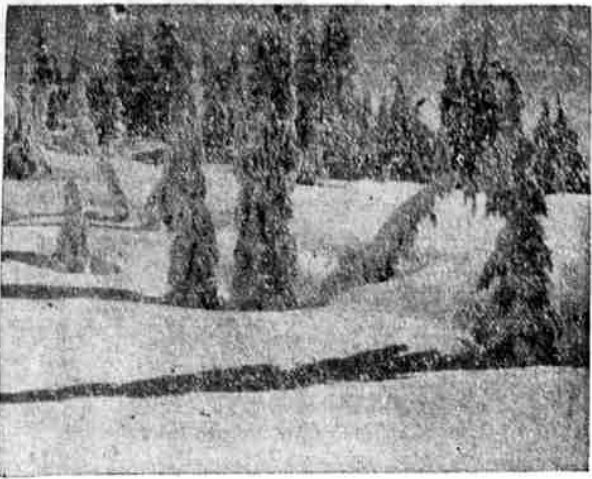

BAKER, Jan. 20. (AP)—Applications for grazing land permits under the Taylor grazing act in Baker county are expected to total 300.

ASTORIA, Jan. 20. (AP)—City officials and representatives of bondholders were in agreement today on plans for refunding the city's bonded indebtedness in accordance with the previous agreement.

Details were withheld pending signature to the contract by all members of the city bondholders' protective committee.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20. (AP)—Oliver Edward Wesche, 59, of Portland, died Sunday from injuries received when struck by a car. A. F. Von Hansen, 37, of Vancouver, was listed as the driver of the car that struck Wesche as he prepared to board a streetcar.

EUGENE, Jan. 20. (AP)—Dr. Waldo J. Adams, 57, Eugene dentist who died of heart attack at the Oregon-Oregon State basketball game here Friday night, served with distinction in the dental corps of the Spanish war and was awarded a citation by General John J. Pershing, commanding the American troops in France.

ST. HELENS, Jan. 20. (AP)—The C. R. McCormick Lumber company purchased the old Knights of Pythias building adjoining the company's dock here, for \$2200, to make possible enlargement of the dock.

The building, which has not been used for several years, was given to the Sawmill and Timber Workers' union, with provision it be torn down or moved. The union is looking for a site for constructing a hall with the lumber.

PORTLAND, Jan. 20. (AP)—Dr. Harry C. Randie, 70, native of Salem, a graduate of the University of Oregon and the Will-

lamette university medical department, died here Sunday. He practiced at Nehalem for many years, and in 1917 went to Alaska in charge of hospitals under the United States bureau of education for several years.

PORTLAND, Jan. 19. (AP)—An 18-week course in Japanese language will be offered at the Oregon Institute of Technology here starting February 4.

Rudyard Kipling Will Be Buried in Westminster Abbey

LONDON, Jan. 20. (AP)—Rudyard Kipling is going to rest in the poet's corner at Westminster Abbey.

The noted author, who died Saturday morning, five days after he underwent an emergency operation for a perforated stomach ulcer, will be buried Thursday in that last resting place of Britain's famous sons.

The Very Rev. William Foxley Norris, dean of Westminster, announced the funeral service would be held at noon.

"Burial in the poet's corner at Westminster Abbey is a high honor, but not too high an honor for one of the most influential personalities of the time and a unique figure in English literature," the Times said in an editorial.

JUDGE DEMANDS BOY GO TO SCHOOL

Judge Ashurst struck a blow at the practice of truancy from school, Saturday, when in no uncertain terms he informed two reservation parents that their boy would be taken away from them

if they did not make it a point to see that he attended school, unless the boy became physically incapacitated.

Wade Crawford, reservation superintendent, John Arkell, Indian officer, and Glenn Hale, principal of the Chiloquin grade schools, each told of their several and united efforts to persuade the boy to attend the public school, and of the lack of cooperation given by the parents.

The judge gave no decision, nor was the boy taken away from

his parents, but Judge Ashurst made it very clear that the case was merely continued, and for the personal good of the boy, he proposed to see that he attended school as he should, and that unless this was done, disciplinary action would be taken without delay.

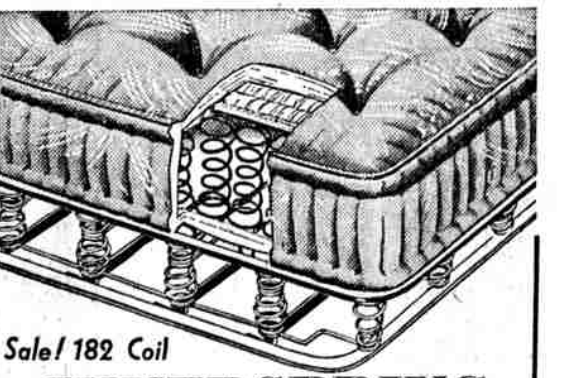

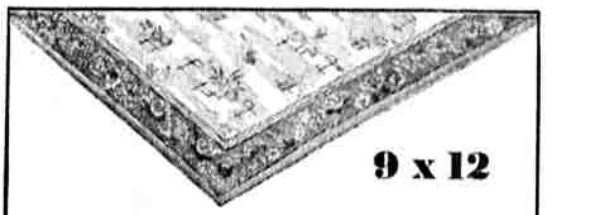
