Malin's Dominance in Athletics

School Captures Seven Titles in Football for Past Nine Years. Nearly 100 per cent Turnout of Boys for Grid Squad.

The football season has been officially dead for two weeks or more, but before it is forgotten altogether it would be well to offer a final word of praise for Roland Parks and his Malin high school team.

Malin won the championship of the Klamath-Siskiyou conference. That in itself is no exceptional accomplishment, but the fact that Malin has taken that title seven times out of nine years the league has been organized is worth more than merely a passing remark.

Roland Parks, former University of Oregon student, has never finished less than a tie for first place since becoming the Malin coach.

What is even more unusual at Malin is the very small number of boys in the high school. Unbeaten and untied in conference games through vigorous 1935 schedule, Malin played the entire season with a squad of only 27 players.

There were 27 players on the squad; there were only 29 boys in the entire school.

It would be pretty hard to find another school in the country with such a close approach to a 100 per cent representation.

Parks asserts that Malin has never lost a game to a "B" league school since the league was formed.

Malin is indeed athletically minded. Not only has the school walked off with major football honors for many years, but its basketball championships have been frequent. The teams produced there have been leading contenders every year.

Lloyd Waner of Pittsburgh III With Pneumonia

OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 21 (AP)—Lloyd Waner, outfielder for the Pittsburgh Pirates, was seriously ill with pneumonia today, but his physician reported there was no immediate cause for alarm.

The physician, Dr. Leonard C. Williams, described his condition as satisfactory, "considering the nature of the illness," said the crisis was due today or tonight. Previously Waner's condition had been described as "critical."

"We will know definitely today," said Dr. Williams who reported pneumonia had settled in the left lung after the infection had been cleared up in the right lung.

Mrs. Waner said her husband "had not been in very good health for some time," adding she believed he had contracted a cold while attending a hockey game here.

Although Mrs. Waner asked relatives not to summon the outfielder's brother, Paul, from Sarasota, Fla., friends were reported to have urged him to come.

Waner went into major league baseball in 1926, after playing in the Pacific Coast league and with Columbia in the Sally league. Paul, already with the Pirates, was nicknamed "Big Poison." Waner and Lloyd became known as "Little Poison."

Bike Rider Gains Weight In Races

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21, (AP)—An iron-nerved bike rider can gain weight during the six day merry-go-round that cyclists go in for, says Franz Duellberg.

The young German who started today at the head of the pack going "round and round" here, says he always does.

"I weighed 155 pounds Sunday afternoon before the start," he said. "At the end of the race I'll weigh 160 or 162. My face will be drawn but my legs and arms will be thicker. The muscular development accounts for the gain."

"Some other riders gain weight. These who are high strung lose because of nervous exhaustion."

It's not the legs that get tired, Duellberg insists, but the neck and back.

CHICK, TAYLOR MEET TONIGHT

Cowboy From Wyoming to Tackle Young Wrestler From Ohio.

The budding headlocks of Cowboy Dude Chick and the flying tackle attack of Frank Taylor take the lead in the prospects of wrestling action at the armory tonight.

Chick and Taylor will headline a triple main event card beginning at 8:30.

Although he has appeared but once before at the armory, the Wyoming rodeo rider has reached popularity often never gained by grapplers appearing here more frequently. His one-sided victory over Ken Hollis of Arkansas a week ago has set him up as the dominant grappler of the season.

Specializing in three holds—the bulldog head lock and the airplane spin and scissors, Chick stood forth as a favorite against the young Taylor from Toledo, Ohio.

Taylor, however, was by no means an underdog. His reputation for a hard charging, fast style of offense will make him a threat throughout the entire 60 minutes of wrestling. The Ohio athlete will weigh in at 200 pounds. His attack is based primarily on the Sonnenberg tackle and the Savoldi dropkick.

The ratings were even for the windup event when Frank Peck of San Francisco meets Shinku Shikuma in a mixed style wrestling. The Australian round system will be divided between catch-as-catch-can and Ju Jitsu. Each grappler holds one previous victory over the other.

Wiffy Cox Wins Prize Money In Sacramento Open

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 21, (AP)—Wiffy Cox proved today a seven on a par-four hole should never discourage a golfer.

Cox had such a hole yesterday and still beat Wild Bill Mehlhorn of Louisville, Ky., in a play-off for \$750 first money in the Sacramento open golf tournament but he had to shoot an eagle three to do it.

The Bethesda, Md., professional, suffered a seven on the 131-yard fourth hole after hooking his second shot into a hedge. He came back on the 645-yard thirteenth to hole a 75-yard approach for his eagle.

Mehlhorn, tied with Cox at 256 strokes at the end of 72 holes Sunday, struggled along almost even with the former but to that point and although he tried gallantly thereafter, doing his best to sink an ace at the short eighteenth, he never caught up.

The play-off ended with Cox shooting a 764, two over par, against 77 for Mehlhorn, whose putter frequently failed him.

Cox made victory doubly sure by holing a 25-foot putt for a duce on the par three eighteenth, where Mehlhorn refused to tee off until the referee stood at the flag to pull it should his shot even out-do Cox's great approach at the 18th.

Wild Bill hit his tee shot on the 115-yard hole within 12 feet of the pin but could not sink his first putt.

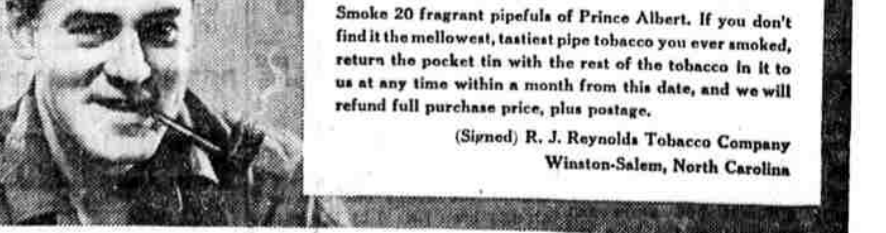
