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National and Local Markets

NO CHANGES MADE ON GRAIN MARKET

CHICAGO, Jan. 21. (AP)—With speculative and commercial interest at a low ebb, grain values made no important change today.

Wheat futures held within a very small trading range, the May delivery continuing to fluctuate narrowly around the dollar mark, at which prices there was some buying credited to mills. Rain likely to delay threshing in Argentina were reported, and so too was some apprehension lest any change to colder weather in Europe might cause crop damage.

Wheat closed steady, unchanged to 1/2 lower compared with yesterday's finish, May 1935-36 High, corn 3/4 down, May 59 1/2-60, oats unchanged to 1/4 higher, and provisions varying from 2 cents decline to an equal gain.

ADJUSTMENT MADE IN BUTTER PRICE

PORTLAND, Jan. 21. (AP)—A half cent cut in prime first butter quotations on the exchange was regarded as an adjustment of quality value. Butterfat remained unchanged.

While the only price change for eggs on the exchange was a loss of 1¢ in medium standards, there was continued price slacking on the open market with many farmers peddling to retailers and creating further weakness.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 21. (AP)—Many prices trickled lower today and in the quietest stock market in more than a month.

A few divisons, such as aircrafts, metals and sugars, found a following at slightly better levels at times, but the majority of leaders slipped down fractions, and a few as much as a point or so.

The closing tone was about steady. Transactions in the stock exchange totaled around 1,400,000 shares.

The cessation of London financial dealings and the short hours adopted by important commodity markets here tended to keep trading to a minimum. A narrow lower range was the rule.

Cotton was ahead 20 to 35 cents a bale at the earlier closing, while wheat was unchanged to 1/2 of a cent a bushel lower, and corn surrendered 1/2 to 1/4 of a cent. Bonds were quiet and mixed. Leading foreign currencies were steady against the dollar.

Losers of fractions to better than a point included American Telephone, Du Pont, Union Pacific, General Motors and Consolidated Gas.

Santa Fe, Phelps Dodge, U. S. Smelting, Seaboard Oil, International Nickel, Southern Pacific, Douglas, and United Aircraft gained up to a point or so.
