KING EDWARD SPORT PATRON

New Monarch Famous World Over for Keen Interest in Games.

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. (AP)—The all-around sportsman who now rules the vast domain as Edward VIII ranks among the most enthusiastic if not also the best of all royal exponents of the royal and ancient game of golf.

His interests in sport cover a wide range from horse racing and polo to boxing and tennis, but over the past decade his personal prowess has been most conspicuous on the links and his golfing associations have helped most to increase his international popularity.

Admired American Stars Edward's concentration upon golf coincided with the appeal of his parents to forego the hazards of riding, cross country or on the polo fields. Every time the prince had a spill or met with some minor mishap while in the saddle the royal household experienced a chill.

Edward took most of his golfing lessons from such British professionals as Ted Ray and Archie Compston. He welcomed advice in several friendly matches, from the American veteran, Walter Hagen. He was a great admirer of "The Hag" as well as of Bob Jones, with whom he played in 1930, the year the Georgian was on his way to the "grand slam."

Later Edward remarked to friends that he thought Jones' feat never would be duplicated. Two years ago at Prestwick, the prince visited with Lawson Little, the Californian who now rules the amateur golf world.

The prince's recovery from a trap, on the last hole, was a factor in enabling him and Jones to finish all square with R. (Jimmy) Johnston, then the American amateur champion, and Sir Victor Sassoon in their friendly foursome at Sunningdale six years ago.

Praise Pleased King It was in connection with that match that O. B. Keeler, famous American golf writer and chronicler of Jones' deeds, recalls the interview the prince gave on golf a few days later, which was cabled to America then cabled back again after a British news agency obtained permission from the Associated Press to republish it.

At the Walker cup matches at Sandwich, Keeler told the prince, "It was your good play and not Bobby's that squared that match."

AIRPLANE SPIN WINS FOR DUDE

Taylor Given Dizzy Ride; Frankie Peck Downs Japanese.

A sick young man from Toledo, Ohio, rests at his hotel sorrowfully contemplating a long, dizzy ride through the air at the dizzy last night on the broad shoulders of Wyoming's cowboy-wrestler.

For the second time in as many wrestling cards here, Dude Chick, veteran wrestler, spun his way to victory. The victim last night was Frank Taylor, a newcomer to Mack Lillard's programs.

Hollis' Fate Recalled The same fate that befell rowdy Ken Hollis of Arkansas a week ago came to young Taylor. Wrestling on even terms with the cowboy for 31 minutes, Taylor was caught up on the shoulders of his opponent and given a sickening airplane spin in the center of the ring.

He was dumped to the floor, ill and through for the night. His seconds packed him from the ring when he was unable to get up and continue the match.

Chick's one-fall victory represented one of the best matches since the sport was transferred from the old Legion hall to the armory. With both wrestlers fighting aggressively, there was action in every one of the 31 minutes.

Taylor Has Stamina Taylor displayed remarkable stamina. He came up from every one of Chick's vicious holds—every one but the last. He broke an Indian deadlock that seemed destined to bring a fall. He pulled out of a series of bulldog headlocks and survived a half dozen airplane scissors.

It was by no means clear sailing for the cowboy. Time after time the athlete from Wyoming was trapped between Taylor's iron-like legs. More than once he fell into a painful wristlock. Taylor's toughest Somerseting rushes and Savoldi dropkicks, however, never materialized.

Peck Wins Again Frankie Peck of San Francisco today holds a one-match edge over Shmueli Shikuma of Japan. The men have met three times. Twice the victory has gone to Peck. He claims to be the only wrestler in America who has won from the Japanese in a mixed match.

Heaton punched his way to a fall in the second round, and Kazanjian used a "hammer throw" hold to even the score in the third. Heaton took the deciding fall with a body press in the fourth. Heaton weighed 235, Kazanjian 216 pounds.

Dave Johnson, 208, Duluth, Minn., and Chief Thunderbird, Vancouver Island Indian, each took a fall to draw in the five-round semi-final. Lynn Nelson, Port Lewis 167-pounder, lost on a foul to Billy Van Damme, 165, of Wenatchee, Wash., in the opener. Each had a fall when Nelson was disqualified for hitting and choking in the fifth round.

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
