BIRTHDAY BALL PLANS FORMED

President Roosevelt's birthday will be celebrated in Klamath Falls, as well as in 5,000 other cities throughout the United States, Thursday evening, Jan. 30, at the third annual President's Ball to be held at the Klamath armory.

George Ford is to be general chairman in charge of arrangements; Dewey Powell in charge of music and dancing; Paul Landry, ticket sales; and Elbert S. Veatch, publicity.

Radio talks boosting the dance will be presented by the Rev. Hale B. Eubanks, rector of St. Paul's church. Announcements are to be made at all service club meetings.

The President's Ball is the rallying point for all those who wish to help stamp out infantile paralysis, and the purpose of the event is to create funds with which to help victims of the disease.

The president has approved the suggestion that 70 per cent of the proceeds raised by each local birthday ball be retained in the community to be disbursed to local or adjacent hospital, or for the treatment of local infantile paralysis cripples, as the local committee decide. This is of particular interest in Klamath county, as an epidemic of the dread disease broke out in the Keno district last fall.

Thirty per cent of the proceeds will be turned over to the national committee for delivery to the president to be presented by him to the Georgia Warm Springs foundation for the continuation and extension of its part in the national fight against infantile paralysis.

EDWARD BARRED FROM COMMONS

PROPERTY RECORDS FOUND INCOMPLETE

TULELAKE CAHNS—Incomplete records of ownership of Tulelake property will delay plans for immediate incorporation of the townsite of Tulelake. It was revealed at the first January meeting of the Tulelake Community club by Attorney Walter W. Chandler, Tulelake, who is representing the club.

Chandler in his report stated that more than half the property owners of the town who are eligible to sign the petition to be presented to Shastah county supervisors for approval for the move to incorporate have failed to record their original government patents or deeds.

Since the assessment roll in Shastah county is made up the first Monday in March, Chandler hopes to contact all owners within the next two months who are eligible to sign the petition in an effort to get deeds recorded before that time. Twenty-five names of the total of property owners are necessary for signing before the petition can be presented.

Sentiment in Tulelake is generally in favor of the move although some fears are expressed that taxes within the city may reach an alarming figure. This is disproved however by the fact that with adequate fire protection available the drop in insurance will offset any taxes levied in the future.

Buildings and restrictions have also been taken under consideration as well as sewage disposal problems, all of which will be placed on property in event the town is incorporated. Under the present townsite no restrictions of any kind are levied.

Some discussion of the re-filling of Lower Klamath Lake for a bird refuge came before the members with the club pledging co-operation with the Shasta-Cascade-Wonderland association in an effort to accomplish the project.

The meeting Monday night was small due to the increasing difficulties of travel. Settling of the newly completed strip of Alturas-Tulelake feeder highway is making travel over that stretch of road also a problem. While the entire road is in fair condition a number of holes are proving a menace to motorists.

GEORGE WEST, 92, DIES IN PORTLAND

George West, 92, father of Walter West of Klamath Falls, died Tuesday, January 21, at the Portland sanitarium after a brief attack of pneumonia. His son left Tuesday evening for Portland to attend funeral services.

George West was born in Market Weighton, Yorkshire, England, September 10, 1843. He came to the United States in 1890, and settled in Kentucky, coming to Portland in 1906, and making his home there since that time, with the exception of a few years spent in California.

His wife, Frances West, died in May 1929, at the age of 83. They were the parents of 13 children, nine of whom are now living. Mr. West is also survived by 43 grandchildren and 20 great-grandchildren.

He enjoyed visiting in Klamath Falls, and spent many weeks of each year with his son and family at their home on South River-ade avenue.

He was a contractor and builder by profession, in which he was active until after he was 80 years old. For the last several years he had made an annual trip to Illinois and Kentucky to visit sons who reside there. He also leaves a sister in Nebraska, and many relatives in England. Funeral services will be held Thursday afternoon at the Portland crematorium.
