Four Bodies Taken from Mine Debris

LOUISVILLE, Col., Jan. 22. (UP)—Four bodies were removed Tuesday from Monarch coal mine No. 2 in which eight men were trapped early Monday in an explosion. Rescuers tonight had not yet reached four other victims of the explosion, who also were believed to have been killed.

Bodies of seven men also were found in part of the mine known as "The Big Parting," where several tunnels branch. Mine officials said they believed the bodies of the four men still unaccounted for would be near the place where the bodies of the men were unearthed from under 15 feet of debris.

Fire Hits Grand Coulee Townsite

GRAND COULEE, Wash., Jan. 22. (UP)—The mushroom town that boomed with the construction of Grand Coulee dam was threatened Tuesday as a \$750,000 fire cleaned out a half block of the business district.

The fire started in a faulty flue and gutted two frame buildings before volunteer firemen, aided by a dead calm, conquered it.

News of Oregon

MEDFORD, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Physicians said today John Pernell, Applegate storekeeper who was wounded by a bandit two weeks ago, is now out of danger. No clues to his assailant have been uncovered, the sheriff's office reported.

NORTH BEND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Vern C. Gost, operating the Gost Air Transport company of Bremerton and Seattle, said plans are underway to extend an airline from Coos Bay to Oakland, Calif., in March. Gost said he would affiliate with an airline company which proposed to obtain air rights from Vancouver, Wash., to Bandon and Coos Bay within the near future.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—A walnut, one of a stock purchased at a Portland grocery by Mrs. Helen Burton, contained a note: "Alvin Martinson, Valley, Neb. friend please write." The grocer said the nut came from the Dundee, Ore., area and speculated Martinson probably was employed in the harvest there.

"Surely I'll write, but I'll tell him I'm married," Mrs. Burton smiled.

NORTH BEND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Work on development of the North Bend airport under a \$10,000 federal fund will begin Monday, weather permitting, work progress officials here said.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—The Marshfield city council voted to advertise for bids immediately for the proposed city dock. Construction is contingent upon approval of a \$10,000 bond issue up for vote Jan. 31. Action taken for bids was taken upon recommendation of C. C. Hockley, PWA administrator for Oregon.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—E. J. Griffith, state WPA administrator, said he was informed Controller General Samuel H. Hays had approved the WPA's recommendation for construction of the Wolf Creek and Wilson River short-routes because of WPA regulations barring WPA funds from use in highway construction.

"WPA has now exhausted every means to obtain funds for the construction of these roads. The only recourse is a congressional act to permit use of WPA funds on federal aid highways," Griffith said.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—A method to assure an annual sustained forest yield and cut essential to some smaller Oregon communities are to be permanent. C. J. Buck of Portland, regional forester, told a group of Corvallis business men.

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Mill City, Salem and Albany residents in session at Mill City took action toward establishment of the Co-operative Corporation of Stockholders and Mill Workers—an organization designed to operate a co-operative sawmill at Mill City to take the place of the dismantled Hammond mill which provided a livelihood for many residents of that area.

Proponents, led by P. J. Smith, said \$20,000 had been subscribed locally for the project and that plans were afoot to purchase a mill at Astoria for \$6,000 for removal to Mill City.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—The eleven persons arrested for carrying banners near a dock here during a reception for the German cruiser Emden will have a hearing Jan. 29 before Municipal Judge D. E. Long. They were released on their own recognizance.

EUGENE, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Damage to recreational on the Willamette river in this area amounted to approximately 18 per cent, federal engineers reported after a survey following recent high waters.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Fred Aandahl, Portland again head of Oregon chapter of the American Institute of Architects, as a result of last night's election. Carl P. Gould, Seattle, architectural adviser for the state capital, was an honor guest.

ALBANY, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—A will filed here showed that E. Maude Henderson, who died Dec. 31, bequeathed her residential property here to the city of Albany for a park, on condition it be known as the Henderson place. Other bequests included: Christian Missionary Convention, Portland, \$500; Riverside Cemetery Association, Albany, \$500; Boys and Girls' Aid Society, Portland, \$250; Florence Crittenton Refuge Home, Portland, \$250.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22. (UP)—Recommendation that \$2,350,000 be expended to provide a 200-foot ship channel with a depth of 27 feet at low water from Vancouver, Wash., to Bonneville was before the engineers at Washington, D. C., today.

The office of Colonel Thomas M. Robins, division engineer of Portland, said Colonel Robins had informed his chief the development would make possible the navigation of the Columbia river from Astoria to The Dalles by ocean vessels, since the backwater above the \$42,500,000 Bonneville project would permit such ships to ply from Bonneville eastward.

National and Local Markets

MAJOR QUOTATIONS UNCHANGED TODAY

PORTLAND, Jan. 22. (UP)—Eggs, butter and chicken quotations were unchanged today.

Steady tone was reflected for country killed calves. Sales of tops were around 14c lb.

Fractional price cut was showing for country killed hogs along the wholesale way with best blockers generally around 14c lb. Lamba were steady at 17c for tops with ewes held generally 5-6c lb. Goat demand was confined to a few buyers who have a maximum offer of 3 1/2c lb.

Chives were again in market; selling around \$1.40 flat box. A carload of Texas cabbage and beets of fine quality was among recent arrivals here.

Local cabbage market was steady to firm.

Spinach was firm; another car due from Texas in hamper.

Mexican tomatoes were selling freely around \$3.75 repacked. Housewife tomatoes were moving slowly with much mixed quality.

Rhubarb was down a trifle for choice.

Celery market was weak.

BOSTON WOOL

BOSTON, Jan. 22. (UP)—(U. S. Dept. Agr.)—Strong prices were paid on short fine territory wools. Clothing graded 64 and 66 territory wools and short French combing lines of similar grade in original bags sold at \$2.34 cents secured basis. Quotations generally were very firm on the limited quantities in all domestic lines of wool.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 22. (UP)—Relatively quiet buying pushed stocks up fractions to 3 or more points in today's market.

Just how much stimulation the list derived from the fall of the Laval cabinet and passage of the Soldiers' Bonus bill by congress was said to be debatable.

The close was strong. Transfers approximated 2,100,000 shares.

The market was quite active in the morning, but the pace slowed in the afternoon. Profit taking appeared in the final hour. Many of the leaders, however, held around their best levels.

The recently lagged motors were given an early lift. Steels, rails, aircraft, mines and industrial specialties joined the recovery.

Secondary bonds followed stocks. Grains and cotton improved. The French franc strengthened in the face of Laval's downfall, and other foreign currencies were higher in terms of the dollar.
