

CITY EXPECTS COLLECTIONS TO INCREASE

Predictions that collections on the improvement bond sinking fund for the city will total \$150,000 in 1936, an increase of 43 per cent over 1935, have been made by Police Judge Richmond, and William T. Vale, head of the city bond department in a report recently submitted to the city council.

"Collections were exceedingly good during the year 1935," Vale states in his report, "although direct comparison of total collections for 1935, and 1934, shows a little more for 1934. The reason for this, however, is that the Home Owners' Loan corporation was at its highest peak in 1934, having paid into the improvement bond sinking fund of Klamath Falls in excess of \$50,000.

"In 1935, the HOLC paid only approximately \$10,000 into the fund, which means that collections from all other sources on improvement funds for the year 1935 exceeded those of 1934 by nearly \$40,000," Vale reported.

In concluding the report of the bond department, the police judge and Vale submitted the following recommendations to the city council:

1. That all sales of city property be conducted through the bond department.
2. That any and all property offered for sale be advertised in two local papers for a period of 15 days (between first and final notice), the cost to be absorbed by the purchaser.
3. That the bond department shall have the right to reject any and all bids, but that in case of acceptance it shall in no case be other than the highest.
4. That the terms of the sale shall be determined by the bond department subject to approval by the council.
5. That any city property sold must have title insurance with the city the insured, and the cost of such insurance must be absorbed by the purchaser.
6. That final approval of any sale of city property shall rest with the city council.
7. That no city property be offered for sale by the city until such time when the nation business index shows that building trades have reached normal, which would indicate a return to normal of real estate values.

Diplomatic Circles Look for Closer Relations Between America and England

LONDON, Jan. 22. (AP)—Diplomatic sources said today they expected King Edward VIII to encourage closer collaboration between Great Britain and the United States in world affairs.

The monarch was expected in these quarters to make some public manifestation of a new era of friendship with the United States after he had adjusted himself to his new tasks.

Many U. S. Friends

King Edward's friends among his intimate friends a wide circle of Americans in all stations of life. The most recent evidence of his cordial feelings toward Americans was given at the Guild Hall reception last week in honor of the delegations to the International Naval conference.

Norman H. Davis, chief American delegate and President Roosevelt's "ambassador-at-large," was standing among other foreigners at the reception when the new king, then the Prince of Wales, glimpsed him some distance away. The prince strode across Guild Hall, grasped Davis warmly by the hand and said: "I am certain-

ly glad to see you back in London again, Mr. Davis."

It was in South America that Edward first said definitely that he was "going to be king, bachelor king."

This was during his tour of South America in 1931 with his brother, the Duke of Kent. Speaking privately to a group of friends one night on one of the cities where he spent some time, he scotched various questions that Americans of both continents often voiced.

Americans, north and south, wanted to know whether the prince would renounce the throne before or after his father died, and whether he would marry a commoner, a royal princess or not marry at all.

To one group, Edward then said, "I'll become king, though I frankly enjoy life just as I am. I am going to be king, bachelor king. I have no present intention of marrying at all."

"And you may take it that my people and my country will know I am their king—I'll give everything I have to the throne and all it means to my people."

ZONE EDUCATIONAL CONFERENCE HELD

The program at Camp Bonanza was under the direction of John Blanchard, educational adviser.

Advisers who were present were Kenneth Baker, Camp Bly; Thomas D. Welsh, Camps Klamath and Tulelake; Captain Winthrop W. Williams, Commanding Officer of Camp Bonanza; Lt. Buford E. Boyd, and W. J. Walsh, project superintendent were present at the conference.

DREHER APPOINTS 14 ENUMERATORS

Emil G. Dreher, supervisor of the census of business, announced that 14 enumerators have been appointed to present the census forms to business houses and help them fill out the necessary information. They include John Lemire, C. H. Iretton, Floyd Pierce, and R. V. Hopper for Klamath county.

Dreher stressed the fact that information given enumerators will be held in strict confidence. All enumerators and other persons connected with the census work are under a drastic oath not to disclose or discuss any information submitted for census purposes.

He stated that under the census law it is a criminal offense to violate this confidence; that no access to individual reports is permitted, state or local agencies, and no information will be disclosed which would reveal any of the facts or figures in the re-

turns. The census is the oldest bureau of the government, established nearly 150 years ago, and never has it been convicted of a violation of confidence.

He asked all business concerns to cooperate with the enumerators who call upon them for business census data.

Describing the value of the census, Dreher said that from the results, banks and financial agencies are enabled to extend commercial credit more freely because of more accurate knowledge of what constitutes sound operating expenses and stock ratios; newspapers are enabled to establish the consumer market in their circulation fields; wholesalers are able to make a better appraisal of their immediate and potential trade territories and thus avoid unproductive expense; advertising agencies can determine comprehensive and accurate markets for various products; retailers are supplied with needed data on their competitive situation, not only in their particular field but also regarding the extent of other kinds of competitive business. Real estate values, proper rentals and the basis for percent- age leases are frequently determined from business census data, which have great weight because

they are strictly factual statements without prejudice.

As fast as reports are received they are sent to Philadelphia by registered mail, where they are carefully guarded. Five to eight tabulating cards are punched to record the information on each report, and no names or addresses appear on these cards. The cards are tabulated with other cards to produce the figures which are published and become the recognized basic statistics of business.

Dreher is back after a trip to the northern part of the district and to Portland. He placed enumerators in seven northern counties of the district. Mrs. Dreher accompanied him. They returned Monday.
