OFFICER CHECKS DAMAGE BY ELK

State Policeman Elton Jackson investigated depredations by elk among the haystacks on the Fred Brown ranch at Crystal Wednesday.

Jackson reached the ranch on the west side of Upper Klamath lake, with difficulty. The car backed deep drifts, and the fenders were bent by the snow. He finally used a hobsled and skis to reach the haystacks.

Deep trails around the stacks showed where the elk had been tramping. About five tons of hay had been ruined.

Brown told Jackson he counted 34 elk, and that there appeared to be about 15 others in the vicinity. There is little besides Brown's hay for the elk to eat. They do some browsing on the Cherry creek swamp, and have munched the willows along the creek.

Jackson prepared a report to headquarters on the situation.

DEFENSE UNDERWAY IN SHEEP TRIAL

The defense began submission of evidence just before noon Thursday in the damage suit brought by Correll and Dan Fitzgerald against the Klamath-Medford truck line as result of an accident on the Greensprings highway in which a number of sheep were killed by a truck.

Circuit Judge E. B. Ashurst denied two defense motions at the close of the plaintiff's case. One asked for striking out all testimony dealing with the market value of lambs, and the other was for a non-suit on the grounds that the plaintiffs were negligent in driving their sheep over the entire highway at the time of the accident.

The question of the value of the lambs involved an interesting point of law. Plaintiffs claim that after the accident, many of the ewes aborted, and the question was whether to calculate damages on the diminished value of the ewes, or on the value of the potential lamb crop, ascertained destroyed. Judge Ashurst's denial of the motion supported the second contention.

Plaintiff's testimony revealed that part of the Fitzgerald flock was involved in an accident the night before the Greensprings highway mishap. About 500 sheep allegedly wandered on the Southern Pacific tracks at Worden, and 41 were killed by a train, it was indicated.

Much of the plaintiff's testimony was devoted to establishing lamb values.

Plaintiffs continued to press their case Wednesday in the Fitzgerald-Stuart sheep killing trial with prominent Klamath county sheepmen called to the witness stand to establish actual and market value of sheep and unborn lambs lost as a result of the highway accident near McCollum's mill last March.

J. W. Dolan and Scott McKendree virtually agreed that a breeding ewe at the start of the lambing season had a market value of 18 and that young lambs were worth 14 to 15 at the end of the summer raising season. Every lamb born dead, they claimed, would mean a loss of nearly 14 or 15 to the operator, for production costs once fixed, held stationary regardless of the size of the herd.

The sheep growers also agreed that a ewe injured at the start of the lambing season would continue to abort occasionally during the full length of the season.

Earlier, Dan Fitzgerald, co-plaintiff, gave testimony in an effort to fix exact loss in animals as a result of the accident.

Tule Lake Farmer Convicted by Jury

James Spence Redsell, farmer of the Tule lake district, was convicted of reckless driving by a justice court jury Wednesday. Judge W. B. Barnes had not imposed sentence Wednesday night.

The case against Redsell developed after his arrest January 11. Arresting officers claimed he sideswiped a light sedan belonging to H. W. Lynch of Klamath Falls at the city limits on South Sixth street and failed to stop. Redsell denied the charge. Deputy District Attorney William Kuykendall prosecuted the case. Fred Mills defended Redsell.
