One hundred and seventy-two paying patients and 24 paid a portion of the cost of treatment. The average number of patients was 48 per day, but a long waiting list was present throughout the year, there being insufficient funds to run to capacity, the guild announced.

Present Guild endowment is \$42,000 in addition to some income-bearing property. Another report said that the state federation of women's clubs has thus far paid \$14,867.83 on its \$20,000 for permanent endowment of one free bed. A number of gifts have also been made the past year.

All women in Klamath Falls, who are called to assist in this worthy cause are expected to respond in one way or another, either by attending the bridge party or dropping in to the library club rooms after 4 o'clock for tea. All are invited.

Klamath Bridge Players To Participate In World Olympic.

All local bridge players are being invited by the Reames Golf and Country club to participate in the fifth annual World Bridge Olympic to be held throughout the entire world on Tuesday, February 4, at 8:01 p. m., according to an announcement made today by Mrs. D. D. Havens, who has been selected by the Olympic committee as game captain for this city.

The World Bridge Olympic is regarded as the most unique and interesting event in bridge activities. Last year 65 different countries were represented among the 200,000 people who played the same 16 hands at the same hour and the same minute.

This year's hands have been selected by twenty-two of America's foremost bridge players. For each of the 16 hands these master minds of contract bridge have decided correct bidding and play, and if a player reaches the correct final contract, and plays his cards correctly, he has scored a par. Players do not compete against opponents, or any of the 200,000 entries in the event, but against a par result. Past Olympic players have proved that it is impossible for anyone, whether a skilled player or a beginner, to play these hands without improving his game.

Foremost among the attractive prizes are the two famous \$10,000 world championship trophies. In addition to these, 532 beautiful silver trophies will be awarded permanently to those who win the championship of every country, state and province.

Another feature of the event, the Olympic committee announces, will be an analysis of the correct bidding and play of every hand by Ely Culbertson. Following the Olympic, Mr. Culbertson's analysis will be sent to everyone who took part in the Olympic, regardless of the part of the world in which they participated.
