The bodies of 26 members of the crew have not been recovered.

Grizzle Discusses Measure for
Special Tax Levy

Future security of the dependent aged, orphans, blind and other unemployables of Oregon depends upon the action of voters of the state on January 31 when the so-called sales tax will be adopted or rejected, according to County Judge Grizzle.

If this tax is approved, approximately \$3,000,000 to \$4,000,000 will be raised annually by this tax, this amount to be matched by the federal government under the federal social security plan. If this tax is defeated, Oregon will be without funds to carry on even the measure of relief which these unfortunates have been securing. If the tax is approved the average pension paid to all needy over 65 will be between \$29 and \$39 per month compared with the average of \$19 which is now being paid to the needy over 70, according to Judge Grizzle.

In Klamath county these aged needy have been eliminated from the bill those provisions which had been attacked when a sales tax was previously presented to the voters. This tax has been termed a "money tax" and is certainly just that.

Judge Grizzle pointed out that in event the tax is defeated it will be necessary for the governor to call the legislature into special session to again attempt to provide some means of raising revenue. The six per cent limitation makes this difficult. And if a revenue bill is approved it cannot become effective for 90 days after passage and during that time and during the time of the legislative session there will be no funds, and the aged needy will have to depend upon private sources for all assistance.

County judges in recent session in Portland approved a resolution urging the passage of the tax as the only means of avoiding great suffering among the needy of Oregon, said Judge Grizzle.

County poor farms will again become important factors in relieving destitution of the aged needy, should this revenue measure be defeated, the judge declared.

NEEDS OF CHILDREN
DISCUSSED BY CLUB

MERRILL, Ore.—The urgent need of children of the south and who are suffering from eye strain and diseased tonsils and whose parents are unable to supply either glasses or the necessary tonsilectomy was brought before members of the service club at a largely attended session Thursday by Miss Ransom, county health nurse who was in Merrill in the interest of the health clinic sponsored by county health officials and the Merrill Parent-Teachers' association.

Since the Klamath Falls Pelicans assist with cases outside the city limits of Klamath Falls, George Ford volunteered to contact Pelican officials in an effort to get action on the cases Miss Ransom mentioned. In event other help is needed, members of the service club will contribute.

It was announced by Thomas Chaburn, president. It has not been decided as to whether funds would be provided from the club treasury or by individual contributions.

John E. Doerr, recently appointed park naturalist for Crater Lake and Modoc national parks, will speak at next Thursday's session of the club, January 30.

Doerr, a recent arrival from the Hawaiian Islands is an interesting speaker with several years experience in his particular field.

AIRPORT PROJECT

Four Klamath WPA projects have been approved, but the airport project, approved a few days ago, has been temporarily taken off the active list, according to word received here Saturday.

There was little information available as to the reason for rescinding the \$43,000 airport job, but at the office of E. J. Griffith, state WPA chief, it was said the project was temporarily off the list pending checking on new information. Griffith said that "this doesn't hurt the project's chances, so far as we know."

One of the newly approved projects is for the Alameda parkway, to be constructed later on

between Alameda street and the canal. Another is for completion of drains in the Enterprise irrigation district. This work may not begin immediately.

The other projects provide a clerk in the city treasurer's office, and two stenographers in the county assessor's office, revamping old plat.
