Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, Jan. 25. (UP)—The stock market righted itself quickly today after an early stumble following the boosting of margin requirements by the federal reserve board.

Initial declines ranged from fractions to 2 or more points. Aviation and utility issues led the recovery and most losses were shriveled, cancelled or replaced by gains up to a point or so. The close was steady. Transfers approximated 1,550,000 shares.

Douglas, off 2 points at one time, found sufficient support to wipe out this recession and establish a gain of more than a point. Sperry was also an active performer on the comeback.

Such issues as Electric Power & Light, American Power & Light, American & Foreign Power, Standard Gas & Electric, United Corporation, and Commonwealth & Southern generally edged forward. The steel and motor stocks edged along with the rally.

Armour was a lively gainer of a major fraction. Deere got up about 3 points, but other farm shares did little.

Inflation sentiment seemed to have waned considerably and the mining stocks backed and filled in a slim groove. Foreign exchanges were far from buoyant.

Financial circles seemed a little puzzled over the action of the reserve authorities on margins in view of the fact that speculative borrowings at the present time were thought to be most conservative.

Some observers were inclined to see optimistic signs in the jacking up of the marginal rate. These thought that perhaps the administration may have foreseen a boom in business and industry and wanted to prevent a buying rush in equities of the kind which has always ended in collapse.

There were still many conjectures as to a possible revision of the government's gold and silver program, but no great apprehension was apparent in generally informed quarters. At the same time, many commentators looked for much irregularity and selectivity in securities markets over the next several months.
