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language, that he would leave no doubt about his position.

Bonus Action Awaited

With Smith and Davis speaking up, political speculation also was aroused by the house repudiation of President Roosevelt's bonus veto, and the probability that democrats would lead a similar revolt in the senate Monday.

It was chiefly democrats who voted to over-ride the veto in the house. Only 32 cast their votes to uphold the veto, with 248 voting to over-ride. Republicans cast almost as many votes to sustain, 29, with 66 to pass the bill over the veto.

Curiously, the president's veto on the bonus came as members of the Liberty League were gathering for committee meetings today and the dinner tonight. It was one of the few issues on which they have agreed.

At Long Silent

Smith will speak over a nationwide radio hook-up (Columbia Broadcasting System). Earlier, Charles I. Dawson, former federal judge for the western district of Kentucky, and Dr. Neil Carothers, director of the College of Business Administration at Lehigh, will address the dinner.

Interest in Smith's speech has been heightened by the silence he has maintained for many months, his action in declining an invitation to spend the night at the White House, and his failure to prepare advance copies of his address.

LAKE COMMISSION ASSISTANT NAMED

LAKEVIEW, Ore.—Miss Beatrice Davenport of Oregon City has been assigned by the State Planning board to the position of stenographer and secretary of the Lake County Planning commission.

Chairman Forrest E. Cooper announced that the first work to be undertaken with the help of Miss Davenport, will be the preparation of a series of maps which will set forth all of the present information that is available as to the surface and underground water resources of Lake county.

It is hoped that in the event this inventory shows a lack of information about the water resources of various sections of the county that the state and federal governments will send in engineers to finish the county-wide survey.

Statistical information will also be accumulated and tabulated at once concerning the water shed of the Goose Lake Valley Irrigation project. Congress is expected to soon pass a bill which will authorize the RFC to loan money to cooperative water users associations so that they can purchase the private irrigation companies that serve them. Such a bill will make it possible for the farmers on the west side project to purchase the assets of the Goose Lake Valley Irrigation company. The RFC would not make a loan until after a thorough investigation of the venture had been made so the planning commission in cooperation with the Lake county chamber of commerce expects to assemble as much data in advance in which the RFC will be interested as circumstances will permit. The so-called "Goose Lake Bill" was passed at the last session of congress but was vetoed by President Roosevelt because of his dislike for certain amendments which were not germane to the subject of the bill. The community has every assurance that the bill will become a law at the present session of congress without any difficulty whatsoever.

culated to effectuate such purposes.

A new section regarding the permanent program of state aid said:

"Funds available after Dec. 31, 1937 to carry out the purposes of Section 7, (policy aims) shall be expended in any state only through grants to such state for such purposes pursuant to federal laws to be enacted, except for payments in connection with farming operations carried out prior to Jan. 1, 1938, and administrative expenses in connection therewith."

Also added to the enlarged policy declaration was a statement that depletion of the soil and the improper use of soil resources endanger the assurance of an adequate supply of farm commodities "at a fair price" to producers and consumers.

The aim should be, it said, to maintain a continuous and stable supply of commodities adequate to meet domestic and foreign consumer requirements "at a fair price" to both producers and consumers.

Suit over Spuds Opens in Court

Trial of the case of W. A. Kothoff and son against R. A. Wilder was being heard Saturday before Circuit Judge Edward B. Ashurst.

The Kothoffs are suing for the value of about 250 sacks of potatoes. They claim that they had an agreement with Wilder whereby they were to furnish him a like amount of seed potatoes, and receive in return the No. 1 potatoes from the crop.

The defendant claims that the agreement was not with him, but with his brother, Arnold Wilder.
