THREE AUTOMOBILES INVOLVED IN CRASH

C. Christiansen of 1239 Adams street sustained a bruised foot in a three-way automobile accident which occurred about 11 o'clock Saturday night at Sixth and Walnut streets. He was taken to a local hospital for treatment, but returned home as the injury was not serious.

Christiansen was walking, and was struck when one car came through the intersection and the other two cars bumped together as they tried to pass. Operators of the machine involved were Leon Deering, Kenneth Stafford and O. K. Anderson.

W. D. Beak of Valley Falls, Ore., reported that his machine skidded into a fire hydrant at Delta and Shikany streets Saturday night, smashing the hydrant and releasing a flood of water. The basement of a nearby house, as well as the street, was flooded. Beak's machine was badly damaged, with a front wheel broken off and a fender crumpled. He reported that he hit the hydrant in trying to avoid crashing another machine.

A third week-end accident was reported to police bureau by Dr. P. C. Adams and Alice Breheims. Both machines were slightly damaged in a minor collision occurring at Seventh and Pine streets early Saturday afternoon.

3 MORRO CASTLE OFFICERS GUILTY

NEW YORK, Jan. 27. (UP)—An effort to stave off sentencing of three officials convicted of negligence in the Morro Castle disaster coincided today with disclosure that damage suits aggregating \$3,000,000 have been filed since the liner burned in September, 1934.

Acting Captain William F. Warren, Chief Engineer Eben S. Abbott, and Executive Vice President Henry C. Caband of the New York and Cuba Mail Steamship Co., were convicted Saturday night by a federal court jury after a 10-week trial. The company itself also was convicted.

George Z. Medall, their attorney, said he would ask Judge Murray Hulbert to set aside the verdicts and, failing that, would appeal.

Judge Hulbert set Tuesday to impose sentences. They face maximum terms of 10 years in prison and \$10,000 fines. All were free under bond.

PRISON INMATES EXHIBIT ARTICLES

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27. (UP)—The question of what prisoners in the state penitentiary do with their time is answered with a display of numerous prison-made articles here.

A tea-table, made from myrtlewood brought from Palestine, must have been made by a life inmate judging from the work involved in its construction. The table is inlaid with a fox hunt worked out in minute detail in the top.

Included in the display is work in silver—paper knives, letter openers, nail files and cake knives; candle sticks and fruit bowls made of myrtlewood and a number of hand-tinted photographs.

Striking Egyptian Students Clash With Authorities

CAIRO, Jan. 27. (UP)—A widespread strike of students precipitated a clash today between demonstrators and police at Dammanhour in which five students were wounded.

One student was reported to have been killed, but this could not be verified immediately.

The Dammanhour clash arose as a heavy force of Egyptian cavalry dashed to nearby Giza while 1,200 shouting students of Giza university marched on Cairo in connection with the strike.

The bridges between Giza and Cairo were opened in an attempt to block an entry by the students into the city.

Large forces of police centered at the bridge heads.

Ignoring the counsel of their leaders, the students went out on strike everywhere. One group of Bulak made a bonfire of the furniture of the School of Applied Arts.

YOUTH RECEIVES LIFE SENTENCE

PORTLAND, Jan. 27. (UP)—A. Ferdinand Weston, 24, was sentenced to a life term in Oregon State prison today for the slaying of Deputy Sheriff Ernest C. Loll.

George Leonard Fielder, 23, arrested with Weston and tried earlier, is serving a 15-year sentence. He was convicted of manslaughter. Weston was convicted of second degree murder.

The two admitted they shot Loll when he accosted them as they were hunting pheasants out of season last September. The youths were arrested several days later at Moclips, Wash. Both lived in Portland.

FIRES STARTED NEAR HIGHWAYS

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 27. (UP)—The great majority of fires started by recreationists outside of national forests are located in a zone within one-half mile of public roads, a forest service survey shows.

Of 1393 recreation fires in Clatsop, Clallam, Skagit and Snohomish counties in

Washington and Clackamas, Clatsop, Coos, Linn, Marion and Tillamook in Oregon, 956 fires or 69 per cent were within the half mile limit. The percentage was even higher in a group of eastern Oregon counties including Crook, Grant, Klamath and Union.
