Recently the relief committee employed Dr. W. T. Rogers to handle relief work, at \$200 a month.

At the Tuesday morning meeting of the committee, Dr. Warren Hunt protested against the possibility that other physicians might be called on to assist Dr. Rogers, but would not be paid for the service.

The relief committee laid the matter on the table. The resolution, touching on the same problem, was received by the secretary, Phyllis Hartzog Whitliffe, and was signed by J. M. Hilton, secretary of the medical society.
