**EGGS, BUTTER SHOW IMPROVED FEELING**

PORTLAND, Jan. 29 (AP)—While butter and eggs showed a better feeling today, prices remained unchanged.

Capons were scarce with quotations reading as high as 29-30c pound. Live capons brought 25c. Otherwise, the chicken market showed weakness.

There was a good call for dressed geese around 29c a pound, while Pekin ducks brought 16-17c.

Prices of onions was dropping with only a small volume of business passing at the source. General top price being offered growers is now \$1 net.

Extreme dullness was continued for potatoes from Deschutes, Klamath and Idaho but locals were showing a slight increase in movement. General price range is unchanged.

Rather slow trading was reported for local hothouse tomatoes with extra fancy and fancy quoted at 22c, choice to 20c and standard around 17-18c pound.

Celery market was weaker and lower.

Hothouse rhubarb was again lower with demand slow.

Hothouse cucumbers were moving fairly well around \$1.25 dozen for standard and \$1.75 for choice.

Some good Cannon Ball cabbage from the south was being offered around 3 1/2c with local from 2 1/2 to 4c lb.

Country killed meats are generally unchanged in price.

## WHEAT MARKET PRICE RECEDES

CHICAGO, Jan. 29, (AP)—With Liverpool showing a drop of nearly 2c per bushel and the Winnipeg market weak, Chicago wheat prices today receded a maximum of 1c.

No wheat export business of consequence was announced at Winnipeg.

Wheat closed heavy, 1c to 1 1/2c under yesterday's finish. May 99 1/2 to 99 1/2; corn, 1c to 8c off, May 59 1/2 to 59 1/2; oats unchanged to 1c lower, and provisions varying from 2c decline to an equal advance.

**Stock Market Quotations**

NEW YORK, Jan. 29, (AP)—A brisk demand for motors and aviation shares steeled up the stock market list today.

Gains of fractions to a broad two points appeared on a broad front at the finish, with final levels around the best of the day. Numerous new highs for several days were recorded.

The closing tone was firm. Approximately 2,600,000 shares changed hands.

The list had felt numerous cross-currents during early trading. While profit-taking whittled down the can shares and some of the blue-chip industrials in morning dealings, there were brisk buying moves at times in rails, oil, farm equipment and in utilities in the low-price brackets.

A block of 15,000 shares of Commonwealth & Southern was traded at the opening at an unchanged price, and the low-priced holding company group occupied considerable attention in the morning and in the final hour.

Douglas and Chrysler gained around three points each. Standard Oil of New Jersey, U. S. Steel, U. S. Pipe, Delaware & Hudson, General Motors, Case, Boeing, United Aircraft and New York Central picked up one to two points each. Others active and a bit ahead included Yellow Truck, Deere, Southern Pacific, Electric Power and Light, United Corp. and Commonwealth & Southern.
