ESPEE ANNOUNCES CHANGE IN TRAINS

PORTLAND, Jan. 30, (AP)—J. A. Ormandy, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific, announced today that the number of trains operating between Portland and California on the Shasta route will be increased to four, with a general tightening of schedules, effective Sunday, February 2.

The Shasta-Klamath, operated in consolidated form between Portland and Eugene, and Dunsmuir and San Francisco, will be operated as separate trains, and

the Klamath will operate on a schedule two hours and forty-five minutes faster than now.

The southbound Shasta will be speeded up 20 minutes and the northbound, 10 minutes.

The northbound Cascade will be 30 minutes faster, but the southbound schedule will be unchanged.

The northbound West Coast Los Angeles will be shortened two hours and 10 minutes in schedule time.

The schedule of the northbound Southern Oregon local No. 330 will be reduced 30 minutes between Ashland and Portland, but the south schedule will remain the same.

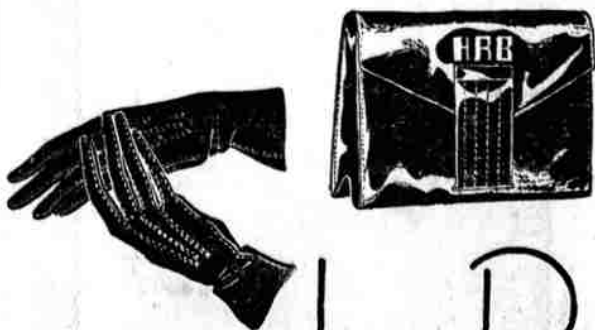
