

RANDALL SPEAKER AT HIGH SCHOOL

Bill Randall, pilot and airport manager, was the guest speaker at the assembly Wednesday at Klamath Union high school when he spoke on "Aviation as a Vocation for the Coming Generation."

After giving a brief history of the beginning of aviation, he enumerated the many requirements for a successful aviator.

"A person's physical requirements, his character and his background must be 'A No. 1,'" stated Randall. He went on to say that a license cannot be obtained unless one has 1500 solo hours to his credit, which takes a lot of time and money. In comparing aviation with the profession of a doctor, Randall remarked that both take about the same amount of time and money in getting started, but aviation is the only known profession in which one can stop right in and receive from \$600 to \$800 a month.

FORT KLAMATH, Ore.—The elimination try-out tournament for ski jumpers who belong to the Crater Lake Ski club held at the Anna creek winter playground Sunday afternoon was well attended both by local people and visitors from Chiloquin and Klamath Falls. Exhibition jumps were given by Alf Ostmo, Dan Vancey and B. B. Blomquist, all of Klamath Falls. Alf Ostmo made one particularly spectacular jump of 116 feet, exceeding any previous record made here. He is a fine jumper and presents a very graceful picture as he glides off the big ski jump.

Results in the try-out were as follows: Class B jumping, Henry Evans, from Chiloquin, first; R. Robertson, also of Chiloquin, second; Bob Davall, Chiloquin, third; R. O. Varman, of Sand creek, fourth; Delbert Denton, of Fort Klamath, fifth. In the class C jumping, Alfred B. Castel, Jr., took first place, and Bunny Miller of Klamath Falls, second. These two boys are very promising jumpers, both being 13 years old, and Bunny made some fine jumps, but took a nasty spill on the last attempt. However, he was not seriously injured, as he complained only that his neck hurt considerably, although to onlookers, it appeared as if he must have suffered severe injury, as a result of the bad fall.

Junior Castel also made a long standing jump of 85 feet in the class C jumping, and Henry Evans of Chiloquin won the long standing ski jump in class B by a fine jump of 96 feet.

The Crater Lake Ski club held a special meeting Monday evening in the Fort Klamath hotel, with a fine attendance of members present. At this time it was decided to send the following delegates to Mount Shasta to participate actively in the program of winter sports to be held there February 1 and 2: Delbert Denton, R. Robertson, Bob Davall, Henry Evans, Wilbur Ferguson, Alfred Orin, Junior Castel, and Rudy Luck. These members will make the trip in Delbert Denton's and R. Robertson's cars, gas and oil expenses to be paid by the Ski club. Headquarters for the skiers in Mount Shasta will be the McCloud hotel, and the parties expect to leave Fort Klamath and Chiloquin Friday afternoon.

Prophet went to Patterson's

house January 1, armed with a revolver, to protest against his estranged wife living there as Patterson's housekeeper. As Patterson opened the door each man fired two shots. Both claimed self defense.

Airliner Pilot Dies As Plane Crashes

DENTON, Texas, Jan. 30. (UP)—Tod Kincannon, pilot of an American Airlines plane, was injured fatally Wednesday when his plane crashed 15 miles south-east of here during a blinding snowstorm.

Five passengers were riding with him, but none was injured seriously.

The plane landed in a clump of trees on a farm four miles south of Little Elm, Texas.

Kincannon, whose home is in Fort Worth, died while en route to a hospital at Frisco.

GOVERNOR LINKS SMITH, DUPONT

BOSTON, Jan. 30. (UP)—Governor James M. Curley, new deal booster, characterized Al Smith as a man "wrapped up in 'Dupont cellophane,' from which he will find it difficult to extricate himself."

The former governor of New York, Curley said, lost his power in the democratic party when he discarded the brown derby for the tall hat.

Curley, familiarly known as "New England's original Roosevelt," laughed out at Smith in a radio address last night.

Of Smith's American Liberty league address, Curley said:

"There was general rejoicing in the ranks of the republican party, but the rejoicing subsided extremely after Senator Joseph Robinson of Arkansas renounced and endorsed Mr. Smith in a beautiful castle of Dupont cellophane, from which it would be extremely difficult for him to emerge."

"He (Smith) was perhaps more beloved by many during the time that he was wearing the brown derby, but when he discarded the brown derby for the tall hat and became associated with the Duponts and the Morgans and their ilk, and ceased to think of the man of the tenements and thought only in terms of the man of great wealth and affluence, he ceased to have the power which the republicans still believe he possesses to induce democratic citizens to vote for republican nominees."

Insane Chauffeur Injures Employer, Slays Cook, Self

CLEVELAND, Jan. 30. (UP)—An insane chauffeur, Frank Pozzagal, late Wednesday shot and killed Miss Lena Schengbier, 43, and then committed suicide after critically wounding his wealthy employer, John A. Kling, president of the Cleveland Building Supply company.

Miss Schengbier, the Kling family cook, died at St. Luke's hospital of abdominal bullet wounds suffered during an altercation with Pozzagal in the kitchen of the Kling mansion in suburban Shaker Heights earlier in the afternoon.

Pozzagal had been discharged, it was learned, and held Miss Schengbier responsible. The dismissal, after 12 years' service with the family, temporarily unbalanced the chauffeur, police believed.

He accosted the woman with a .22 caliber rifle. When she screamed he shot her in the stomach.

Hearing the shots, the aged industrialist rushed into the room to investigate and was shot in the hip by his former employee. Pozzagal then clubbed Kling on the head and ran out to the garage and closed the doors. He sat down in the family car and shot himself in the head after first starting the motor in an apparent attempt to commit suicide by asphyxiation.

BUILDING TO PLAY PART IN RECOVERY

NEW YORK, Jan. 30. (AP)—Business analysts are convinced that building operations will play a major part in shaping the 1936 industrial curve.

Most of them believe capital expenditures for construction this year will heavily exceed the figures of 1935, and thus help to lift business activity to a considerably higher recovery peak than was registered last year.

For the most part the construction specialists are talking of gains of 20 to 40 per cent in contract values over the dollar volume of the previous year.

In a survey of the industry, the Standard Statistics company suggests that for all types of building, the total awards for the year may reach \$2,400,000,000 for the 37 states east of the Rocky mountains, which would be approximately 30 per cent greater than that for 1935.

The survey holds that tentative indications are that total residential contract awards for the year may increase to \$900,-
