

TULELAKE WELL PROJECT AIDED

TULELAKE, Jan. 31. — Prospects for a water well in Tulelake improved appreciably when the Tulelake water commission received the following letter from its railroad officials at San Francisco. Efforts of the water commission have been working out slowly and with a gathering up of loose ends in the project there appears to be ever increasing possibility that the well will soon be a reality.

The letter is self-explanatory and is a result of conference held with officials of the railroad company at their offices in San Francisco by Charles K. Wiesne and Howard H. Wolf as representatives of the water commission. It reads:

"Gentlemen:

"Referring to the matter of developing an adequate water supply at Tulelake:

"In the conference held in my office of November 22nd, you requested assistance from the railroad company in connection with putting down an experimental well, and suggested that this assistance might be part of the granting of free rates over Southern Pacific lines for the transportation of material and equipment.

"Your problem has been duly considered by our management and while we are not in a legal position to grant free rates, I am pleased to state that I am authorized to advise you that Southern Pacific company will make a cash contribution of \$1000 toward the cost of sinking a well with the understanding that said contribution if and when sufficient commitments have been received by the Tulelake water commission from other sources to insure that the well will be completed as per specifications.

"Wishing you and the citizens of Tulelake a prosperous new year, I remain,

President McMurphy, in commenting on the letter and its commitment further stated that: "It takes time to be sure we are right before going ahead. We want as nearly perfect a well as it is possible to secure. Our funds are limited and we cannot drop any of these funds in something that is guesswork, for if we do the chances are there will be no well and no money to get one with."

"It is only in a careful manner that a well can be secured. One of which there will be no complaint when the town of Tulelake continues the work which we have begun."

McMurphy's comment was made partly because of some criticism which has been expressed over the slowness in progress on the well. He further stated that he believed much would be accomplished soon and that contacts were being made with other large operators of the district which were expected to result favorably towards the well fund, announcement of which would be made when the arrangements had been completed.

Coughlin Advances Campaign in East

BOSTON, Jan. 31. (UP)—The Rev. Charles E. Coughlin has instructed the Massachusetts unit of his National Union for Social Justice to begin immediately a drive to elect a member favorable to his principles, Massachusetts Director Frank L. Kane revealed Thursday.

Kane said he had received instructions from the Detroit radio priest regarding plans for organization and quoted Father Coughlin as saying "the . . . work must be carried out immediately and, if possible, terminated by the middle of February."

Veterans Must Use Bonus to Pay Loans

SALEM, Jan. 31. (UP)—The World War veterans state aid commission Thursday warned veterans their property will be foreclosed without further consideration if they do not use their bonus to pay delinquent loans to the state.

Secretary Jerrold Owen said all the commission's county and field representatives will meet here February 21 to plan a collection campaign to increase revenues this year by \$1,000,000. Approximately \$1,800,000 was received last year.

Civics Students Conduct Vote on Election Issues

Senior civics students at Klamath Union high school Thursday gave some indication of what Oregonians may expect in the way of election returns tonight when they voted on the four issues up for ballot today.

The students favored the primary election date change and the student fee bill by slight margins, while decisively rejecting the sales tax and legislators' pay boost measures.

The straw vote was taken before the measures had been discussed in class. Everett C. Vanderpool, instructor in civics, believed that, with the exception of the student fee bill, on which some of the students were influenced by their friends in college, the student vote largely reflected voter-parent opinion.

Councilmen Turn Health Plan Over to Health Board

Decision on city participation in a proposed city-county health unit was delayed by the council Thursday afternoon pending further investigation of the program by the city health board and a possible conference with Dr. F. E. Stricker, state health bureau chief.

This action was taken on recommendation of Mayor Willis Mahoney, who advised turning the matter over temporarily to Bert Hall as chairman of the city board of health. If the board members find the proposal advantageous, Hall will attempt to bring Dr. Stricker here for a round table discussion with the county court, the health boards and the city council.

Thereafter, at an indefinite date, the council will vote on the health plan, if in the meantime its provisions are proved to be entirely satisfactory.

Oregon Will Send Transients Home

PORTLAND, Jan. 31. (UP)—The state relief committee, faced by the problem of handling indigent transients, decided today to cooperate with county courts in returning undesirable transients to the places from which they started their wanderings.

A supplementary decision was to make a survey of the possibility of placing desirable transients on the roll of the rural resettlement administration under the ruling that transients who engaged in reasonable employment last year may be granted relief to the extent of about \$20 a month.

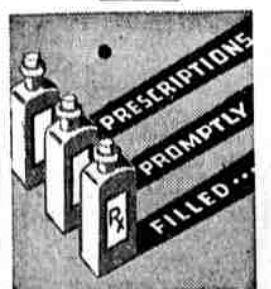
