

BISHOP WILL STUDY OFFER TO GO EAST

OAKLAND, Cal., Jan. 31. (AP)—The Rt. Rev. William Remington, bishop of the Eastern Oregon Episcopal Missionary district, said he will "go over the whole matter in Philadelphia" before deciding whether to accept the appointment as dean of the Philadelphia Divinity school.

The bishop said he would give the offer "serious consideration."

"It is a great honor, of course," he declared. "But I never make quick decisions, and just at present I am so busy with conducting the parochial mission here, I have not had time to give it consideration. Unfortunately, I happen to be one of those persons who cannot do two things at once."

The announcement from Philadelphia said Bishop Remington had been chosen to succeed the Rev. George G. Bartlett, pastor of homiletics and professor of care, who has been acting dean of the divinity school.

Bishop Remington said he will return to his home at Pendleton, Ore., after a church engagement in San Francisco Monday, before starting east about the middle of February to "go over the whole matter in Philadelphia."

The bishop is a son of the late Dr. Joseph Price Remington, for many years president of the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy. Bishop Remington was born in Philadelphia in 1879. He was made a deacon in 1905, a priest in 1906 and was consecrated as bishop in 1918. He has served as bishop of the missionary district of eastern Oregon since 1922.

Portland, Ore., Jan. 31. (AP)—Episcopal churches indicated here today that decision by Bishop William P. Remington of Pendleton to accept an appointment as dean of the Philadelphia Divinity School might bring about a reorganization of considerable moment.

Bishop Remington, asked concerning his decision relative to acceptance, said at Oakland, Cal., that he "will give serious consideration" to the appointment. The bishop is conducting a parochial school at Oakland and is to return to Pendleton next week. He is head of the Eastern Oregon Episcopal Missionary district.

Archdeacon H. D. Chambers, in commenting on the separation of eastern Oregon from the Oregon diocese in 1907, said it was possible that steps might be taken to have the area again included in the section over which Dean Benjamin D. Dagwell of Denver will have control following his consecration as bishop of Oregon next month.

Reunion of the two areas was recommended by a committee at the general convention two years ago, Archdeacon Chambers said.
