

HALF BILLION IN NEW TAXES HELD NEEDED

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President Roosevelt, Patman's aim is to force a vote on his plan to pay by printing money, rather than by borrowing or new taxes.

It was considered significant that Speaker Byrns said any move to attach the plan to an appropriation bill would be out of order, unless a special rule were adopted.

1926 Levy Considered
It was also noted that prominent democrats sought to show there was no significance in the action yesterday of the senate agricultural committee, which included a supplemental statement on currency expansion in reporting the administration's new farm subsidy bill to the senate.

The statement, included at the request of Senator Thomas (D-Okla.), suggested that the president should announce that he was "going back to the 1926 price level. Prices would immediately rise to that level, Thomas argued, and the president could keep them there by issuing \$750,000,000 or \$1,000,000,000 of new currency.

Thomas praised the administration's action in devaluing the dollar, saying that if it had not done so, crops would be selling for disastrously low prices today. But he held that money should be cheaper still.

Incidentally, today was the second anniversary of the devalued dollar and the argument about its effectiveness was still in progress after two years.

Complete Study Urged
Speaking at Chicago, Prof. Ernest H. Hahn, Northwestern university economist, referred to the new deal's action in cutting the gold content of the dollar from 23.5 grains to 15.5 grains on January 1, 1934. He said events have made clear that " tinkering with metal does not have as great an effect on the price level as was anticipated," though he considers devaluation was a necessary step at the time. James P. Warburg, financier, proposed in New York that a commission be created to make a thorough study of currency and bank reform. He criticized some new deal measures as ill-conceived, though saying the pre-war deal money mechanism was far from perfect.

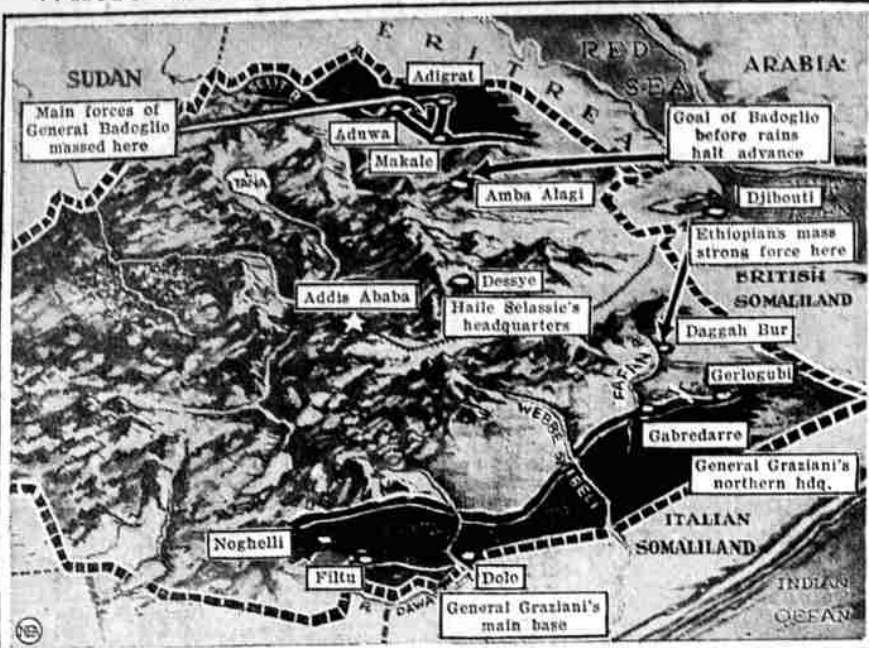

With heavy rains checkmating Marshal Badoglio's advance in the northern war zone of Ethiopia, gains of the invaders have been confined to the southern theater of conflict, where Gen. Rodolfo Graziani's forces have pierced far into the territory around Filtu and Nogelli, capturing both of these cities and seizing a wide area around them. Goal set by Badoglio in the north before weather causes complete cessation of his drive is a line extending east and west through the town of Amba Alagi. The darkened areas on the map show how far the Italians have advanced in both war zones.

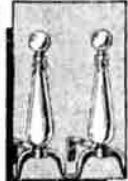

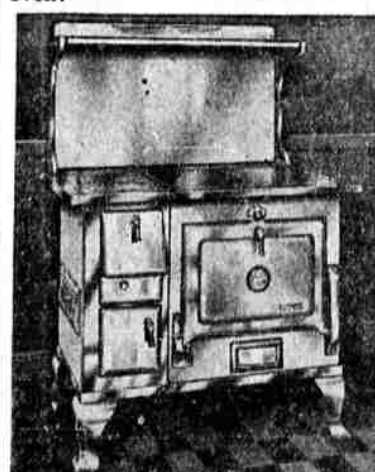
