

USE OF WPA FUNDS PROBED IN GEORGIA

ATLANTA, Ga., Jan. 31. (UP)—New deal supporters in Georgia today challenged Governor Eugene Talmadge to enter the state against President Roosevelt in a preferential primary, as charges of illegal use of WPA funds to fight the administration plunged the Georgia political situation into turmoil.

While Talmadge formally announced a swing through the west and north in his campaign to drive President Roosevelt out of office, Marion H. Allen, Roosevelt campaign manager for Georgia, asked Talmadge to run against the president in a preferential primary in his own state.

Grand Jury Meets
The situation was further stirred by a federal grand jury which met today to investigate charges that A. S. Howell, state school supervisor and a Talmadge ally, had put WPA employees to work mauling out anti-Roosevelt literature. The grand jury plans to report early next month.

"As manager of President Roosevelt's campaign for Georgia, I am glad to suggest solution of the problem (created by the 'grass roots' convention) insofar as the people of Georgia are concerned by calling upon the governor and his associates to enter his name in a preferential primary," Allen said.

Merely Coincidence
"The result will overwhelmingly convince the people of the United States that Talmadge does not represent Georgia's true democracy, and, his assumption to have spoken for the people of our great state will be definitely and conclusively repudiated."

The complaint against Howell was filed by Miss Gay B. Shepperson, Georgia WPA administrator. She insisted it was merely a coincidence that the charge was made at a time when a democratic "grass roots" convention had endorsed Talmadge for president, and the governor was preparing to stomp the nation.

Miss Shepperson alleged that A. S. Howell ordered WPA workers to mail out copies of a publication called "The Georgia Women's World." A copy of the paper distributed to the people of the state was attacked by President Roosevelt and carried a picture of Mrs. Roosevelt being escorted to a taxicab by the negro president of a college at which she had spoken.

ICKES, HOPKINS REPLY
WASHINGTON, Jan. 31. (UP)—The two administration officials who outran others in thinking up bad names for new deal critics—Harold L. Ickes and Harry L. Hopkins—go with both barrels today at Gov. Eugene Talmadge of Georgia, but withheld direct fire from Gov. Alf Landon of Kansas.

Surprisingly mild this time for a man with his talent for invective, Ickes said Talmadge was "not a man of his word" and he displayed a photostatic letter from Talmadge to prove it.

Hopkins, reviewing newly uncovered charges that Talmadge supporters had been using WPA propaganda, said contemptuously:

"I never had a high regard for him but I didn't think he'd stoop so low as this. But I suppose I should have expected it."

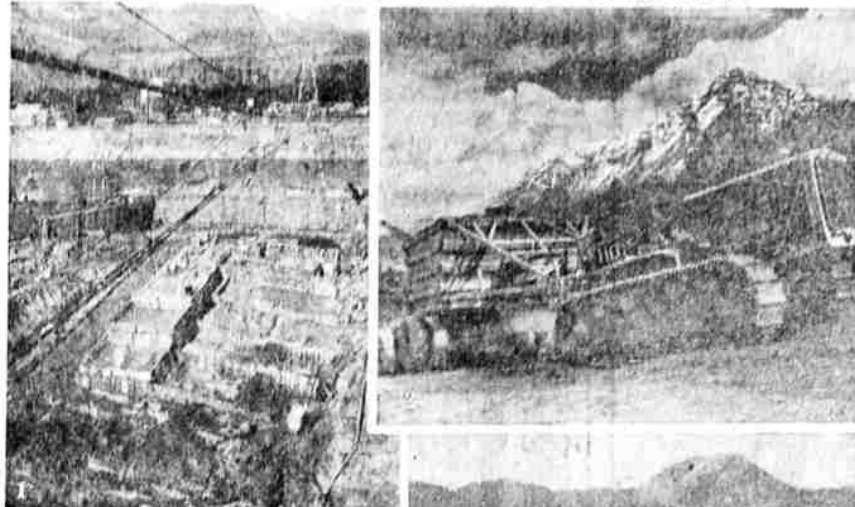

These photographs assembled by the Travel and Information Department of the Oregon State Highway Commission give one an idea of the gigantic scale of the Columbia River project of the Columbia. Photograph No. 1 shows where an army of workmen with giant machinery is building a section of the main spillway dam between Bradford Island and the Washington shore. Cofferdams keep the river out while the work goes forward. Picture No. 2 gives some conception of the heavy machinery used in moving the thousands of tons of rock and earth. Picture No. 3 shows a group of the buildings constructed on the Oregon shore near the dam to house permanent employees. Landscaping and architecture are exceedingly attractive. The site of the dam is 42 miles east of

Portland on the Columbia River Highway. Thousands stop to gaze down on the Herculean job every week. It is one of the great construction projects of the nation worth going a long way to see.

\$1.00 Award
Toasted Mushroom Sandwiches

Mrs. M. McWhitney,
722 North 10th Street.
15 oz. can mushrooms
1-3/4 oz. can pimientos
1 small slice onion
2 tablespoons creamy butter
2 tablespoons flour
2 teaspoons salt
Cayenne pepper

Chop the mushrooms, pimientos and onions. Cook in melted butter in a saucepan over a low heat for about five minutes, stirring occasionally. Sprinkle the flour over the mushrooms, and stir until thick. Season with salt and cayenne. Cool. Spread slices of lightly-buttered bread with mushroom mixture. Put together in pairs and toast. Cut into strips and serve piping hot. Sufficient for two dozen small sandwiches.

Clean shrimp in cold water;

emerge in hot water for three minutes, drain, mull very fine with fork, cut dill pickles very fine, mix together and set in ice box 30 minutes to blend.

Minced canned pimientos
A little sweet cream (optional)
Cut the bread in 1/4 inch thick

slices, then stamp out with a heart-shaped cutter. Blend the cheese (or pimiento cheese) with the nuts, adding cream if necessary to moisten. Saute the bread in butter until golden brown. Spread with cheese mixture. Decorate around the edges with finely minced canned pimientos and diagonally through the center place a long narrow strip of pimiento to represent an arrow or dart.

SEVEN PER CENT INCREASE GAINED

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31. (AP)—The Western Pine association announced today that 114 mills reported a seven per cent increase in new business the week ending January 25, compared with the previous week.

The 60,532,000 feet of new business was about 80 per cent above the three-year weekly average for January.

Shipments were 53,234,000 feet and production 31,331,000 feet. The same mills for the corresponding week a year ago showed orders of 36,958,000 feet and production 14,827,000 feet.

GOVERNOR NOT TO CALL LEGISLATURE

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 31. (AP)—The state relief committee in session here heard Governor Charles H. Martin declare there will be no extra session of the state legislature to provide old-age pension funds if the sales tax proposal is defeated.

The statement followed an all-day session at which the counties' relief budget of \$286,000 for February was approved and State Administrator Elmer Goudy was instructed to confer with WPA officials relative to obtaining more projects in Oregon.

The commission indicated a balance of \$274,363 would be on hand at the end of this month from the \$1,000,000 appropriation for relief. Members expressed the hope the relief bills after April 1 could be met from profits accruing from the state liquor control act.

Judd Greenman, chairman, said he was informed the reappointment administration would pay \$20 a month to needy families classified as farm labor without strings concerning length of residence.

The commission indicated the WPA rule barring from jobs those not on relief between May 1 and November 1, 1935, was creating a necessity for other means of support for many families.
