D. A. R. To Give Benefit Valentine Ball At Klamath Armory.

Arrangements for a benefit Valentine ball, which will be one of the gayest and most important events of the mid-winter season, are almost completed, according to Mrs. Lloyd J. Goble, regent of Eulalona chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution, which is sponsoring the affair to be held at the Armory on Friday night, February 14th. Proceeds from the ball will go toward the purchase of markers for historic spots in the Klamath country.

Many of these spots have already been located by the chapter, and temporary markers have been placed. These markers, however, need to be replaced with permanent ones as soon as funds are available.

Residents of the Klamath basin are urged to attend the ball, to enjoy themselves.

The development of historical research has always been considered one of the primary objects of the Daughters of the American Revolution. To further the work of this committee, Mrs. Julian G. Goodhue, historical general of the national society, in a letter to Mrs. R. E. Carruthers, of Astoria, chairman for Oregon, has outlined many fields for activity, urging that quality and authenticity govern all that is done.

Mrs. Goodhue's program, which has received the hearty endorsement of Mrs. Mark V. Weatherford of Albany, Oregon state regent, embraces town markers wherein tablets are to be placed at the edge of towns on the main line of travel, inscribed with the name of the town, date and by whom founded and historic facts. Mrs. Goodhue has suggested the use of wrought iron with yellow lettering on a blue background, in keeping with the colors of the national society.

Also included in the program is a guide to historical spots, the compilation of which it is hoped will eventually be national in scope. The organization of county historical societies is urged, to conserve the visible records of the past and present, realizing that today will soon be yesterday, each state is urged to cooperate with the works progress administration in locating and marking historic spots, contributing a triple service, to country, to the society, and to humanity; this work to include tracing and marking old trails, churches, houses, public buildings, old forts, trading posts, bridges, etc.

The Daughters may also purchase for a nominal sum colored prints made from the Ferris historical paintings, forty in number, now the property of the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, covering the outstanding American historical events since the landing of Columbus, and present to schools, libraries, etc. to further interest in historical work.

During the past few months many chapters in Oregon have been busy with the work of this committee. Villamette chapter, Portland, marked the grave of Wesley Hauxhurst, at Trout cemetery, Tillamook. Hauxhurst was an Oregon pioneer, and one of the voters for American government at Champoege on May 2, 1843. At the time of the uprising of Cockstock and his warriors, he joined the military organization known as the Oregon Rangers. This chapter is also working on plans to honor Father Peter De Smet, a Jesuit missionary in 1842, with a marker at Milwaukee, one of the oldest and most historic spots in Oregon, to commemorate the farthest west point reached by him in his mission to promote friendliness among the Indians and whites. Multnomah chapter, Portland, is making plans to mark the grave of an unknown mother discovered on the side of Mount Hood.

Yamhill chapter at McMinnville, placed a tablet on a Kentucky coffee tree grown from a bean brought to Oregon from Mount Vernon, home of George Washington, in 1901. The original tree was planted in Mount Vernon in 1824 by General Lafayette.

Champoege chapter at Newberg, placed markers in the Goodrich cemetery, near Dayton, on the graves of two Oregon pioneers, that of Peggy Steele Goodrich and Carmel Goodrich, believed to be the first case on record in Oregon at which the graves of both a son and a daughter of the American Revolution, husband and wife, have been so marked. This chapter also has done outstanding work in gathering together old bible records in Yamhill county, and has presented local libraries with photostat copies of the 1850 census of the county. It is interesting to note that at that time there were 1,139 people in Yamhill county, and of these 340 were born in Missouri.

David Hill chapter, Hillsboro, sponsored the dedication plaque on the Philip Harris bridge in the Farmington district, honoring that pioneer who built the first bridge across the Tualatin river at this point. Outstanding among the monuments placed by Oregon Daughters

is the drinking fountain installed by Wahkeena chapter, at Wahkeena Falls, Benson Park, on the Columbia River highway in memory of the pioneers of the Columbia gorge. A picture of the fountain at the time of dedication, with the Mayor of Portland and members of the chapter, was a place in the Daughters national magazine for January.

An historical pageant "The Last Frontier," presented in Newberg last summer and written by the chapter's former historian, Mrs. F. P. Paul, attracted great interest. The scenes were based on Oregon history from the arrival of Lewis and Clarke party in 1805 to 1860, including the Astor Overlanders in 1812, Peter Skene Ogden and his fur brigade at Fort Vancouver in 1835, the Whitman Mission in 1837, the coming of the first Catholic missionaries, Father Blanchet and Father Demers to St. Paul in 1838, the arrival of Jason Lee and the first home makers in the Willamette valley, and the achievement of the statehood of Oregon in 1859.

Linn chapter, Albany, has inaugurated a complete filing system of Oregon historical clippings, and numerous chapters throughout the state are accomplishing outstanding work in recording cemetery and old bible and marriage records of which there is no official record.

Many chapters have been busy raising their quota for the Daughters part in the restoration of the old John McLoughlin home in Oregon City, and the state society is now working with the Whitman Centennial committee to commemorate on August 20 to 23, the establishment of the first American home in the Oregon territory in 1836, by Marcus W. Prentiss and Marcus Whitman. The committee contemplates the restoration of the Whitman mission at Waiilatpu, about ten miles from Walla Walla, Washington.

By ADELAIDE KERR Associated Press Foreign Staff PARIS, Feb. 1. (AP) — New prints in silhouette, etching and water color effects were launched today as the last word in smart fabrics in midweek fashion openings.

Leaves and anchors were silhouetted as prints in striking black and white patterns on silk crepe shantung dresses and blouses.

Etching prints with finely traced figures on dark background were made into day dresses. Water color prints with softly blended tones made evening gowns. Flower prints took a back seat.

The silhouette prints followed the spring mode with much black and white—these frocks being

timely in England due to mourning for the late King George V. Black was combined with white, rather than trimmed by it, and with vivid hues on dress prints.

Many white wool collars and cuffs, and many tucked lingerie vests were shown. Despite the mangle mode much color was displayed in such combinations as cocoa, green, mahogany, and pansy blue. Navy was somewhat sidetracked for blues of the cobalt or cornflower variety.

Suits became increasingly important. Many day suits were built with black foundations, sometimes accompanied by colored jackets. Tweed skirts were combined with short loose plaid or checked wool jackets.

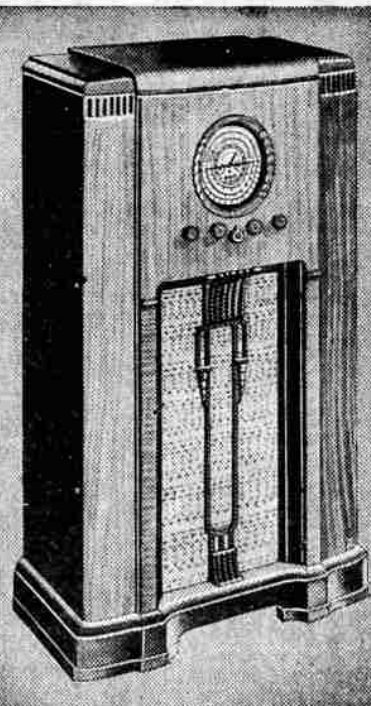
