American Federation of Labor to take cognizance of what this convention has done," said John L. Lewis, the union leader, when the L. A. delegates had unanimously adopted the Roosevelt resolution.

"If the A. F. of L. would follow suit, as it should, then for all practical purposes, the result of the next election no longer would be in doubt.

The federation traditionally takes no part in such presidential elections.

"We are not endorsing the democratic party as such," Lewis added.

"We are rising to meet a crisis in the economic and political affairs of the nation."

Gil Dobie Quits as Cornell Coach

ITHACA, N. Y., Feb. 1. (AP)—Gil Dobie, head football coach at Cornell University, resigned today.

In a letter to James Lynch, Cornell's athletic director, Dobie, head coach at Ithaca since 1920, announced his resignation "in interests of harmony."

Dobie has been subjected to sharp criticism from alumni and other groups for several years as a result of Cornell's poor showing on the gridiron. Forecasts that sooner or later he would be ousted have been freely made during recent weeks.

Klamath Voters Defeat Measures

balloting, but it went down, better than 1 1/2 to 1. Student fees took a 3 to 1 beating, and the sales tax and legislative pay measures were blasted to the tune of 5 to 1 and 6 to 1, respectively.

The election set a new low in interest and percentage of registration voting. At the county clerk's office it was estimated that the special balloting cost upwards of \$1 a vote. Only \$300 or so cast their ballots, and the cost of staging the voting in this county is expected to run well over \$3,000.

Politicians, here and elsewhere over the state, began to stir themselves Saturday when they were certain the primary will be in May instead of September. The date is May 15. Dave O'Hara, election clerk for the state department at Salem, noted that primary filings are about a month behind this year, and he anticipated there would be a rush in the next few weeks.

Locally, announcements are to be expected shortly from some of the candidates. Some of the incumbents who want their friends to withhold pledges from others may declare themselves soon, and early announcements

are in prospect from a few of those who hope to oust these incumbents.

The election count Friday night set new speed records in Klamath county, the returns coming in at a dizzy rate almost from the moment the polls closed.

Counting boards had been busy in 41 of the 57 precincts, and finished shortly after 8 p. m. By 9 o'clock, County Clerk Mae K. Short had heard from a majority of election boards, by 10 o'clock all precincts were in but Wood River. Its report arrived Saturday morning.

A combination of a brief ballot and a meager vote made it possible for Clerk Short's boards to rush the count in record time.

Primary Takes 14 Precincts
The primary change managed to carry 14 precincts, most of them in the city. A hasty survey last night indicated that the other measures failed to carry a single precinct. Student fees lost by just one vote in precinct 6, which voted at the Presbyterian church, and in Modoc precinct.

Legislative pay and the sales tax came out with "goose eggs" in some of the outside precincts. They didn't fare much better inside of town. Outside voters cracked the other measures harder than did city residents. Little interest was evinced in the measures when they were be-

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bonus out of manipulation of bonds."

The resolution adopted was proposed by Representative Greenwood (D-Ind.), who said: "Many of us—in fact all of us—do not believe in wild inflation that would see government credit and purchasing power imperiled. But we could issue notes on the metallic base that lies in the treasury and belongs to the government."

After consulting Patman before the meeting opened, Senator Thomas (D-Okla.) announced a similar movement would be initiated in the senate.

"We are going to start a movement in the senate," he said, "to block all tax legislation and the issuance of any more interest-bearing bonds until the treasury has issued currency against the idle gold and silver."

The Greenwood resolution placed the inflation bloc on record as:

Viewing continued issuance of interest-bearing bonds with alarm.

Favoring "sound and adequate currency controlled at all hazards."

Reaffirming that notes should be issued against the government's gold and silver so that no "tribute" would be paid large banking corporations.

Exploring new taxes as entirely unnecessary.

Instruction Chairman Patman to appoint a steering committee to carry through the program.

MANAGER PLAN BEATEN

SALEM, Feb. 1. (AP)—Salem's city managers plan took a beating along with the four state-wide issues at the special election polls yesterday. The vote was 2,320 for the measure and 3,772 against.
