YOUTHS SKI TO LAKE OF WOODS

Five Klamath Falls youths made a ski trip into Lake of the Woods Saturday and Sunday, finding the lake region under a record depth of snow.

Donald Rogers, Carl Van Emon, Donald Ellingsen, Fred Peterson, Jr., and Donald Sellers made the trip. They drove to Pelican Bay ranger station Saturday morning, and set out from there at 9 a. m. for the lake.

Reaching the lake at 12:30 p. m., they were welcomed by Al Swanson, caretaker, who is spending the winter there. Swanson told them he had been shoveling snow steadily since Christmas day, removing snow from the roofs of 120 cabins.

The youths shoveled into the Leslie Rogers cabin, where they hopped up for the week-end. A skunk had taken possession of the basement where dry wood was stored, and they dug into the snow for their fuel supply. To get water, they chopped into the lake. After going through a foot of ice, they found a thin layer of water, and chopped through another foot of ice to get to the lake water proper.

The boys stayed until Sunday afternoon, when they set out again for Pelican ranger station. Drifts through the canyon were 15 feet deep. The snow on the level at Fish Lake road junction was eight feet deep. The trip to the ranger cabin was made in 2 1/2 hours.

Governor Demands Police Reveal Clues

TRIDENT, N. J., Feb. 3. (UP)—Governor Harold G. Hoffman Saturday made new demands on Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, superintendent of the state police, to answer those questions about the Lindbergh kidnapping case "to which he holds the answers."

Meanwhile he was assured by the chairman of the republican state committee that there would be no party repudiation for his granting a reprieve to the condemned Bruno Richard Hauptmann.

Hoffman said that Schwarzkopf "holds answers to questions involving some phases of the case—involving accomplices."

Worker Killed in Tunnel Explosion

CAMBRIDGE, O., Feb. 3. (UP)—A premature dynamite explosion in a new railroad tunnel near here Saturday killed one man and trapped 20 others for a time. Hurt Grubbs of Haysville, Ohio, was killed. He was among a crew of workers digging the tunnel.

Grubbs set off the explosion. It was reported, when his electric drill cut into an old charge of 15 sticks of dynamite. His body was cut in half.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3. (AP)—Robert Fechner, director of the Civilian Conservation Corps, said in a report published today that the number of men leaving the corps to take private jobs in 1935 showed a 36,760 increase over the preceding year.

The total for the past year was placed at 134,055, compared with an enrollment strength varying from 300,000 to nearly 500,000. July showed the largest number of resignations, 15,851, and February the smallest, 6,947.

California Townsend Enrollment Boosted

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 3. (UP)—Edward J. Margrett, state manager of the Townsend movement in California, reported Saturday the organization had added 14,000 new members in the state during January.

He set the strength of the Townsend clubs, organized to support the \$200 monthly old age pension plan of Dr. Francis Townsend, at "well over 400,000" in California.

Margrett said many youths were joining the Townsend clubs which he said are growing at the rate of 538 members a day in California.

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
