

Powerful Huskies Grab Second from OSC

BEAVERS OFFER STIFF BATTLE

Washington Takes Contest, 35 to 31, at Corvallis.

CORVALLIS, Feb. 5. (UP)—Washington's apparently unbeatable Huskies, trailing 10 points at the half, put on a whirlwind finish last night to defeat Oregon State, 35 to 31, and mark up their eighth consecutive victory.

The Beavers, defending northern division champions, slowed down the Huskies' pace at the start and held a 20 to 10 lead at the half. Washington won last night, 51 to 33, and now has completed half its schedule without faltering.

Patterson in Hero's Role
Chuck Patterson, substitute guard, was the hero of Washington's spectacular last-half drive, getting five field goals as the Beavers tightened up on Ed Lovrich and Clyde Wagner, last night's high scorers. Bishop, center, slipped in four field goals.

Patterson went into the game after the first five minutes, when Egge went out on four personal fouls. All his baskets were from far out on the court.

The Orangemen showed a reversal of last night's form in the first half when they changed from a zone to a man-to-man defense. The Huskies got only one field goal in the first 14 minutes of play while the States scored 20 points, eight of which Cliff Folen, tall guard, sank on pivot shots under the basket.

Lead Alternates
Midway of the second half three quick baskets by Patterson, a dribbled-in field goal by McKinstrey, a long shot by Wagner and a tip-in by Bishop cut the Beavers' lead to 26-24. Bishop tied the count with pivot shot while Lovrich came to play.

Lovrich sent the Huskies out ahead when he converted a point on Conkling's fourth foul, but Wally Palmberg dribbled in and the Beavers again led by a point.

Palmberg added a one-handed field goal and O. S. C. led 30-27 with only two minutes to play.

In a championship rally, Lovrich sank a push shot, Patterson added two howitzers and Bishop cut a tip-in in the frantic closing minutes while the States were able to convert only one free throw on Patterson's foul.

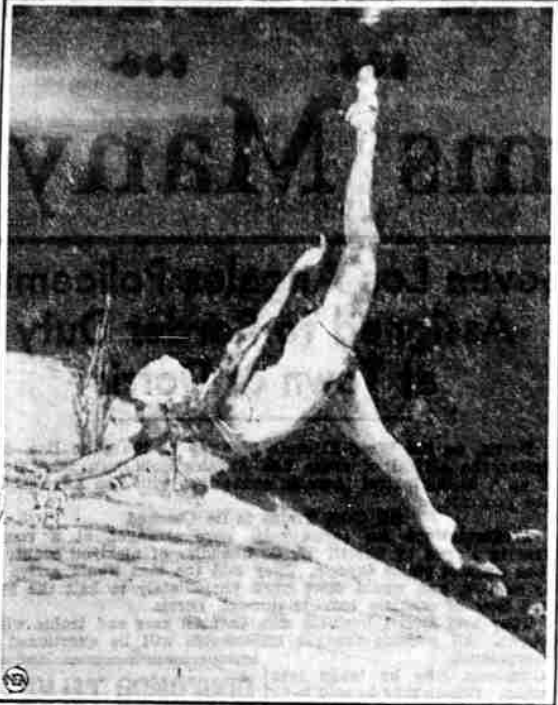

RUGGED COWBOY STOPS TAYLOR

Young Toledo Giant defeated in Armory Re-match.

Frank Taylor, young giant from Toledo, Ohio, took the long, long spin on the broad shoulders of Cowboy Dude Chick and lost his re-match at the Klamath armory last night.

The victory was the fourth for the Wyoming cowpuncher in exactly four weeks of wrestling competition in Klamath Falls. Not only was it win No. 4, but it was a continuation of Chick's amazing record of not having lost a single fall at the armory. Each triumph has come from the same hold—the sickening airplane spin—which no opponent has survived.

Bout Lasts 38 Minutes
Taylor, sticking it out through 38 minutes and 31 seconds of grueling wrestling, made the fatal mistake of leaping at the cowboy's head in an effort to clamp on a flying scissor. He was caught on the shoulders of the powerful Wyoming athlete, whirled dizzily and then thumped to the canvas. He tried to come back after the five-minute rest period, but fell face down as he attempted to rise from his stool.

Someone appropriately played "The Music Goes Round and Around" on the loud speaker system as Taylor made his exit to the dressing room. He was packed to the showers by his opponent.

Taylor forced Chick to the utmost. At the end of the wearying match, both grapplers carried battle scars. Taylor's eyes were cut and Chick's nose was bleeding.

Hollis Beats Glover
The match was a series of hard, vicious holds. Chick's bulldog headlocks, body scissors and short arm scissors kept Taylor on the defensive throughout a greater part of the match. It wasn't clear sailing for the winner either. He himself was trapped in hard head scissors, leg splits and a double toe hold. Once he nearly went down under Sonnenbergs.

Without question, the match stacked up as the most outstanding promoted at the armory. Ken Hollis of Arkansas and Max Glover of Detroit, a pair of ruffians, put on a wild semi-windup. Hollis, taking falls in the third and fourth rounds, came out on top. Glover won the opening fall in the first with a combination body scissors and toe hold. Both of Hollis' falls came with Boston crabs.

Bob Kennaston, Gold Hill marine, stopped Tiger Taskoff, Bulgaria, in the fourth round of the opener. The Tiger was unable to return after Kennaston won a fall in the third round with a reverse headlock. The hold was preceded by a series of drop kicks.

Taskoff took a fall in the second round with a hammerlock. At the start of the main event, Hollis sought a return match with Chick, who defeated him several weeks ago.

Wally Palmber of O. S. C. has Highest Average in North.

SEATTLE, Feb. 5. (AP)—For the third straight week there was a new name at the top of the northern division Pacific Coast conference hoop scorers today. Wally Palmberg of Oregon State college taking over first place in the standings with 94 points and an average of 19.6 for nine games.

In third place last week, the sharpshooting Beaver forward hit the hoop for 24 points against Washington Monday and Tuesday.

While Ralph Bishop, Washington center, last week's top man, was shoved down to third place, a teammate, Ed Lovrich, crowding into the second place slot ahead of him. Lovrich had garnered 79 points and a 9.9 average, and Bishop 67 and 8.2, in eight games.

Sam Liebowitz, Oregon guard, retained his fourth place rating although his average dropped a few points. The Webfoot veteran had 58 points and an 8.2 average in seven contests. Ward Howell, a teammate, tops in the standings two weeks ago and second last week, got only three points against Washington last week-end and dropped to fifth place with an 8.1 average for his 57 points.

Howell was tops in the gift shot department, dropping in 27 free tosses thus far, with Palmberg next with 26, although the latter has played in two more games.

Earl Conkling of Oregon State was the "bad boy" of the league, having had 25 personals called, and Wagner of Washington, and Geraghty and Fisher of Idaho were next, all with 19.
