Officers remained in hotel-rooms, and at Elmer, another point of entry on the Arizona border, they engaged in blood practice.

Had Road Lines Guarded
Acting from Yuma, Ariz., Los Angeles police chief James E. Davis ordered the blockade of automobiles and vagrants on trains, giving them the choice of a jail term or leaving the state.

At Truckee, the snow-blanketed Sierra Nevada mountains, police were sworn in as Nevada county deputies and guarded railroad lines from Nevada.

At the "foreign legion's" headquarters here, police chief James E. Davis ordered the blockade of "human and legal plan in every respect, and the only one which probably will work," he added.

"Sixty-five to 85 per cent of the migratory indigents entering California come eventually to southern California. Financial loss to this area from this class of immigration is conservatively estimated at \$1,500,000 a year, to the state, \$5,000,000.

Situation Is Alarming
"The indigents are not coming for work. They are coming with the idea of getting on relief rolls, begging or stealing."

"Now with government relief being gradually withdrawn, the situation is becoming alarming. If not desperate, to the residents of Los Angeles."

"If we stop these thousands of indigents at the sixteen main arteries of the state now being guarded, the situation is considerably simplified. If it is done we confidently expect a 20 per cent decrease in the crime total in the next twelve months."

L. A.'s Borders "Wide"
Governor Frank F. Merriam summed up the blockade with the remark: "Well, I guess Los Angeles could do it; its boundary almost goes to the horizon." Arizona's governor, H. H. Moore, called it a "publicity bluff."

In the Los Angeles city council, sharp debate arose over the police program and a ruling on its legality was requested from the city attorney.

Mayor E. J. Kenney, of San Diego, former chairman of the state relief commission, voiced a plea for inauguration of a federal transient program to save California communities from "disastrous conditions."

**MOORE PARK SITE
OFFERED MUSEUM**

A site in Moore park as a location for the proposed civic museum was offered by the city park board Tuesday evening at the regular meeting of the American Legion at memorial hall.

WPA WORK STARTS HERE THURSDAY

Work on three new WPA projects will start Thursday, with more than 40 men employed, according to an announcement from the local headquarters offices in the courthouse.

Landscaping the grounds and installation of a sprinkling system on the old high school grounds at Fifth and Washington streets, beautification of the cemetery grounds and work on the Enterprise irrigation district under A. M. Thomas, general superintendent, are included in the three projects scheduled to start Thursday.

Work on a ski jump in Moore park, another WPA project, is scheduled to begin on Tuesday, February 11, with 20 men to be employed. There will be 20 men on the Enterprise project, 12 on the high school grounds landscaping and 10 on the cemetery project.

Sixty-five women employed in the WPA relief sewing project, are moving the sewing room from the old location at 214 Main street, to 1125 Main street in the Elk hotel building. These women are employed to make clothing for needy persons on relief rolls.

Yugoslav Student Kills Nazi Chief

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he wished to strike a blow against the Nazi regime to avenge suffering he said were inflicted on his fellow Jews in Germany.

Police said the student told them the bullets should have struck Reichsfuehrer Adolf Hitler, but that he did all in his power by removing the agent who "poisoned the atmosphere here."

Madame Gustloff admitted the slayer to her home, after the young man had asked to see her husband, and escorted him to the study, where he drew his pistol and fired as soon as the door was opened.

Police said Frankfurt told them he intended to shoot himself as well, but lost courage after tramping about in the snow for a short while, and decided to surrender.

He said he did not know Gustloff personally, but obtained the Nazi's address from a telephone directory.

BERLIN, Feb. 5, (AP)—Nazis of the third reich, taking the assassination of Wilhelm Gustloff as justification for their anti-Semitic attitude, gave a pledge today to persist in their course against Jews in Germany.

The body of Gustloff is to be buried at Schwerin-Mecklenburg with full Nazi honors.

Complete fulfillment of the anti-Semitic issue "without compromise," was demanded by Adolf Hitler's newspaper, Voelkischer Beobachter, as a result of the slaying of the Nazi agent at Davos, Switzerland, yesterday by a Yugoslav medical student, who said he was a Jew.

Trains were running late, but roads were open in Nebraska, where temperatures ranged from 3 above to 30 below zero at Norfolk. The Kansas low was 7 above, with railroads and highways reported clear.

Cool Supply Short
Snowbound towns in Central Iowa faced critical coal shortages as temperatures sank as far as 32 below at Marshalltown. Gov. Clyde L. Herring conferred with mine operators after nine unions refused to work again on Saturday.

Iowa schools closed for lack of coal, highways were open only to one-way traffic, and passenger trains were an hour to eight hours late.

The east, due to feel the full force of the new zero wave tonight, was still under the spell of yesterday's lake storm. Buffalo, N. Y., pedestrians walked to work backwards rather than face a 12-mile wind and 7 degree temperatures. Scores were injured when blown off their feet by a 70-mile gale yesterday.
