

Chiloquin Wins First City League Appearance

Basketball Referee Dictator

Court Game Only Sport Where Foul Can Be Called On Crowd. Extra Rest Period Unheard of in All Games But Wrestling.

Although they were by no means spared of criticism in the past, the dictatorial powers of basketball referees have come in for a bit more comment this year than has been usual.

The particular incident in Oregon was the awarding of two free throws to Washington in its series against the Webfoots at Eugene. The fouls were called on the noisy crowd. Both shots were converted, and even though they made slight difference to the margin of the Huskies' victory, the affair provoked the bad temper of the Oregon loyalists.

Basketball is about the only sport in which the official can call a foul on the spectators. Usually it is done when the spectators refuse to maintain a discreet silence when a player of the opposing team is attempting to convert a free throw.

Not infrequently the referee will call a foul on the crowd when he himself is made the target of their displeasure.

The situation has no precedent in other games. Think of the riot it would start in baseball if the umpire, who suffers daily abuse at the hands of the home crowd, suddenly retaliated by giving an enemy batter an extra out!

Likewise, no football official ever gave a place kicker an extra chance simply because the stadium refused to be silent for the try-for-point after the touchdown.

No boxer gets a free slug at his opponent because he was booed; nor does a wrestler get an advantage when an excited crowd gives him the "razzberries."

Some things which would be absurd in one sport are demanded by the crowd in another.

When a wrestler fails to give his opponent an extra five minutes rest, he can count on disfavor.

Yet a football team, beaten and weary after the first two periods, would be laughed out of competition if it sought a little more time to recover before going into the second half.

Likewise, a boxer would never think of asking for more time between rounds.

It would appear that such rule would be universal in sport, but they aren't.

The games will drop at least one of the teams from a first place tie in the Northwest Conference standings. Puget Sound has won both its conference games and the Bearcats opened with a 42 to 20 win over Albany college.

Whitman and Linfield college also have won all their conference games.

The Puget Sound Loggers play at Linfield college Monday and Tuesday, while Willamette plays at Albany college Monday night.

SNOW CARNIVAL EVENTS LISTED

Tentative Schedule Set for Ski Meet February 23.

Meeting at Fort Klamath Wednesday night, committees of the Klamath Snow Club and the Crater Lake Ski club drew up a tentative schedule of events for the Klamath ski meet set for Sunday, February 23, at the Annie Creek playground.

While most of the events will be run off for the Klamath county championships, the joint committee decided to invite high school relay teams from outside the county and to make a Southern-Central Oregon high school relay race one of the feature events of the tourney, provided other communities can send teams.

The junior phase of the tourney will be emphasized this year, as both clubs are anxious to build up interest among youngsters in snow sports.

In addition to the high school relay there will be a high school girls' race, high school boys' race, of one and two miles, respectively.

Grade school boys will run a mile and grade school girls a half-mile. A mixed race for tots under 9 years of age is also planned.

Jumps will be divided into two classes, senior and junior. Sixteen years of age will be the dividing line.

The men's race will be a five-mile affair, and women will run two miles.

Novelty races, and possibly a service club race for the cup that was offered a few years ago again for the chamber of commerce by N. B. Drew are other features of the tentative schedule.

The joint committee decided to call for bids for concessions at the ski grounds. Separate bids for hot dog and warmer concessions should be offered, one for the concession under the jump, and the other for a wagon. Bids should be turned into Malcolm Epley at The Herald office by February 15. The clubs decided to ask for bids on the basis of a flat fee, rather than on a percentage basis.

Bowling Lists Closed With 60 Names Entered

It will be possible for competitors to bowl their first games tonight after the industrial league play ends.

HITLER OPENS WINTER GAMES

Record Crowds Drawn to Events in Bavarian Alps.

GARMISCH-PARTENKIRCHEN, Germany, Feb. 6. (AP)—Canada and the United States, twin powers of world hockey swept through their opening matches today as the fourth winter Olympic games got away to a snow-laden start before 8,000 spectators.

As swirling flakes all but obscured the action and slowed up play to a walk, the United States, led by Gordon Smith and Jack Garrison of Boston, turned back Germany's sextet in a tight defensive battle, 1-0, before 8,000 spectators in the ice stadium.

Canada, defending champion, trounced Poland, 8-1, in its initial test on Reiser lake with a bare 300 hardy fans looking on.

Smith scored the only goal of the American-German tussle late in the first period but it took a rugged defense, led by Garrison, to hold off the Teutons whose Jewish center, Rudi Hall, was an outstanding star.

A large and cosmopolitan crowd packed the ski stadium to watch the colorful parade of the nations and hear the Reichsfuehrer speak the words that inaugurated an eleven-day carnival of international competition in skiing, speed skating, figure skating, bob-sledding and hockey.

Think Snow Falls

From a winter sports viewpoint, weather conditions were perfect. So thickly was the snow falling that the peaks of nearby mountain ranges were entirely obscured.

As each national delegation marched past Hitler with flag lowered, the Fuehrer gave the Nazi salute. Most of the competitors from foreign lands returned the salute, in kind, but the Americans were among those who did not.

"We Germans want to show the world that, true to the command of our Fuehrer, we desire to make these games a real festival of peace and understanding," said Dr. Ritter von Hall, president of the German Olympic organizing committee.

"It is a high honor and special joy for me, on behalf of the organizing committee, to welcome you all in the heartiest manner possible.

"The representatives of 28 nations have been waiting for this coveted past for months. They stand before us in the flower of their youth. All are animated by a desire to bring honor to the idea of sport and to their nation."

Germany has made all its preparations "true to the Olympic protocol and to the Olympic spirit," Dr. Von Hall declared.

The contestants varied garb presented a brightly colored picture. Dark colors predominated but red, blue and other colors stood out against the snowy background.

Great Crowd Gathers

Most picturequely costumed men's group, perhaps, was the Austrian in Tyrolean garb—leather green coats, short breeches and hats with feathers jutting jauntily from the top.

Sonja Henie, Norway's perennial figure skating champion, received the greatest personal ovation from the crowd. She was pressed in white and wore a long fur coat. She nodded and smiled broadly at admirers. Etsuko Inada, young Japanese girl figure skater, also was given great applause.

The national delegations getting the biggest hands included the French and Austrians, both of whom gave the Nazi salute in pronounced fashion.

The military patrol ski team lent an otherwise absent martial touch to the parade.

Experts estimated the crowd at 80,000.

Six Basketball Games Played on Tulelake Floor

TULELAKE, Calif.—Basketball fans of Tulelake were given several thrills Monday and Tuesday nights when six games were played at the local gymnasium.

On Monday evening the Tulelake Town Terror, composed of high school alumni and teachers of Tulelake schools, played the Mallin second team. Score for the furiously battled contest was 18 to 15 in favor of the Terror.

Four games were played on Tuesday evening. Play began at 6:30, when the Mallin grade school met Tulelake's grade school B team. Tulelake was winner of the contest, the score being 11 to 9.

In the second inter-school contest Mallin and Tulelake grade school teams played a fast contest, in which Tulelake was defeated 14 to 8.

The two major games of the night's schedule were played by Tulelake high school and the Hackamore CCC camp second team; followed by the Tulelake CCC-Hackamore first team contest.

Of the two contests the Tulelake CCC-Hackamore first team provided spectators with the best exhibition of basket ball of the evening. The teams were evenly matched and the score ran nearly even during the majority of the play, with neither side showing much advantage. Score of the major games, however, showed the superiority of the Tulelake team without question. Starting with the first toss-up the squad passed the ball through the Hackamore defense with ease to drop it through the hoop almost at will. Total points rolled up were Tulelake 79 and Hackamore 13.

Coch Coach will take the Tulelake team to Chiloquin Friday night for a conference game, which will tax the playing ability of the group. It is thought by many here. Following the Friday game at the reservation town, Tulelake will meet the Merrill aggregation on the Tulelake floor in what will probably be the high-light game of the season.

Tulelake leads the Klamath-Siskiyou conference and has no defeats scored against it. Reputation of the Tulelakers has been rapidly spreading, and their stock has risen several points since the McCloud contest here last week.

Merrill, however, has its heart set on defeating Tulelake, and will bring a fighting organization which is being trained to a keen edge for the game.

The Merrill-Tulelake game is expected to draw the largest attendance here for the season. Much interest has been displayed in the Tulelake team. Large crowds have been watching the home games.

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6. (AP)—Coach Edward P. (Slim) Madigan of the St. Mary's college football team announced today his eleven would play Glenn "Pop" Warner's Temple university team here December 5.

The game will mark Warner's first football invasion of the Pacific coast since his resignation as coach at Stanford university three seasons ago.

The six-zing Northwestern hockey league race boiled down today to a hard battle between two full games separated the leading Seattle Seahawks and the cellar-dwelling Calgary Tigers.

Seattle's Seahawks clung to first place by reason of a 1 to 1 tie with the Portland Buckaroos on Seattle ice last night. But the Bucks moved into second over the shoulders of the Vancouver, leaving Edmonton and Calgary fourth and fifth.

Calgary wrecked Edmonton's hopes of climbing into a tie for second by handing the Eskimos a 4 to 3 beating at Calgary before a crowd which braved a temperature of 25 degrees below zero.

Portland and Seattle will battle again for first place tonight in the Buckaroos' own lair. The other teams will be idle.

Louis Couper, frisky Portland forward, put his team into the lead with one goal on a pass from Pratt in the first period. It was Dave Gilhooly, heavy defenseman, who scored the tying goal in the second on a pass from Harold Tabor, who faked the Bucks' defense out of position. In the overtime period, Portland seemed content to let the game stay tied and played strictly on the defensive.

At Calgary, Loop Lespi and Tony Savage each potted in two of Calgary's goals. Savage counted in the first and second periods and Lespi in the second and third. Leo Whittles, in the first, Hank Drek, in the second, and Louis Holmes, in the third, accounted for the Eskimos' three tallies.
