

PAINTERS MEET HERE WEDNESDAY

"The economy of quality in painting jobs was one of the lessons that many property owners learned from the depression," Mr. Floyd Irwin told about 30 master painters and paint dealers of this city and vicinity at a meeting held by the National Lead company Wednesday night at the Willard hotel. The chairman of the meeting was R. C. Cook and the program was presented by William Herman and Floyd Irwin, of National Lead company, manufacturers of Dutch Boy paint products.

"During the depression," Mr. Irwin continued, "many property owners tried to save money by buying 'cheap' paint and hiring inexperienced painters. The result was early paint failures and expensive burning off of the old cracked paint surfaces when repainting was necessary. This extra expense was many times the saving on the first cost of these 'cheap' painting jobs."

"Painters and paint dealers must use advertising and proper selling methods to drive home the lesson of the depression that it pays to hire a good painter and use quality paint products."

The program included a talk, "Ask Dad, He Knows," and presented newspaper and other advertising features to help painters and paint dealers tell the public the story of quality painting jobs.

Several painting demonstrations were given by William Herman to show painters the latest trends in interior and exterior painting.

National Lead company was represented by H. L. Dalton, Portland manager; Floyd Irwin, and William Herman of New York city, and R. C. Cook of Medford, Ore.

Washington Denies Transient Dumping

OLYMPIA, Wash., Feb. 6, (UP)—Governor Clarence D. Martin Wednesday denied Washington had "dumped" transients without funds into Oregon, or anywhere else, in answer to charges of Gov. Charles H. Martin of Oregon.

"If any transients are going into Oregon from Washington it is at their own volition," said the executive.

Charles F. Ernst, state relief administrator, said Oregon probably was experiencing the seasonal influx headed for California, hoping to find work in early harvests.

Edward's Accession Boon To Peace, Roumanian King Claims in First Interview

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PARIS, Feb. 6, (UP)—A brighter outlook for peace of Europe as result of the accession to the British throne of King Edward VIII was foreseen Wednesday by Carol II, king of Roumania, in an exclusive interview with the United Press.

It was the first interview his majesty ever has granted a news agency.

Carol was quoted in his praise of the youthful British king-emperor—his distant cousin. He drew an enthusiastic portrait of the late King George V and then, describing the new ruler of the "empire on which the sun never sets," said:

"King Edward has formed remarkable powers of judgment and strength of character as a result of his numerous voyages throughout the world and the British empire. He has mixed with all kinds of people and has learned to deal with all kinds of situations."

"He is fully equipped for his task as the head of a great empire. His experience, I am confident, will prove unusually helpful in his relations with all men and countries."

"As King George V knew the pre-war empire thoroughly, so King Edward knows the empire of today."

"That knowledge augurs well for the future."

The king received me this evening in the drawing room of his apartment in the Ritz hotel. I was ushered in and formally presented by his marshal of palace who accompanied him here from London after they attended the funeral of King George.

The marshal withdrew, after the presentation, and left us alone for a 10-minute talk.

Carol wore a blue lounge suit and a soft collared American style shirt. He shook hands heartily and beckoned me to sit opposite him. Then, in fluent English, he said:

"Go ahead, fire any questions you want, in English, and I'll answer all I can."

Harmony in Balkans

The Balkan nations, once commonly called Europe's powder barrel, now live together in a spirit of perfect political harmony and in neighborly amity, the king said.

He recalled that the Balkan

rulers all attended the funeral of King George and added:

"I feel that my conversations here have resulted in a re-orientation of Franco-Roumanian friendship which is a valuable factor for the peace of Europe and which all men of good will can welcome as a contribution to general European stability."

Carol referred to his brief visit to the United States 16 years ago, saying:

"My biggest impression can be summed up in one word: 'Work'."

"For every American I saw seemed to be at work. Work for the sake of work itself seemed to me to be the ambition that is the driving force of your great country."

"Unfortunately I have not yet visited South America but I sincerely hope that one day I shall be able to revisit the United States and continue on to the nations to the south."

"I believe that the newer countries have a younger outlook which provides a striking contrast to the older and more staid ways of Europe."

"There is nothing like youth for negotiating obstacles."

Nations Urged by Lloyd-George to Redivide Colonies

LONDON, Feb. 6, (UP)—David Lloyd-George, Britain's war-time prime minister, made a dramatic plea in parliament Wednesday for a redistribution of colonial possessions of European countries.

The war, he said, had created the need for a new world order, and the colonies of the victors should be divided among the vanquished.

Speaking in support of a resolution by George Lansbury, labor leader, urging Britain to call a world conference to deal with the causes of war, Lloyd-George said dramatically:

"I do not believe there will be peace in the world until you consider the mandates (the colonial mandates granted at conclusion of the World War, when Germany's colonies were split up).

Belgium, with a small population, got the best part of Germany East Africa and the whole of the Congo. Portugal got millions of square miles. Holland is in the same position."

"These countries have tropical territories. On the other hand you have Germany with none. Italy with practically none."

The house of commons rejected the proposal, however, passing instead an amendment expressing confidence that the national government is taking all practical steps for the promotion of international prosperity and a better understanding among all peoples.

Mill Operators, Workers Confer

PORTLAND, Feb. 6, (UP)—Operators of eight Portland sawmills who have received demands from the Sawmill and Timber Workers union, local No. 2532, for a 10 per cent wage increase and changes in working conditions, met union representatives Wednesday and announced willingness to arbitrate.

Three representatives of the operators and three representatives of labor will be named Thursday to form a joint committee of arbitration.

Issues at stake were not discussed at the meeting.

TAX LAW BRINGS HEAVY PAYMENTS

A rush on the tax office by property owners eager to take advantage of the new delinquent tax payment law has begun. It was reported Tuesday by Allen Sloan, deputy sheriff in charge of tax collections.

The law permits a taxpayer who pays back taxes for a single year, beginning with the oldest year in which a delinquency is shown, in four quarterly installments concurrent with payment of the present year's taxes, to escape penalties and interest on his delinquent assessments.

Thus a property owner whose delinquent taxes go back as far as 1928, this year can pay his 1928 taxes without having to pay the interest and penalty on the 1928 tax. Next year he may pay his 1929 delinquent taxes, or those of the next oldest year in which a delinquency exists, in conjunction with the 1937 tax, and so on from year to year until he no longer owes back taxes and always without additional assessment for interest and penalties.

FARM COMMODITIES IN TWO-WAY TREND

CHICAGO, Feb. 6, (AP)—Market prices of major farm commodities developed a two way trend today, a month after the invalidation of the agricultural administration act.

The survey by the Associated Press, of 19 items including the major commodities which bore AAA processing taxes, disclosed five declined in price while five others advanced since January 6 when the history making decision of the supreme court was announced.

Most price changes were comparatively insignificant and several important trade factors including cold weather appeared as market influences. The decision apparently had no direct effect in other cases.

Hogs showed the sharpest reaction, advancing \$1 a hundred pounds immediately after the decision. The top is now \$1.30 above that of January 6 but some of this increase was credited to the cold wave and light receipts.

HERMISTON, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—J. M. Spencer, district watermaster, said snow conditions in the Blue mountains assure irrigation districts in the Umatilla and Walla Walla rivers areas of an ample water supply.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Grazing fees on national forest ranges in Oregon and Washington will be increased in accordance with a formula agreed on by stockmen and forest officials in 1933, the United States forest service announced. Fees for 1936 were set at 90 per cent of the 1931 base rate for cattle and 75 per cent of the 1931 base rate for sheep.

EUGENE, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Nurses and social workers from Lane, Benton, Coos, Linn and Douglas counties will meet here tomorrow for a one-day course in "community problems," Dr. R. R. Martin of the sociology department of the University of Oregon announced.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Fifty-one cannot already be enrolled in the two-weeks' school at Oregon State college and almost as many more are expected to register before the course is terminated, Professor E. H. Weiland of Oregon State said today.

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Plans for a co-operative pear cannery here will be discussed by the Jackson County Fruit Growers' association Saturday. It was announced by the president, Ray Ward.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—The report presented by the Coos county planning commission suggested an extensive program to make southwestern

Oregon a national recreational resort. The fact that mountain stream sport fishing and deep-sea sport fishing are available in the same area was pointed out.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Seven hundred and fifty tickets sufficient to fill every chair in the main dining room of the Multnomah hotel—already have been purchased for the Lincoln Day banquet here February 12, it was announced by John Rankin, chairman.

The two organizations said every effort would be taken to guard against exploitation. Lane county veterans are scheduled to receive about \$3,000,000 in bonds.

CARLTON, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—About 350 men ultimately will be employed in camps and the sawmill of the Flora Logging company, Assistant Manager F. E. Cody said. He said the 75 men already dispatched to the woods constituted a vanguard to prepare for additional crews. Probable payroll was estimated at \$50,000 a month.

WILLAMINA, Ore., Feb. 6, (AP)—Sheriff G. W. Manning investigated the attempted wrecking of a Southern Pacific freight train near here today.

He said the incident occurred Tuesday but no report was made until yesterday. The sheriff said

the engine of the train struck a large rock and was stopped a few feet from a pile of ties placed on the tracks. No one was injured.
