PARK WINTER TRAVEL SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Winter travel into Crater lake national park has shown up encouragingly this year. It is disclosed in statistics sent to the chamber of commerce Thursday by Carlisle Crouch, chief ranger.

In January, 181 cars carried 647 visitors into the snow-covered national park area. Of this number, 29 cars carrying 199 visitors went in from the west, and 152 cars, carrying 538 visitors, entered by way of Fort Klamath and the south gate.

Since October 1, the beginning of the new year travel season, 1238 cars have taken 4924 people into the park by Fort Klamath way, and 1184 cars have taken 3749 visitors in by the west entrance.

Crouch, in citing the comparisons between entrance, pointed out that the state highway department left the west side road blocked for about three weeks.

California, New Mexico, Minnesota, Wisconsin were represented in winter travel.

Klamath groups, such as the chamber of commerce and the Snow club, are working to build Crater lake park travel this winter to make a statistical showing that will assist in promoting a permanent policy of keeping the park open to winter visitors.

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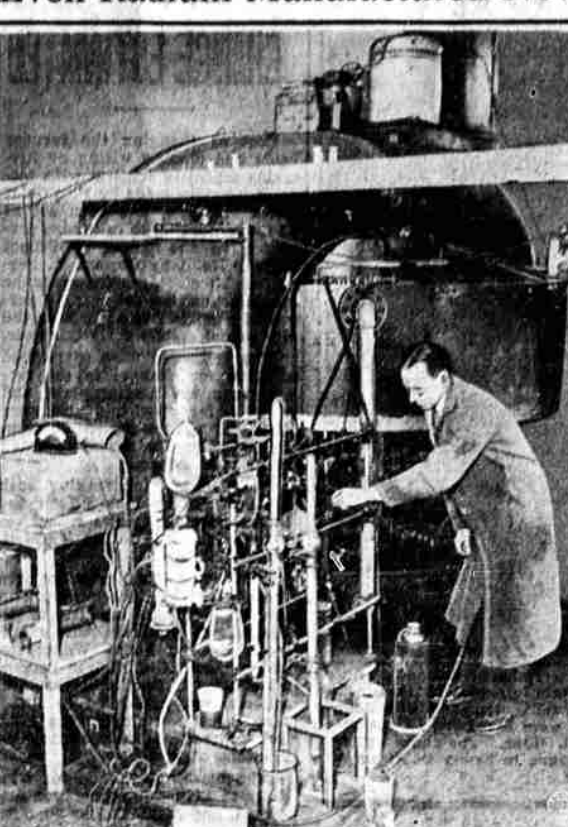
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Even Radium Manufactured Now

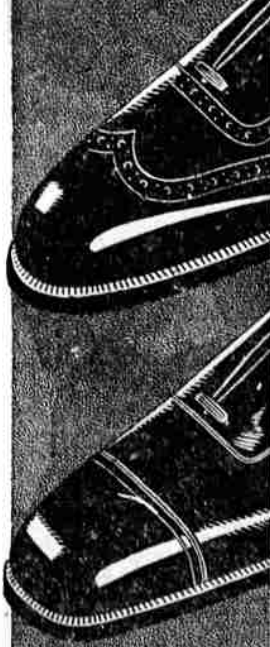
