New Contracts Leave Many Stars in Stubborn Mood

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 6, (AP)—Big league baseball players who winter out this way for the most part looked upon 1936 contracts with favor but in several instances a peek at the document put the boys in a wrangling if not belligerent mood.

An Associated Press survey reveals about one-quarter of the group of more than thirty are dissatisfied with salary terms as first offered.

Rookie Prize Stubborn—The New York Yankees, with the most players sojourning in the far west, also list the most discontented, four of seven snubbing written advances.

Joe Di Maggio, rookie outfielder, prize obtained from the San Francisco Seals for \$25,000 and several players, has never seen a big league park but he wants a bigger salary than was offered.

The report is he received a contract calling for around \$300 a month whereas he hopes to do a Yankee uniform at \$1,000 per.

Tony Lazari, Yankee second baseman of years standing, is upset because his salary was cut. His running mate, Shortstop Frankie Crosetti, was dumbfounded to get a contract calling for \$1,000 for the season.

IRREGULAR PRICES NOTED FOR WHEAT

CHICAGO, Feb. 6, (AP)—Spreading operations in which May was sold against July and September purchases formed the bulk of 23 minutes in wheat today, with prices ruling irregular.

Low temperatures continued to prevail over domestic wheat territory, but were not so severe as yesterday. The forecast was for snow except in Kansas.

Wheat closed nervous, 1c lower to 1c higher, compared with yesterday's finish, May 99 1/2c; corn unchanged to 1c off, May, 60 1/2c; oats unchanged to 1c down, and provisions unchanged to 1c decline.
