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News of Oregon

BONNEVILLE, Ore., Feb. 7.
—Engineers said today the initial blast to remove the old cofferdam at the Bonneville power navigation project accomplished its purpose without damage to the dam itself. Several windows were broken and huge timbers were thrown high in the air.
McMINNVILLE, Ore., Feb. 7.
—Two youths placed a rock and ties on the Southern Pacific tracks near Williams "to see what would happen," Sheriff G. W. Manning of Yamhill reported. He said Donald Britt, 18, Williams, and Frederick Finney, 20, Sheridan, confessed the act. Bail was set at \$1,000 each. An engine struck the rock Tuesday, but was halted before reaching the ties. No one was injured.

HILLSBORO, Ore., Feb. 7.
—The grand jury will hear charges placed against eight persons arrested in a raid on the Spinning Wheel dance hall near Tigar last month. County Judge Don Templeton decided.
He released two others, but District Attorney Russell Morgan ordered them re-arrested on other charges. Complaints range from operating gambling devices to unlawful sale of wine.

OREGON CITY, Ore., Feb. 7.
—Attempts will be made to sell \$2,000 worth of 6 per cent preferred stock here in the Canby-Mollala cooperative flax plant, business leaders decided.
The plant is to be financed by the government and growers, Canby and Mollala reported already having sold a share of their quota.

CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 7.
—W. S. Averill, Benton county agent, urged farmers at the agricultural conference here to join co-operating associations and keep accurate records of production. E. L. Porter of Oregon State college spoke on farm problems, and said the agricultural adjustment question "is by no means new and will be faced by the next administration, too."

MEDFORD, Ore., Feb. 7.
—The works progress administration will give the "go ahead" signal to Medford's proposed airport development project as soon as minor engineering details are worked out. Dr. Ray Staub of the state aeronautics board told business leaders here.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 7.
—Plans for a city occupational tax designed to reduce the levy on property are being worked out. City Attorney J. W. McIntire announced. He said the tax would provide additional revenue from public utilities now using streets and thoroughfares.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7.
—The City of Portland's Union Pacific's steamship, left here yesterday on the first of its new six-month 394-hour schedule to Chicago. A delegation from the Portland chamber of commerce saw the "sailing." The train has been remodeled since being taken out of service following last summer's derailment.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., Feb. 7.
—The proposal of R. J. Hillstrom, dance hall operator and member of the city council, to operate a walkathon here, drew a protest statement from the Marshfield school board.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 7.
—Postal receipts at the Portland postoffice gained 6.68 per cent in January, compared with the corresponding month a year ago, Postmaster E. T. Hedlund reported.

NYA Man Visits Klamath Falls

Russell Andrews, former teacher at Klamath Union high school and now acting state head of the National Youth Administration, was a visitor here Thursday.
Andrews is taking the place formerly held by Paul T. Jackson, another ex-Klamath man, who is head of the Chemawa Indian school.
Some 556 youths are now employed on NYA projects in the state, Andrews said.

The NYA chief came here to look over the traffic survey being conducted under his division through sponsorship of the city of Klamath Falls.

Fremont Instead of Modoc Suggested As Name of New Boy Scout Area

Should it be Fremont or Modoc? That question comes to the fore as a result of Bend reactions to the selection of Modoc as the name for the new Boy Scout area in central, south Oregon and northern California.
R. C. Groesbeck, Klamath Falls, president of the area council, has received a letter from Phil Brogan of Bend and a copy of an editorial appearing in the Bend Bulletin, suggesting that Fremont should be the name of the Scout district.
Groesbeck said Friday that Fremont was one of the names considered at last Sunday's meeting of representatives from various parts of the area. Alturas, Lakeview, Redmond and Klamath Falls were represented at the meeting. Bend did not have anybody at the meeting.
The vote for Modoc as the name of the area was almost unanimous. Groesbeck said, however, that at a future meeting of the area board he will call attention to the Bend letters and editorial.
Here is the editorial by Robert Sawyer of the Bend Bulletin:
"The name—Modoc—chosen for the Boy Scout area covering Jefferson, Crook, Deschutes, Klamath and Lake counties in Oregon and Modoc in California is fair enough in its way but there is a name so much better that a change should be made.
"Modoc is not at all distinctive for the whole area and unless there is some ancient connection up here in central Oregon with which we are not familiar the name has no local significance whatever. The same thing is true of the name in Lake county.
"It is only in Klamath county that the name has any real background. There, of course, it does stand for a good deal, going back to the early Indians and through them connecting with the lava beds and the prominent point on the east shore of Upper Klamath lake. According to McArthur's invaluable 'Oregon Geographic Names' the name Modoc is derived from the Klamath (Indian) words Moa, meaning south, and Takin, meaning a native of that place or country, hence from the point of view of the Klamath Indians, natives of the country just to the south. This explanation alone points to the unfitness of the name for the scout area including so much country to the north.
"Instead of Modoc it is suggested that the name Fremont should be used.
"Fremont stands for John Charles Fremont, the United States army lieutenant who led an exploring expedition across country and down into California in 1843 and 1844. In his journey south through Oregon Fremont touched every one of the counties in the area except Crook, and Crook was once the name for two of the counties in the list. He crossed Jefferson and Deschutes from north to south, he camped on Klamath marsh and crossing to the east found and named Winter ridge and Summer lake. Thence he crossed Lake county into what is now Modoc in California and crossed it. Later, coming up from the south, he visited Klamath county again.
"Because of the identification of the name with so much of the territory in this scout area and because as a scout himself his name is an inspiration to boys of today, Fremont is the proper designation. The use of the name would open a large field of local exploration and study and to some suggest an even more extensive research in American history and biographical study.
"Make it Fremont—not Modoc."

SAILORS AT WORK

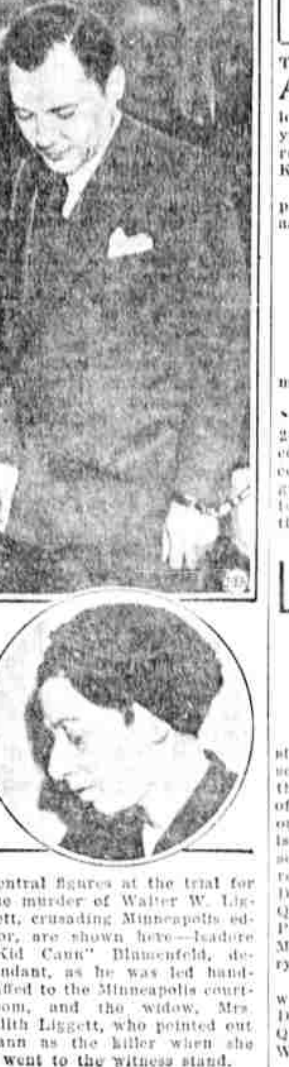
