Although the family refused to talk to newspaper men, the countess, through a third party, confirmed reports of her husband's condition, which was said to be hopeless. She declined to discuss reports that he had been given a blood transfusion.

LONDON, Feb. 7. (UP)—London friends of the Count of Covadonga, eldest son of former King Alfonso XIII of Spain, who is ill in Havana, were advised today that his condition is hopeless despite a blood transfusion.

The one-time heir to the Spanish throne, who renounced his royal rights to marry a Cuban commoner, was reported suffering from a malignant tumor.

## France Planning World's Largest Submarine Fleet

PARIS, Feb. 7. (UP)—France hopes this year to complete the most powerful submarine fleet the world ever has seen to keep pace with rebirth of German naval strength, it was learned today.

The 1936 naval construction program, now being drafted by experts of the navy and finance ministries, envisages a submarine fleet of 100 vessels, designed to guard the North sea, Atlantic and Mediterranean coasts.

France's present undersea strength is given officially as

89 submarines, including nine over-age. Submarine strength of other leading naval powers is:

United States, 84; Japan, 83; Great Britain, 51; Italy, 69, and Germany, reportedly, 13.
