

RUSSIA, JAPAN TOPIC OF TALK TO ROTARIANS

Lieutenant Commander Stewart F. Bryant, noted lecturer on international affairs, presented an interesting address on "Japan and the Soviet Union in the World Tomorrow" before the Rotary club Friday noon.

The speaker outlined and compared the resources of Russia and Japan, presenting their views and objectives.

He declared that isolation of a nation is no longer possible in the world as it is today, and asserted that an alliance between Russia, Great Britain and the United States would bring a powerful world control.

He pointed out that Russia's tremendous resources and territories made her virtually self-sufficient, and stated that her most vital necessity is a warm water port, which might be gained by aggression.

It is the belief of many statesmen, according to Bryant, that Russia may become the second world power. Action from Russia has averted numerous crises in world affairs recently, and it was the U. S. R. S. which was first to relinquish Chinese concessions and the first to advocate world disarmament.

The Lieutenant Commander urged that everyone keep abreast of the times, study world hap-

penings and familiarize himself with conditions as they are in order to realize the rapid changes of the present.

Bryant was introduced to the Rotary club by R. H. Macartney, an old-time friend. Macartney also acted as chairman of the day, and T. H. Waters, vice-president of the club, presided in the absence of Marshal Corbett, president.

Lieutenant Commander Bryant will speak at Fremont school auditorium this evening at 8:00 o'clock, and the public is urged to attend and hear this noted lecturer whose topic will be "National Security, Military, Economic and Political."

A total of 134 cars of potatoes moved out of the Klamath basin to southern markets during the week from January 31 to February 7, according to Federal Inspector Ross Aubrey.

Daily shipments were tabulated as follows: January 31, 7 cars; February 1, 19 cars; February 2, 11 cars; February 3, 25 cars; February 4, 25 cars; February 5, 39 cars; February 6, 17 cars.

PAN-EUROPEAN PEACE PARLEY PLANNED SOON

Copyright, 1936, by United Press PARIS, Feb. 6 (UP)—A conference of European powers will be held shortly, probably in London, in an effort to reach agreements to prevent war.

The French and British governments reached an agreement today to include Germany in a discussion of major European problems. It was learned on highest authority here, although London officials professed to have no knowledge of such an agreement.

Pretext of Naval Parley It was understood that the conference most likely would be called under the pretext of dealing with naval questions, but that its scope would be much wider than that, embracing these purposes:

1. To avoid giving Germany the feeling she has been isolated by the recent discussions of various powers in Paris, in which the reich was not included.

2. To prevent Germany from making some gesture likely to endanger peace, such as military occupation of the forbidden Rhineland zone.

3. Possible redistribution of raw materials as well as the settlement of matters in dispute in Europe.

France Welcomes Protest

4. Possible discussion of redistribution of colonial mandates and possessions — exceedingly sore spots with Germany and Italy.

It was understood that in de-

ciding on the conference, France agreed to waive any protest against Britain's desire to invite Germany to join the London naval conference. France has objected that such an invitation would sanction German naval rearmament, already well under way, which France has persistently refused to recognize.

Additional credence was given



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the reported plan in diplomatic circles as it dovetails with the general belief Anglo-German relations have been benefited by the accession of King Edward VIII to the British throne.
